BACKGROUND

The City of Tucson issued the above referenced Request for Proposal to select a contractor to Body Worn Cameras services. The solicitation was publicly posted on the City's website and notices were emailed to all registered vendors who have indicated email is their preferred delivery.

EVALUATION

A committee was formed to evaluate the proposals based upon the selection criteria set forth in the original RFP. The committee was comprised of the following members and signed Committee Member Statements were received from all.

Corporate Technologies Solutions American Video and Security Solutions Prior to releasing the proposals to the committee, I conducted an initial review of the proposals to ensure that all requested information had been submitted. As a result, all proposals were deemed eligible for the committee's review. The committee is charged with the final determination of acceptability.

On October 23, 2014, I met with the evaluation committee and discussed the role of the committee and the evaluation process. Each committee member received a copy of the City's Guidelines for Evaluation, the Evaluation Committee Responsibilities document, the evaluation criteria and copies of the proposals.

The committee reconvened on October 29, 2014, to discuss the relative strengths and weaknesses of the proposals with regard to the evaluation criteria set forth in the solicitation. After discussing all of the proposals, the committee members individually scored and ranked the proposals. The committee members' rankings were totaled to arrive at an overall ranking. As a result, the committee recommended shortlisting to the top three ranked firms:

Taser International L-3 Communications Coban Technologies

On November 7, 2014, the City requested product demonstrations from the three shortlisted vendors. It was requested that each vendor provide five cameras with all mounting solutions available.

On November 12, 2014, L-3 submitted a request to withdraw their proposal from consideration, citing that they were removing their product from the market and returning to the research and development phase. On November 17, 2014 Coban cited similar issues with their product and asked to remove their submission from evaluation also. The Procurement Department granted the request for withdrawal of both proposals.

The evaluation process for Taser International continued with the Tucson Police Department coordinating a variety of simulated field tests to document the differences between the mounting solutions and camera components. On December 15, 2014, the committee reconvened to view the video footage that was collected. After discussing the videos, the committee members individually scored Taser's proposal, and . recommended awarding to Taser International.

On December 15, 2014, a request for Best and Final Offer was sent to Taser International. The request for revised pricing, additional information and pricing on Intergraph coordination program, and future replacement of products.

NEGOTIATED VALUE

Taser decreased all pricing 5% to 15% across the board on products including cameras, mounting solutions, docking stations and software. Taser also introduced an unlimited data package that will provide the Tucson Police Department with the ability to forecast and plan financially for storage needs. They also included special pricing for the Intergraph coordination project.

CONTRACT OFFICER RECOMMENDATION:

I attest that the evaluation process was conducted in accordance with the Tucson Procurement Code and all applicable rules and regulations. Based upon the evaluation committee's recommendation, it is recommended that this contract shall be awarded to:
