GENERAL RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AT CITY OF BOYNTON BEACH COMMISSION MEETINGS

THE AGENDA:

There is an official agenda for every meeting of the City Commissioners, which determines the order of business conducted at the meeting. The City Commission will not take action upon any matter, proposal, or item of business, which is not listed upon the official agenda, unless a majority of the Commission has first consented to the presentation for consideration and action.

- **Consent Agenda Items:** These are items which the Commission does not need to discuss individually and which are voted on as a group.
- **Regular Agenda Items:** These are items which the Commission will discuss individually in the order listed on the agenda.
- Voice Vote: A voice vote by the Commission indicates approval of the agenda item. This can be by either a regular voice vote with "Ayes and Nays" or by a roll call vote.

SPEAKING AT COMMISSION MEETINGS:

The public is encouraged to offer comment to the Commission at their meetings during Public Hearings, Public Audience, and on any regular agenda item, as hereinafter described.

City Commission meetings are business meetings and, as such, the Commission retains the right to impose time limits on the discussion on an issue.

- **Public Hearings:** Any citizen may speak on an official agenda item under the section entitled "Public Hearings."
- **Public Audience:** Any citizen may be heard concerning any matter within the scope of the jurisdiction of the Commission Time Limit Three (3) Minutes
- Regular Agenda Items: Any citizen may speak on any official agenda item(s) listed on the agenda after a motion has been made and properly seconded, with the exception of Consent Agenda Items that have not been pulled for separate vote, reports, presentations and first reading of Ordinances Time Limit Three (3) minutes

When addressing the Commission, please step up to either podium and state, for the record, your name and address.

DECORUM:

Any person who disputes the meeting while addressing the Commission may be ordered by the presiding officer to cease further comments and/or to step down from the podium. An order by the presiding officer issued to control the decorum of the meeting is binding, unless over-ruled by the majority vote of the Commission members present.



WHEREAS, each year, the Lupus Foundation of America designates May as National Lupus Awareness Month to show support for the estimated 1.5 million Americans who have lupus.

WHEREAS, lupus is a cruel and mysterious chronic (lifelong) autoimmune disease in which the immune system is unbalanced, causing inflammation and tissue damage to virtually every organ system in the body.

WHEREAS, lupus can affect any part of the body, including the skin, lungs, heart, kidneys, and brain. No organ is spared. The disease can cause seizures, strokes, heart attacks, miscarriages, and organ failure.

WHEREAS, while lupus strikes mostly women of childbearing age, no one is safe from lupus. African Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, Asians and Native Americans are two to three times more likely to develop lupus - a disparity that remains unexplained.

WHEREAS, lupus can be particularly difficult to diagnose because its symptoms are similar to those of many other illnesses, and major gaps exist in understanding the causes and consequences of lupus. More than half of all people with lupus take four or more years and visit three or more doctors before obtaining a correct diagnosis.

WHEREAS, there has been only one new drug approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration specifically for lupus in 56 years; current treatments for the disease can

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into, this ____ day of _____ 2018, by and between:

CITY OF BOYNTON BEACH, FLORIDA, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Florida, with a business address of 100 East Boynton Beach Boulevard, Florida 33435, hereinafter referred to "CITY,"

and

NAUTICA SOUND, ("Development"), having a business address of Nautica Sound Homeowners Association, Inc., 7000 Chesapeake Circle, Boynton Beach, FL 33435, hereinafter called "ASSOCIATION."

WHEREAS, CITY recognizes that it has full power and jurisdiction to patrol on private property to enforce all of the laws of the nation, state, county and city, duly enacted, excluding those of traffic control and enforcement; and

WHEREAS, ASSOCIATION specifically recognizes the above; and

WHEREAS, ASSOCIATION wishes to grant CITY the authority to exercise jurisdiction for traffic regulation purposes over any private or limited access road or roads of specified private segments of the ASSOCIATION, pursuant to §316.006(b) Florida Statutes;

WITNESSETH:

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and undertakings of the parties hereto, and other good and valuable considerations, the parties hereto covenant and agree, each with the other as follows:

1.0 **Ratification.** The foregoing preamble is hereby ratified and confirmed as true and correct and incorporated herein.

2.0 **Recognition of Jurisdiction.** The ASSOCIATION hereby recognizes the jurisdiction of CITY over any private or limited access road or roads within the property indicated on the map attached hereto as **Exhibit** "A," for traffic control purposes.

3.0 The ASSOCIATION shall provide CITY with a Resolution of the ASSOCIATION attached as **Exhibit "B"**, evidencing the ASSOCIATION's desire for CITY's services hereunder and authorizing the ASSOCIATION, via its President, to enter into this Agreement.

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4.0 **Exercise of Jurisdiction.** The CITY hereby agrees to exercise jurisdiction for traffic control purposes over any private or limited access road or roads within the property within the Development listed on attached **Exhibit "A."**

4.1.The City of Boynton Beach Police Department agrees to provide a minimum base level of traffic enforcement service on all those certain private roads in the Development identified in **Exhibit "A."**

4.2. The level of service provided by the CITY shall be determined solely by the Boynton Beach Chief of Police and shall be based upon the availability of police personnel.

4.3.The Police Department shall choose the hours and days of operation, but these choices shall be based upon information from ASSOCIATION and the observations of the Boynton Beach Police Department and Public Works Department.

5.0 **Signs and Markings.** In order to permit CITY to perform pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, and to ensure appropriate jurisdictional and enforcement authority:

5.1.All traffic control devices on and along the private or limited access roads within the Development identified in **Exhibit "A"** must conform to the requirements contained in the United States Department of Transportation Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for Streets and Highways (the "MUTCD") and CITY Engineering Standards. The determination as to whether signs or other traffic control devices meet the installation requirements and/or conform to the MUTCD and CITY Engineering Standards, shall be made solely by CITY. The CITY may conduct any necessary traffic engineering studies to determine appropriate regulatory traffic control within the ASSOCIATION.

5.2.In the event ASSOCIATION has installed traffic calming devices that do not conform with existing CITY and MUTCD standards, on or along the private or limited access roads within the Development identified in **Exhibit "A,"** such as speed humps and/or speed bumps, ASSOCIATION shall, at its sole expense, cause such devices to be removed within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement if CITY so requests or a traffic engineering study determines that the existing traffic calming devices are not warranted. Further, ASSOCIATION shall not install any traffic calming devices on or along its private or limited access roads during the term of this Agreement without the express written consent of the City of Boynton Beach Public Works Department.

5.3.ASSOCIATION shall purchase and install all signs, signage, posts, pavement markings, and other necessary traffic control, as prescribed by the CITY, as necessary for traffic control purposes. Should CITY determine that traffic-calming measures are appropriate, ASSOCIATION shall incur all costs of designing and installing such measures. ASSOCIATION shall be responsible for maintenance of any traffic control devices and traffic calming measures necessary or desirable for the enforcement of traffic laws.

6.0 **Insurance.** The ASSOCIATION agrees to maintain insurance under its general liability policy for all actions arising out of or in any way connected to this Agreement under minimum policy limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Boynton Beach, 100 E. Boynton Blvd., P.O. Box 310, Boynton Beach, FL 33435" as an Additional Insured and provide proof of insurance upon execution of this Agreement to the City's Risk Management Department.

7.0 **Gated Entrances.** In the event access to any portion of the ASSOCIATION's private or limited access roads is through a gate, ASSOCIATION shall take steps to ensure access by means other than gate codes, such as siren activated gates, Knox Box, or by bar-coding of vehicles, so as to permit uninhibited access by authorized police vehicles and prevent any delay in access to ASSOCIATION property. ASSOCIATION shall provide gate access codes to the Public Works Department for purposes of conducting traffic engineering analyses.

8.0 **Term.** The term of this Agreement shall be five (5) years, effective on the date of execution, provided that either party may terminate this Agreement without penalty upon sixty (60) days notice by notifying the opposite party in writing of its intention to do same.

9.0 **General Law Enforcement Jurisdiction.** ASSOCIATION recognizes the authority of CITY to patrol on private property, including ASSOCIATION's property, to enforce all laws of the nation, state, county and city other than for traffic control purposes, and same is done by Boynton Beach Police Department and other appropriate law enforcement agencies pursuant to law, and not through this or any other Agreement.

10.0 **Notices.** All notices which shall or may be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be in writing and delivered personally or transmitted (a) through the United States mail, by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid; (b) by means of prepaid overnight delivery service; or (c) by facsimile or email transmission, if a hard copy of the same is followed by delivery through the U.S. mail or by overnight delivery service as just described, addressed as follows:

If any provision of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or situation shall to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, and the application of such provisions to persons or situations other than those as to which it shall have been held invalid or unenforceable shall not be affected thereby, and shall continue in full force and effect, and be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

Modification of Agreement. This Agreement may be modified upon mutual 12.0consent of the parties only in writing, and executed with the same dignity herewith.

13.0 Legal Representation. It is acknowledged that each party to this Agreement had the opportunity to be represented by counsel in the preparation of this Agreement and, accordingly, the rule that a contract shall be interpreted strictly against the party preparing same shall not apply due to the joint contribution of both parties.

14.0Binding Authority. Each person signing this Agreement on behalf of either party individually warrants that he or she has full legal power to execute this Agreement on behalf of the party for whom he or she is signing, and to bind and obligate such party with respect to all provisions contained in this Agreement.

15.0 Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Florida, with venue lying in Palm Beach County, Florida.

Additional Terms upon Modification or New Agreement. Nothing herein shall 16.0preclude the parties from modifying this Agreement during the term of such, or, upon completion of the term, entering into another Agreement, to provide for additional or revised terms.



R18-067 - Authorize the City Manager to sign an agreement with Zambelli Fireworks Manufacturing Co. of Boca Raton, FL as a result of RFP No. 007-2710-18/IT for the Fourth of July fireworks displays for the Years 2018, 2019 and 2020 and other additional City events as required for an amount as approved and budgeted by the City Commission for events.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

On March 23, 2018, the RFP for Fireworks Displays was advertised in the legal notices section of the Palm Beach Post and distributed to ninety (96) prospective suppliers via the City's electronic bid management system. The RFP invited Proposers to provide a technical proposal for a Fireworks Display at the following separate price points:

Twenty-thousand Dollars (\$20,000); Twenty-five thousand Dollars (\$25,000); Thirty-five thousand Dollars (\$35,000); Forty-thousand Dollars (\$40,000); Forty-five thousand Dollars (\$45,000); Fifty-thousand Dollars (\$50,000);

The RFP also invited Proposers to provide a separate price for an optional barge that will be placed on the Intracoastal Waterway for the Fourth of July fireworks events.

On April 13, 2018, Procurement Services received and opened one (1) proposals in response to the RFP, which was reviewed by Purchasing Services to ensure the proposal met the RFP requirements. The single proposal from Zambelli Fireworks Manufacturing Co., Inc. indication in their proposal that they could only guarantee the price submitted for the optional barge for the 2018 Fourth of July Event.

An Evaluation Committee consisting of Eleanor Krusell, Public Communications and Marketing Director, Mary DeGraffenreidt, Events and Program Manager, John Durgan, Special Projects Coordinator, and Mara Frederiksen, Deputy Finance Director reviewed and ranked the single proposal. The Evaluation Committee was unanimous in their decision to make a recommendation to City Commission to approve the ranking and award of the subject contract to the number one (1) ranked firm, Zambelli Fireworks Manufacturing Company.

The initial term of the Contract is three (3) years commencing on the date the Agreement is executed by the City and may be renewed for two (2) additional one-year terms at the same terms, conditions, and prices subject to satisfactory performance, vendor acceptance, and determination that renewal will be in the best interest of the City.

The City has organized and contracted for the fireworks display since 2014.

Funding for the event is included in the City's General Fund in the FY 2017/2018 budget.

Actual expenditures for the July 4th fireworks program paid by the City for the previous three year period are as follows:

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into between the City of Boynton Beach, hereinafter referred to as "the City", and **ZAMBELLI FIREWORKS MANUFACTURING CO.** hereinafter referred to as "the Vendor", in consideration of the mutual benefits, terms, and conditions hereinafter specified.

- 1. PROJECT DESIGNATION. The Vendor is retained by the City to perform services in connection with the **RFP FOR FIREWORKS DISPLAYS; RFP No.: 007-2710-18/IT.**
- SCOPE OF SERVICES. Vendor agrees to perform the services, identified in Section II Scope of Services and attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- 3. TIME FOR PERFORMANCE. Work under this agreement shall commence upon written notice by the City to the Vendor to proceed. Vendor shall perform all services and provide all work product required pursuant to this agreement upon written notice to proceed.
- 4. TERM: This Agreement shall be for a period of three (3) years commencing on the date the Agreement is executed by the City. The City of Boynton Beach may extend the contract with the same terms and conditions for two additional, one-year renewal terms subject to vendor acceptance, satisfactory performance and determination that renewal will be in the best interest of the City.
- 5. PAYMENT: If the RFP provides that the City shall compensate the Vendor for services provided by the Vendor, City agrees to pay Vendor, in the manner specified in the RFP, the amounts set forth in Vendor's Response for work actually performed and completed pursuant to the Contract, which amount shall be accepted by the Vendor as full compensation for all such work. It is acknowledged and agreed by Vendor that this amount is the maximum payable and constitutes a limitation upon City's obligation to compensate Vendor for its services related to this Contract. The amount, however, does not constitute a limitation, of any sort, upon Vendor's obligation to perform all items of work required by or which can be reasonably inferred from the Scope of Services. No amount shall be paid to Vendor to reimburse its expenses.

The Vendor's records and accounts pertaining to this agreement are to be kept available for inspection by representatives of the City and State for a period of three (3) years after the termination of the Agreement. Copies shall be made available upon request.

- 6. OWNERSHIP AND USE OF DOCUMENTS. All documents, drawings, specifications and other materials produced by the Firm in connection with the services rendered under this Agreement shall be the property of the City whether the project for which they are made is executed or not. The Firm shall be permitted to retain copies, including reproducible copies, of drawings and specifications for information, reference and use in connection with Firm's endeavors.
- 7. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS. Vendor shall, in performing the services contemplated by this Agreement, faithfully observe and comply with all federal, state and local laws, ordinances and regulations that are applicable to the services to be rendered under this agreement.
- 8. INDEMNIFICATION. Vendor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its offices, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, losses or liability, or any portion

thereof, including fees and costs, arising from injury or death to persons, including injuries, sickness, disease or death to Vendor's own employees, or damage to property occasioned by a negligent act, omission or failure of the Vendor.

9. INSURANCE. The Vendor shall secure and maintain in force throughout the duration of this contract comprehensive general liability insurance with a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 aggregate for personal injury; and \$1,000,000 per occurrence/aggregate for property damage, and professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence to 2 million aggregate with defense costs in addition to limits; workers' compensation insurance, and vehicular liability insurance.

Said general liability policy shall name the City of Boynton Beach as an "additional named insured" and shall include a provision prohibiting cancellation of said policy except upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the City. Certificates of coverage as required by this section shall be delivered to the City within fifteen (15) days of execution of this agreement.

- 10. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. The Vendor and the City agree that the Vendor is an independent contractor with respect to the services provided pursuant to this agreement. Nothing in this agreement shall be considered to create the relationship of employer and employee between the parties hereto. Neither Vendor nor any employee of Vendor shall be entitled to any benefits accorded City employees by virtue of the services provided under this agreement. The City shall not be responsible for withholding or otherwise deducting federal income tax or social security or for contributing to the state industrial insurance program, otherwise assuming the duties of an employer with respect to Vendor, or any employee of Vendor.
- 11. COVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES. The Vendor warrants that he has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a *bona fide* employee working solely for the Vendor, to solicit or secure this contract, and that he has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a *bona fide* employee working solely for the Vendor, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this contract.

For breach or violation of this warranty, the City shall have the right to annul this contract without liability or, in its discretion to deduct from the contract price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or contingent fee.

- 12. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. The Vendor, with regard to the work performed by it under this agreement, will not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, creed, age, sex or the presence of any physical or sensory handicap in the selection and retention of employees or procurement of materials or supplies.
- 13. ASSIGNMENT. The Vendor shall not sublet or assign any of the services covered by this Agreement without the express written consent of the City.
- 14. NON-WAIVER. Waiver by the City of any provision of this Agreement or any time limitation provided for in this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any other provision.

15. TERMINATION.

a. The City reserves the right to terminate this Agreement at any time by giving ten (10) days written notice to the Vendor.

b. In the event of the death of a member, partner or officer of the Vendor, or any of its supervisory personnel assigned to the project, the surviving members of the Vendor hereby agree to complete the work under the terms of this Agreement, if requested to do so by the City. This section shall not be a bar to renegotiations of this Agreement between surviving members of the Vendor and the City, if the City so chooses.

- 16. DISPUTES. Any disputes that arise between the parties with respect to the performance of this Agreement, which cannot be resolved through negotiations, shall be submitted to a court of competent jurisdiction in Palm Beach County, Florida. This Agreement shall be construed under Florida Law.
- 17. NOTICES. Notices to the City of Boynton Beach shall be sent to the following address:

- 18. INTEGRATED AGREEMENT. This agreement, together with attachments or addenda, represents the entire and integrated agreement between the City and the Vendor and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements written or oral. This agreement may be amended only by written instrument signed by both City and Vendor.
- 19. PUBLIC RECORDS. Sealed documents received by the City in response to an invitation are exempt from public records disclosure until thirty (30) days after the opening of the Bid unless the City announces intent to award sooner, in accordance with Florida Statutes 119.07.

The City is public agency subject to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. The Contractor shall comply with Florida's Public Records Law. Specifically, the Contractor shall:

- A. Keep and maintain public records required by the CITY to perform the service;
- B. Upon request from the CITY's custodian of public records, provide the CITY with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in chapter 119, Fla. Stat. or as otherwise provided by law;
- C. Ensure that public records that are exempt or that are confidential and exempt from public record disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and, following completion of the contract, Contractor shall destroy all copies of such confidential and exempt records remaining in its possession once the Contractor transfers the records in its possession to the CITY; and
- D. Upon completion of the contract, Contractor shall transfer to the CITY, at no cost to the CITY, all public records in Contractor's possession All records stored electronically by

Contractor must be provided to the CITY, upon request from the CITY's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the CITY.

EXHIBIT A SCOPE OF SERVICES

A. GENERAL

The awarded Proposer shall be responsible for the successful, timely, and uninterrupted fireworks display at the City's Fourth of July Celebration and other events required by the City. The fireworks displays shall be synchronized to pre-approved music.

Proposer shall provide a list of fireworks, shells, and special effects, required or proposed for the Fireworks Display that meets the terms, conditions, and specifications contained in this RFP. Proposers are required to provide a technical proposal for a Fireworks Display at the <u>following separate price points</u>:

- Twenty-Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00);
- Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00);
- Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00);
- Forty-Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00);
- Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00);
- and Fifty-Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00).

These price points shall be inclusive of all other charges, such as, but not limited to permitting, staffing, and security. <u>The proposer shall also provide a separate price for the optional barge requirement.</u>

B. PERFORMANCE STANDARDS

The Fourth of July displays will be held July 4, 2018, July 4, 2019 and July 4, 2020. Additional display dates, if required, will be determined by City.

The City reserves the right to determine the locations for the additional events (which may/may not include a barge).

The displays shall begin sharply at 9:00 p.m.

The displays shall continue for no less than twenty (20) minutes with no period of time from opening to finale where there is not a display in the air. The time of the display shall not include any opening or closing commentary.

Provide written procedures outlining plans for delivery, set-up, and discharge of fireworks display in response to variable weather at least three (3) weeks prior to display date.

The awarded proposer agrees that should inclement weather be forecasted preventing a fireworks display then such display must be implemented on the next feasible (good weather) agreed upon by both parties and without any deduction in the number of shells without additional costs to the City.

In the event that the fireworks have been prepared, anticipating good weather, and inclement weather prevents igniting, then such display of fireworks must be implemented on the next feasible (good weather) agreed upon by both parties in the best possible manner and without additional costs to the City.

The Fourth of July shows shall be displayed from a barge placed on the Intracoastal Waterway, facing the City's Intracoastal Park and Clubhouse, <u>2240 North Federal</u> <u>Highway, Boynton Beach, FL 33435</u>. The City reserves the right to determine alternative locations for non-Fourth of July events within the corporate limits of the City.

C. REQUIREMENTS

GENERAL

Awarded proposer must furnish all equipment necessary to effectively and safely produce the required fireworks display. Fee must be all inclusive for the fireworks display, including, but not limited to equipment, permitting, security and costs. No other fees will be paid by City.

The City reserves the right to require the awarded proposer to provide a barge option who shall be fully responsible for securing a barge, and all related costs, for displays on the Intracoastal Waterway. The price for a barge shall include all costs including, but not limited to, any required permits, port fees, loading and unloading, security and fuel. The barge must be in the designated fireworks shooting location and fully prepared no later than 6pm. The awarded proposer is responsible for securing the area around the shooting location and will remain in that location until after the event when the City or auxiliary services determines it can be moved safely.

Upon completion of the of the display, all equipment and debris related to the set-up and discharge of fireworks display must be immediately removed after the show, and once safe to do so, including retrieval and removal of any unexploded or defective fireworks, frames, set and lumber. Awarded proposer will be fully responsible for any costs incurred by the City in connection with debris left on the City's property. Awarded proposer shall be responsible for any and all damage to fireworks location due to load-in and load-out.

STAFFING

All fireworks areas utilized must be secured by professional personnel to oversee that equipment and safety is not compromised, at no additional cost to the City.

A representative of the company that is authorized to legally bind and make decisions for the company must be available by phone five (5) days prior to the display date. In the event of an emergency, representative must be on-site within four hours of the emergency. Representative must have radio or phone contact with personnel on the barge (or at designated location for other firework displays).

Each display shall require two (2) professionally pyro-technicians (Display Operators). Operators must be trained, certified and experienced in major electronically fired shows and in the handling, transporting and discharge of fireworks. In addition, the Display Operators must have the appropriate number of assistants to set-up and fire the display.

i. Display Operators and assistants shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age.

- ii. Display Operators shall have experience as a Display Operator in at least five (5) shows equal to, or greater than, the display to be provided to the City of Boynton Beach.
- iii. On-site Display Operators shall be named in the Qualifications Statement. Changes to the Display Operators shall be pre-approved by the City.

CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Observe and comply with all of the current NFPA Code 1123, 1124 and 1126 and any changes to the code enacted during the term of the contract.

File a permit application through the Boynton Beach Fire Rescue Department a minimum of thirty (30) days prior to the display.

Abide by all police, fire, local, state and U.S. Coast Guard and marine patrol requirements, as well as the Federal Aviation Administration. Obtain and provide a copy of all applicable permits and approvals to City at least three (3) weeks prior to the show. Permit costs are the responsibility of the awarded proposer.

Awarded proposer shall obtain, at their expense, all permits required and comply with all federal, state and local ordinances.

Practice the most current and stringent industry safety standards at all times and comply with all applicable laws and regulations.

ACCESS and INSPECTIONS

Awarded proposer must provide the Boynton Beach Fire Rescue with a detailed, finalized shot list including all fireworks to be loaded on the barge, at least three (3) weeks prior to the event.

Fireworks transfer within the City limits is prohibited without the express prior written approval of the City and Boynton Beach Fire Rescue.

The Boynton Beach Fire Rescue shall be permitted to inspect any and all fireworks to be used to determine compliance with all state and local requirements, including NFPA 1123, at any time. Awarded proposer shall correct any safety hazards deemed necessary by Boynton Beach Fire Rescue.

Awarded proposer must be responsible for storage, and all related costs, of fireworks prior to placement on the barge.

Deliver and secure fireworks to the loading area no later than 12:00 p.m. the <u>day before</u> the show.

Provide notification at least forty-eight (48) hours in advance of inventory check, a printed, detailed, itemized, inventory shipping list of all shells shipped for fireworks display. If the display will be on a Sunday or Monday then notification shall be on the Friday prior to the show. Notification must be directed to the Boynton Beach Fire Rescue. Adequate time must be allowed for the Fire Inspector to do the final count and inspection to include photographs.

Provide any variations of the forty-eight (48) hour inventory check of all shells no later than 10:00 a.m. on show day.

All fireworks packages shall be clearly labeled as to size, type, quantity and country of origin and what shells contain multiple projections.

All firework shells utilized must have been tested and assigned "EX" numbers by the appropriate regulatory agency.

Allow total access of contractor operations to the Boynton Beach Fire Rescue at all times of the day at the shot site.

COMMUNICATIONS

Attend one pre-show meeting at City Hall, at least three 3 weeks in advance, that will include load-in and load-out procedures, and City staffing required (e.g., Fire and Police Services), with City Staff and Boynton Beach Fire Rescue at no additional cost to the City. The date and time shall be at the discretion of the City.

Individual representing company, and all Display Operators, shall have a working cellular phone and provide the designated City personnel with the cellular phone number.

If deemed necessary by the City, provide at least six (6) communication radios, at no additional costs to the City, for direct contact between Display Operators (2), Boynton Beach Fire Rescue Office (2), and City Staff (2), for the day of the show beginning with the inventory check. Radio contact must be maintained throughout the day until the show is completed and a basic verbal evaluation is completed.

In the event of any show deviations or misfirings, the awarded proposer shall immediately notify authorized City Staff of the incident. The authorized City staff will be identified in the pre-show meeting(s).

DISPLAY

Displays must begin promptly at 9:00 p.m. local time.

The display shall continue for no less than twenty (20) minutes with no period of time from opening to finale where there is not a display in the air. The time of the display shall not include any opening or closing commentary.

The display shall be synchronized to music. The play list, as well as timing and length of each song segment, shall be sent to the City via an online transfer for pre-approval no later than three (3) weeks prior to the show.

Displays must be put on by using electrical firing only.

The height of all fireworks shall be a minimum of 400 feet and shall not exceed 600 feet.

Fireworks shells must be between three inches (3") and ten inches (10").







In addition, all Lead Technicians must attend and pass a certified American Pyrotechnic Association (APA) training test that encompasses NFPA regulations and general knowledge of all aspect of display fireworks.

Assistants assigned to any crews must also pass in-field and in-classroom examinations to participate in field work.

All Zambelli Fireworks technicians have filled out and passed the ATF Employee Possessor Questionnaire for federal background approval to handle 1.3g explosives.

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TAB 5 – APPROACH AND CAPACITY

i. Although Zambelli has more than 50 full-time staff members nationally to attend to every client need, the City of Boynton Beach benefits by the company having a local office in Boca Raton. The Zambelli Southeast team members both live and work in Palm Beach County. Zambelli Fireworks produces more displays in the County than every other firework companies combined! The dedication to servicing clients is second to none, especially in our home county.

Mike Simmons, Zambelli Project and Operations Manager, will be the primary Zambelli Representative for the City of Boynton Beach July 4th Display. He will be available for preshow logistic and safety meetings with the city staff and is available daily by phone and email.

ii. <u>Safety</u> – There's nothing more important to Zambelli Fireworks than safety. No matter the quality of a display, safety must never be compromised. Our technicians are well versed in the NFPA-1123 requirements. As a company Zambelli Fireworks adheres to a more strict safety distance of 100' per inch of shell diameter over the 70' per inch allowed by NFPA. Based on the 100' per inch distance and the location of the barge the past 5 years, the largest shell that can safely be used in the City's display is 8".

<u>Permitting</u> – All permits and permit fees needed for the July 4th displays will be applied for and paid by Zambelli Fireworks. This includes local Fire permits as well as US Coast Guard and FAA notifications. All documents will be sent to the City two months prior to the July 4th event.

<u>Required Equipment</u> – Zambelli Fireworks always provides all equipment necessary to perform the fireworks display. All equipment is stored and maintained in an ATF approved storage facility near Okeechobee, FL. The technical crew will supply all tools necessary for the construction and deconstruction of the display. The barge will be thoroughly removed of all equipment and debris post-display.

<u>Technicians</u> – Highly trained and certified technicians will be the only crew assigned to the display. These technicians will be equipped with both two-way radios and cell phones. A crew of 4 to 5 technicians will be present. The Senior Technician will be able to bind and make decisions for Zambelli Fireworks.

<u>Music</u> – Music CDs will be prepared and sent to the City for review prior to June 1st each year. Zambelli Fireworks has a Music Producer who produces extremely high quality audio soundtracks. A list of a sample July 4th soundtrack is included below.

<u>Display</u> – As mentioned previously, the program will be a minimum of 20 minutes and will at no time include "Dark skies." Zambelli Fireworks produces displays vivid with colors, sounds, special effects and unique patterns. Please see a list of these styles of shells below.

<u>Post Show</u> – The Zambelli Technician crew will be responsible for all barge cleanup post display. All equipment will be promptly removed from the barge and returned to the storage facility. All paper and debris on the barge will also be cleaned and the barge will be returned in the same condition as when the crew began the setup.



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TAB 6 – TECHNICAL PROPOSAL

Display Overview:

Show Date: July 4, 2018, 2019, 2020

All inclusive Budget and Duration: 20 – 21 minutes, choreographed to music and electrically-fired display. Budget includes a turnkey display.

Insurance Liability Coverage: \$10 Million dollars (per show coverage) for each Fireworks Display. Zambelli uses the highest insurance premium in the industry with "AAA" rated companies.

Permit/Fire Dept: Zambelli Fireworks will secure all needed permits (unless otherwise specified by the City) and organize plans directly with Fire and Safety Authorities.

Transportation Liability Coverage: \$5 Million dollars as required by United States Department of Transportation. (DOT)

Workers Compensation: Pyrotechnicians will meet all of the requirements of the Workers Compensation Laws of Florida.

Transportation: Fireworks and equipment will be delivered by qualified CDL drivers with Haz-Mat endorsed licenses as required by US DOT.

Personnel: Zambelli Certified Pyrotechnicians and Trained Assistants; no subcontractors used.

Safety Procedures: Zambelli Fireworks adheres to all safety regulations. NFPA – 1123, 1124 and 1126 code will be strictly enforced. All state and local regulations will also be strictly enforced.

Program Philosophy

Generally speaking there's an opening segment, main body and grand finale of a fireworks display. Just as a great play or movie has various segments that flow together, firework shows are similar type productions that should never leave the audience wanting more or leaving disappointed.

There are fundamental basics that Zambelli Fireworks adheres to, with which we create the best displays in the industry. Some of these fundamentals include:

- No Dead Air Just as any TV, radio or Big Screen Production, "Dead-Air" is simply not acceptable. At any given time there will be multiple firings of shots and shells in the air for the display.
- Shell Size Combinations A common way for companies to set a show is to shoot all 3 inch shells, then all 4 inch shells, then all 5 inch shells, etc. While this makes it easy for a technician, it is simply boring. Zambelli technicians are trained to set shows to create the ultimate in shell combinations for the various firing sites. For example, firing two 3 inch Gold Kamuro Willow shell (400 ft.) and six 2.5 inch Purple Dahlias is a great, beautiful combination. Firing two 3 inch Pink strobing lights and six 4 inch white strobing lights within seconds offers up to 8 seconds of beautiful strobes covering 200 to 400 ft in the air.
- **Rhythm and Intensity** Just as many movies have a loud, action-packed car chase one moment followed by a romantic scene the next moment, fireworks productions also need to flow. A show that is too fast or too slow can get monotonous. Zambelli designs shows that one moment are a constant barrage of colors and booms while the next moment may be soft horsetail golden willows fluttering down from the sky one-by-one.
- Finales There's a major art to shooting a spectacular finale. Many people think a finale is simply shooting a lot of shells. While true from a quantitative standpoint, a finale must make sense in order to entertain most effectively. Zambelli deigns finales that start slower and lower. For example, 3 inch peony finale shells fired every half-second for 20 seconds may then grow in intensity to include white or silver glittering for the next 20 seconds. Then larger 4 inch blue cracking spiders take over while 5 inch white coconut trees are laying the ground cover for the 6" Long Duration Kamuro's. Finally the 100 3 inch multi-color crossettes are covering the sky while the 3 inch titanium salutes are rumbling the skies for miles.



Details of Proposed Show Segments

OPENING: An opening barrage is designed to attract the attention of the audience and entice them to pay attention..."The show has just begun!" The opening barrage for your event will certainly impress as a barrage of assorted colors, effects, and noise shells fill the night's air.

The purpose of the opener is to impress on your audience that they are about to see something spectacular. A well-designed Zambelli opener will grab the crowd's attention and prepare them for a wonderful fireworks display.

Duration 20-30 seconds

FEATURE PRESENTATION: The main body of the fireworks display should not be just one shell fired one after another. It's about rhythm, timing, and choosing the perfect effects to complement one another to build themes. Some fireworks shells are designed to be extremely intense while others are designed to slow the pace down with beautiful, softer effects. The design team hand picks every display shell used to ensure a wonderful variety of effects. The audience will never see the same combinations of shells fired in a Zambelli production.

Different size shells will be breaking simultaneously throughout the display. This allows us to vary the intensity of the show, but more importantly create beautiful canvases of color and effect in the sky, that stimulate both visually and audibly.

Duration 19 – 20 minutes minimum

BARRAGES OF MULTI-SHOT DEVICES: Multi-shot devices or barrage cakes are used to add to the dynamics of the show. Zambelli Fireworks uses only the highest quality Barrages with innovative effects, colors, and angles. These devices incorporate effect sizes from 1" to 2".



GRAND FINALE: and it will be GRAND!

Human nature is to remember things last experienced. The Grand Finale is what people will remember the most about a fireworks production. A poor finale will leave an audience disappointed. Zambelli Fireworks has a long tradition of supplying the best and biggest finales in the industry. It will be loud, it will be full of vibrant colors, it will be long, and it will leave a lasting impression. Hundreds of shots and effects of multi-color shells, gold and silver sparking lights, gold brocade crown shells and other effects coupled with chest-pounding titaniumsalutes will be the magical ending of the grand display. The finale will be fired from multiple positions with dynamic angles. The incorporated shells, with multiple different sizes and effects, will cover every inch of sky from 150 to 300 ft in the air.

The Finale will be <u>LARGE</u>, but classy. Effects will be fired at angles to light up a larger portion of the sky rather than create an area of overlapping colors. After an intense array of colors, effects, and sounds, the final few seconds of the Display will fire a barrage of gold hanging effects that will linger in the sky well after the last shell breaks.

Duration - 60 to 90 seconds

TOTAL DURATION 20 - 21 minutes minimum

MASTER CONTRACT FOR PRODUCTS AND SERVICES - THE CITY OF KANSAS CITY, MISSOUR!

TITLE/DESCRIPTION: <u>Electrical</u>, <u>Lighting</u>, <u>Data Communications and Security Products and Related</u> <u>Products</u>, <u>Services and Solutions</u>

THIS Contract is between KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI, a constitutionally chartered municipal corporation ("CITY"), and Graybar Electric Company, Inc. ("CONTRACTOR").

Sec. 1. The Contract. The Contract between the CITY and CONTRACTOR consists of the following Contract Documents:

- (a) this Contract;
- (b) CONTRACTOR's Proposal dated October 6, 2017, that is attached hereto and incorporated Into this Contract;
- (c) CITY's RFP No. EV2370 that is incorporated into this Contract by reference;
- (d) any CITY issued Purchase Order;
- (e) any CITY and CONTRACTOR executed Work Order that is incorporated into a CITY issued Purchase Order;
- (f) any and all Attachments and Exhibits attached to the Contract. All documents listed in this Section 1 shall be collectively referred to as the "Contract Documents" and are incorporated into this Contract. CITY and CONTRACTOR agree that the terms "Agreement" and "Contract" and "Contract Documents" are used interchangeably in this Contract and the terms "Agreement" and "Contract" and "Contract Documents" each include all "Contract Documents."

Sec. 2. Initial Term of Contract and Additional Periods.

- (a) Initial Term. The initial term of this Contract shall begin on February 1, 2018, and shall end on January 31, 2023. The Manager of Procurement Services is authorized to enter into an amendment of this Contract with CONTRACTOR to extend the term of this Contract and time of performance for this Contract.
- (b) Renewal Terms. At any time prior to the expiration of the initial term or any subsequent term, the CITY, in its sole discretion, may renew this Contract for up to three (3) additional two (2) year terms.

(c) Transition Term. Notwithstanding the expiration of the initial term or any subsequent term or all options to renew, CONTRACTOR and CITY shall continue performance under this Contract until the CITY has a new contract in place with either CONTRACTOR or another provider or until the CITY terminates the Contract.

Sec. 3. Purchase Orders and Work Orders.

- (a) Purchase Order. CITY shall order all Electrical, Lighting, Data Communications, and Security Products and Related Products, Services and Solutions, (hereinafter "the Products" or "Products and Services" or "Services" depending on the context of the terms used) by means of a Purchase Order issued by the CITY's Manager of Procurement Services for which sufficient funds have been certified and encumbered by the City's Director of Finance. CONTRACTOR shall not provide any "Products" or "Products and Services" or "Services" in excess of the dollar amount contained in any Purchase Order even If there is an executed Work Order between the CITY and CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not be entitled to any payment from CITY in excess of the dollar amount of the Purchase Orders from CITY even if such amount is authorized in a Work Order executed by CITY and CONTRACTOR. All Purchase Orders shall automatically incorporate the Contract and all Contract requirements even if the Contract is not referenced.
- (b) Goods and Products. CONTRACTOR shall timely provide all Goods and Products ordered by the CITY at the Prices set forth in the Contract. The terms "Goods" and "Products" are used interchangeably under this Contract and each term includes the other term.
- (c) Services or Work Orders for both Products and Services.
 - 1. The CITY may request CONTRACTOR to provide Services or both Products and Services. Prior to CONTRACTOR submitting a written detailed Proposal for Services or for both Products and Services to a requesting CITY Department, the CONTRACTOR must obtain written authorization from the CITY's Manager of Procurement Services to submit a Proposal to the CITY Department. CONTRACTOR shall not perform any Services or provide both Services and Products unless the Manager of Procurement Services authorizes CONTRACTOR to provide Services or both Products and Services and all other contractual requirements are met including the Pricing for all Products, Products and Services and Services.
 - 2. Prior to the Manager of Procurement Services authorizing CONTRACTOR to provide Services or both Products and Services to a CITY Department, the Manager of Procurement Services shall:
 - a. Obtain MBE/WBE goals from the CITY's Director of Human Relations if the estimated cost of the Services or Products and Services exceeds the dollar thresholds for MBE/WBE goals and Workforce Goals for MBE/WBE goals;
 - b. Have the CITY's Director of Human Relations determine whether the needed Services are subject to Prevailing Wage requirements and Payment Bond and Performance and Maintenance Bond requirements;

- c. Any other Legal requirements including compliance with the CITY's SLBE requirements
- d. if the CITY's MBE/WBE program requirements are not applicable due to not meeting the dollar thresholds.

If the Manager of Procurement Services authorizes CONTRACTOR to submit a Proposal for Services or for both Products and Services, CONTRACTOR shall submit a detailed Proposal that includes the Scope of Services, the Proposed Schedule, the Price and If applicable, comply with MBE/WBE goals, Prevailing Wage requirements, and Payment Bond and Performance Bond requirements, or SLBE requirements. If the CITY and CONTRACTOR agree to CONTRACTOR's Proposal, the CITY will issue a Purchase Order and Work Order that is executed by the CITY and CONTRACTOR. All Work Orders and Purchase Orders signed by the CITY and CONTRACTOR shall automatically incorporate this Contract (even if the Work Order does not specifically incorporate this Contract).
- (d) CONTRACTOR shall bill the City, in a form acceptable to the City, on the following basis: monthly.

Sec. 4. Effective Date of Contract.

- (a) Notwithstanding Section 2 of this Contract, neither party has any obligation under this Contract until the Manager of Procurement Services issues a Purchase Order which shall be signed by the City's Director of Finance certifying there is a balance, otherwise unencumbered, to the credit of the appropriation to which the expenditure is to be charged, and a cash balance, otherwise unencumbered, in the treasury, to the credit of the fund from which payment will be made, each sufficient to meet the obligation incurred in the Purchase Order.
- (b) The date of the first Purchase Order issued by the CITY is the effective date of this Contract.
- (c) The date of the first Purchase Order issued by the CITY after the CITY renews this Contract shall be the effective date of the renewal term or transition term.

Sec. 5. Involces.

- (a) CONTRACTOR shall submit to CITY a request for payment (hereinafter "Invoice") for services performed in sufficient detail for the CITY to determine that the amount CONTRACTOR is requesting is in fact due and payable.
- (b) CITY shall not pay any Involce from CONTRACTOR unless CONTRACTOR is in compliance with, and not in breach or default of, all terms, covenants and conditions of this Contract. If damages are sustained by CITY as a result of breach or default by CONTRACTOR, CITY may withhold payment(s) to CONTRACTOR for the purpose of set off until such time as the exact amount of damages due to CITY from CONTRACTOR may be determined.

- (c) CITY shall not process CONTRACTOR's Invoice unless CONTRACTOR's Invoice is in proper form, correctly computed, and is approved by CITY as payable under the terms of this Contract.
- (d) CITY is not liable for any obligation incurred by CONTRACTOR except as approved under the provisions of this Contract.
- (e) If CONTRACTOR is required to meet MBE/WBE goals for this Contract, CONTRACTOR shall not submit an Invoice to the City unless CONTRACTOR's Invoice is accompanied by a copy of the most recent 00485.01 M/WBE Monthly Utilization Report submitted by CONTRACTOR to the City's Human Relations Department. CONTRACTOR shall remain current on CONTRACTOR's filing of 00485.01 M/WBE Monthly Utilization Reports. CITY shall not pay CONTRACTOR's Invoice unless CONTRACTOR is current on CONTRACTOR's filing of 00485.01 M/WBE Monthly Utilization Reports.
- (f) Payment terms are net 30 days.

Sec. 6. Representations and Warranties of CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR hereby represents and warrants to the CiTY the following:

- (a) CONTRACTOR is in good standing under the laws of the state of Missourl and each state in which it does business, except any such state where the failure to be in good standing would not have a material adverse effect on CONTRACTOR's ability to perform this Contract in accordance with its terms.
- (b) The execution, delivery and performance by CONTRACTOR of this Contract have been duly authorized by all necessary corporate action and do not and will not (i) require any consent or approval of CONTRACTOR's board of directors; (ii) require any authorization, consent or approval by, or registration, declaration or filing with, or notice to, any governmental department, commission, board, bureau, agency or Instrumentality, or any third party, except such authorization, consent, approval, registration, declaration, filing or notice as has been obtained prior to the date hereof; (iii) violate any provision of any law, rule or regulation or of any order, writ, injunction or decree presently in effect having applicability to CONTRACTOR or its articles or by-laws; and (iv) result in a breach of or constitute a default under any material agreement, lease or instrument to which CONTRACTOR is a party or by which it or its properties may be bound or affected.
- (c) CONTRACTOR shall not enter into any contract for the services to CITY that purports to grant a security interest or right of repossession to any person or entity respecting the services, or any portions thereof or chattels placed thereon.
- (d) There is no litigation, proceeding or other investigation pending or, to the knowledge of CONTRACTOR, threatened against CONTRACTOR which would prevent consummation of the transaction contemplated by this Contract or would have a materially adverse effect on CONTRACTOR.
- (e) CONTRACTOR warrants that all goods and Products are sold free of any security interest and will make available to CITY all transferable warranties (including without limitation

warrantles with respect to Intellectual property infringement) made to CONTRACTOR by the manufacturer of the goods. CONTRACTOR MAKES NO OTHER IMPLIED WARRANTIES, AND SPECIFICALLY MAKES NO IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY OR FITNESS FOR PURPOSE. UNLESS OTHERWISE AGREED IN WRITING BY AN AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE OF SELLER, PRODUCTS SOLD HEREUNDER ARE NOT INTENDED FOR USE IN OR CONNECTION WITH 1) ANY SAFETY APPLICATION OR THE CONTAINMENT AREA OF A NUCLEAR FACILITY, OR 2) IN A HEALTHCARE SITUATION, WHERE THE GOODS HAVE POTENTIAL FOR DIRECT PATIENT CONTACT OR WHERE A SIX (6) FOOT CLEARANCE FROM A PATIENT CANNOT BE MAINTAINED AT ALL TIMES.

(f) Neither party shall be liable for any delay or failure to perform under this Agreement in the event and to the extent that such delay or failure arises out of war, civil commotion, acts of God, accident, fire or water damage, explosion, strikes or lockouts, delay in transportation, legislative action, government regulations or any other event beyond the respective party's reasonable control.

Sec. 7. Survival of the Representations, Warranties and Covenants. All representations, warranties and covenants expressed herein shall survive the execution of this Contract for the benefit of the parties hereto.

Sec. 8. Governing Law. This Contract shall be construed and governed in accordance with the laws of the State of Missouri without giving effect to Missouri's choice of law provisions. The CITY and CONTRACTOR: (1) submit to the jurisdiction of the state and federal courts located in Jackson County, Missouri; (2) waive any and all objections to jurisdiction and venue; and (3) will not raise forum *non conveniens* as an objection to the location of any litigation.

Sec. 9. Termination for Convenience. CITY may, at any time upon fifteen (15) days written notice to CONTRACTOR specifying the effective date of termination, terminate this Contract, in whole or in part.

Sec. 10. Default and Remedies.

- (a) If CONTRACTOR shall be in default or breach of any provision of this Contract, CITY may terminate this Contract, suspend CITY's performance, withhold payment or invoke any other legal or equitable remedy after giving CONTRACTOR ten (10) days written notice and opportunity to cure such default or breach.
- (b) If CITY shall be in default or breach of any provision of this Contract, CONTRACTOR may terminate this contract or suspend CONTRACTOR's performance after giving CITY ten (10) days written notice and opportunity to cure such default or breach.
- (c) CITY's remedies under this Agreement for the purchase of Goods and Products are subject to any limitations contained in manufacturer's terms and conditions to CONTRACTOR, a copy of which will be furnished upon written request. Furthermore, CONTRACTOR's liability shall be limited to either repair or replacement of the goods or Products and refund of the purchase price, all at CONTRACTOR's option, and in no case shall CONTRACTOR be liable for incidental or consequential damage. In addition, claims for shortages, other than loss in transit, must be made in writing not more than five (5) days after receipt of shipment.

The limitation of remedies imposed by this Section is only applicable to Products and Goods provided by CONTRACTOR and this limitation of remedies section is not applicable if CONTRACTOR provides Services or both Products, Goods and Services pursuant to Section 3(c) of this Contract.

Sec. 11. Walver. Walver by CITY of any term, covenant, or condition hereof shall not operate as a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or of any other term, covenant or condition. No term, covenant, or condition of this Contract can be waived except by written consent of CITY, and forbearance or indulgence by CITY In any regard whatsoever shall not constitute a waiver of same to be performed by CONTRACTOR to which the same may apply and, until complete performance by CONTRACTOR of the term, covenant or condition, CITY shall be entitled to invoke any remedy available to it under this Contract or by law despite any such forbearance or indulgence.

Sec. 12. Acceptance. No payment made under this Contract shall be proof of satisfactory performance of the Contract, either wholly or in part, and no payment shall be construed as acceptance of deficient or unsatisfactory services.

Sec. 13. Records.

- (a) For purposes of this Section:
 - 1. "CITY" shall mean the City Auditor, the City's Internal Auditor, the City's Director of Human Relations, the City Manager, the City department administering this Contract and their delegates and agents.
 - 2. "Record" shall mean any document, book, paper, photograph, map, sound recordings or other material, regardless of physical form or characteristics, made or received in connection with this Contract and all Contract amendments and renewals.
- (b) CONTRACTOR shall maintain and retain all Records for a term of five (5) years that shall begin after the expiration or termination of this Contract and all Contract amendments. CITY shall have a right to examine or audit all Records, and CONTRACTOR shall provide access to CITY of all Records upon ten (10) days written notice from the CITY.
- (c) The books, documents and records of CONTRACTOR in connection with this Contract shall be made available to the City Auditor, the City's Internal Auditor, the City's Director of Human Relations and the City department administering this Contract within ten (10) days after the written request is made.

Sec. 14. Affirmative Action. If this Contract exceeds \$300,000.00 and Contractor employs fifty (50) or more people, Contractor shall comply with City's Affirmative Action requirements in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3 of City's Code, the rules and regulations relating to those sections, and any additions or amendments thereto; In executing any Contract subject to said provisions, Contractor warrants that It has an affirmative action program in place and will maintain the affirmative action program in place for the duration of the Contract. Contractor shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, sex, religion, national origin or ancestry, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity or age in a manner prohibited by Chapter 3 of City's Code. Contractor shall:

- (a) Submit, in print or electronic format, a copy of Contractor's current certificate of compliance to the City's Human Relations Department (HRD) prior to receiving the first payment under the Contract, unless a copy has already been submitted to HRD at any point within the previous two (2) calendar years. If, and only if, Contractor does not possess a current certification of compliance, Contractor shall submit, In print or electronic format, a copy of its affirmative action program to HRD prior to receiving the first payment under the Contract, unless a copy has already been submitted to HRD at any point within the previous two (2) calendar years.
- (b) Require any Subcontractor awarded a subcontract exceeding \$300,000.00 to affirm that Subcontractor has an affirmative action program in place and will maintain the affirmative action program in place for the duration of the subcontract.
- (c) Obtain from any Subcontractor awarded a subcontract exceeding \$300,000.00 a copy of the Subcontractor's current certificate of compliance and tender a copy of the same, in print or electronic format, to HRD within thirty (30) days from the date the subcontract is executed. If, and only If, Subcontractor does not possess a current certificate of compliance, Contractor shall obtain a copy of the Subcontractor's affirmative action program and tender a copy of the same, in print or electronic format, to HRD within thirty (30) days from the date the subcontract is executed.

City has the right to take action as directed by City's Human Relations Department to enforce this provision. If Contractor fails, refuses or neglects to comply with the provisions of Chapter 3 of City's Code, then such failure shall be deemed a total breach of this Contract and this Contract may be terminated, canceled or suspended, in whole or in part, and Contractor may be declared ineligible for any further contracts funded by City for a period of one (1) year. This is a material term of this Contract.

Sec. 15. Tax Compliance. If the CITY's payments to CONTRACTOR exceed \$160,000.01 for the period of May 1st through April 30th, CONTRACTOR shall provide proof of compliance with the CITY's tax ordinances administered by the CITY's Commissioner of Revenue as a precondition to the CITY making the first payment under this Contract. CONTRACTOR also shall submit to the CITY proof of compliance with the CITY's tax ordinances administered by the CITY's Commissioner of Revenue as a condition precedent to the CITY making final payment under the Contract.

Sec. 16. Buy American Preference. It is the policy of the CITY that any manufactured goods or commodities used or supplied in the performance of any CITY Contract or any subcontract thereto shall be manufactured or produced in the United States whenever possible.

Sec. 17. Notices. All notices to be given hereunder shall be in writing and may be given, served or made by depositing the same in the United States mail addressed to the party to be notified, postpaid and registered or certified with return receipt requested or by delivering the same in person to such person. Notice deposited in the mail in accordance with the provisions hereof shall be effective unless otherwise stated in such notice or in this Contract from and after the second day next following the date postmarked on the envelope containing such notice. Notice given in any other manner shall be effective only if and when received by the party to be notified. All notices shall be sent to the following addresses:

Sec. 18. General Indemnification.

- (a) For purposes of this Section only, the following terms shall have the meanings listed:
 - 1. Claims means all claims, damages, liability, losses, costs and expenses, court costs and reasonable attorneys' fees, including attorneys' fees incurred by the CITY in the enforcement of this indemnity obligation.
 - 2. CONTRACTOR's Agents means CONTRACTOR's officers, employees, subcontractors, successors, assigns, invitees, and other agents.
 - 3. CITY means CITY, its Agencies, its agents, officials, officers and employees.
- (b) CONTRACTOR's obligations under this Section with respect to indemnification for acts or omissions, including negligence, of CITY, shall be limited to the coverage and limits of insurance that CONTRACTOR is required to procure and maintain under this Contract. CONTRACTOR affirms that it has had the opportunity to recover all costs of the insurance requirements imposed by this Contract in its contract price.
- (c) CONTRACTOR shall defend Indemnify and hold harmless CITY from and against all claims arising out of or resulting from all acts or omissions in connection with this Contract caused in whole or in part by CONTRACTOR or CONTRACTOR's Agents, regardless of whether or not caused in part by any act or omission, including negligence, of CITY. CONTRACTOR is not obligated under this Section to indemnify CITY for the sole negligence of CITY.
- (d) In no event shall the language in this Section constitute or be construed as a walver or limitation of the CITY's rights or defenses with regard to sovereign immunity, governmental

immunity, or other official immunities and protections as provided by the federal and state constitutions or by law.

Sec. 19. Indemnification for Professional Negligence. If this contract is for professional services, CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, and hold harmless CITY and any of its agencies, officials, officers, or employees from and against all claims, damages, liability, losses, costs, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, arising out of any negligent acts or omissions in connection with this Contract, caused by CONTRACTOR, its employees, agents, subcontractors, or caused by others for whom CONTRACTOR is liable, in the performance of professional services under this Contract. CONTRACTOR is not obligated under this Section to indemnify CITY for the negligent acts of CITY or any of its agencies, officials, officers, or employees.

Sec. 20. Insurance.

- (a) CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain in effect throughout the term of this Contract insurance policies with coverage not less than the types and amounts specified in this Section. CONTRACTOR must have:
 - 1. Commercial General Liability Insurance Policy: with limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate, written on an "occurrence" basis. The policy shall be written or endorsed to include the following provisions:
 - a. Severability of interests Coverage applying to Additional Insureds
 - b. Contractual Liability
 - c. Per Project Aggregate Liability Limit or, where not available, the aggregate limit shall be \$2,000,000.
 - d. No Contractual Llability Limitation Endorsement
 - e. Additional Insured Endorsement, ISO form CG20 10, current edition, or its equivalent.
 - 2. Workers' Compensation Insurance and Employers Liability Policies as required by Missouri law.
 - 3. Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance Policy: with a limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, covering owned, hired, and non-owned automobiles. The Policy shall provide coverage on an "any auto" basis and on an "occurrence" basis. This insurance policy will be written on a Commercial Business Auto form, or acceptable equivalent, and will protect against claims arising out of the operation of motor vehicles, as to acts done in connection with the Contract, by CONTRACTOR.
 - 4. If this Contract is for professional services, CONTRACTOR shall obtain Professional Liability Insurance with limits per claim and annual aggregate of \$1,000,000.
- (b) All insurance pollcles required in this Section shall provide that the pollcy will not be canceled until after the Insurer provides the CITY ten (10) days written notice of cancellation in the event that the cancellation is for CONTRACTOR's nonpayment of premiums and thirty (30) days written notice of cancellation to CITY for all other reasons of cancellation.

- (c) The Commercial General and Automobile Liability Insurance Policies specified above shall provide that CITY and its agencies, agents, officials, officers, and employees, while acting within the scope of their authority, will be named as additional insureds for the services performed under this Contract. CONTRACTOR shall provide to CITY at execution of this Contract a certificate of insurance showing all required endorsements and additional insureds.
- (d) All insurance policies must be provided by Insurance Companies that have an A.M. Best's rating of "A-V" or better, and are licensed or approved by the State of Missouri to provide insurance in Missouri.
- (e) Regardless of any approval by CITY, CONTRACTOR shall maintain the required insurance coverage in force at all times during the term of this Contract. CONTRACTOR's failure to maintain the required insurance coverage will not relieve CONTRACTOR of its contractual obligation to indemnify the CITY pursuant to this Section of this Contract. In the event CONTRACTOR fails to maintain the required insurance coverage in effect, CITY may declare CONTRACTOR in default.
- (f) In no event shall the language in this Section constitute or be construed as a waiver or limitation of the CITY's rights or defenses with regard to sovereign immunity, governmental immunity, or other official immunities and protections as provided by the federal and state constitutions or by law.

Sec. 21. Interpretation of the Contract.

- CITY selected CONTRACTOR through a negotiated procurement process rather than an (a) Invitation for Bids (IFB) solicitation. Unlike the IFB, this process allows the CITY and CONTRACTOR to discuss and negotiate a contract at arm's length prior to entering a final contract that is acceptable to both the CITY and the CONTRACTOR. After negotiation and discussion, CONTRACTOR and CITY have incorporated multiple documents into this Agreement and the meaning of some of the words used in the Agreement may be uncertain, incomplete or duplicative and the Agreement may promise something at one place and take that promise away at another. In sum, the Agreement may contain words and provisions that are susceptible of more than one meaning so that reasonable persons of average Intelligence may fairly and honestly differ in their construction of the words and provisions. It is the intent of the CITY and the CONTRACTOR that the CITY's taxpayers receive the benefit or advantage in the construction and interpretation of this Agreement, regardless of the normal judicial rules of contract construction even if the construction and interpretation of the Agreement will cost the CONTRACTOR more money and time. CITY and CONTRACTOR agree that CITY's Manager of Procurement Services shall, in cooperation with a representative of supplier, resolve all disagreements as to the meaning of this Agreement or any ambiguity in this Agreement. The decision of CITY's Manager of Procurement shall be final and conclusive if all parties have acted in good faith.
- (b) CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that the CITY has provided CONTRACTOR with an opportunity to have CONTRACTOR's attorney review and advise CONTRACTOR on the Agreement and any potential ambiguities or areas of disagreement and the potential

adverse legal consequences of CONTRACTOR agreeing to this Section as well as the entire Agreement.

- (c) CONTRACTOR certifies that CONTRACTOR has either (1) waived its right to have CONTRACTOR's attorney review this Section and Agreement; or (2) CONTRACTOR has consulted with an attorney on this Section and Agreement.
- (d) CONTRACTOR knowingly and voluntarily agrees to this Section, as amended, and the entire Agreement. CONTRACTOR certifies that this contract was not procured by fraud, duress or undue influence.

Sec. 22. Contract Execution. This Contract may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which will be deemed an original copy of this Contract and all of which, when taken together, will be deemed to constitute one and the same Contract. This Contract shall be effective upon the execution of counterparts by both parties, notwithstanding that both parties may not sign the same counterpart. The parties' signatures transmitted by facsimile or by other electronic means shall be proof of the execution of this Contract and shall be acceptable in a court of law.

Sec. 23. Guaranteed Lowest Pricing. CONTRACTOR certifies that this Contract contains CONTRACTOR's lowest and best pricing for all services supplied by CONTRACTOR to any government, governmental entity, political subdivision, city, state, school district or any other public entity in the United States as of the date of this Contract. CONTRACTOR represents that the prices set for herein are not less favorable than those currently extended to any other similarly situated government, governmental entity, political subdivision, city, state, school district or other public entity customer, for the same goods, in equal or seller quantities, as part of similar market basket, and under similar terms.

Sec. 24. Assignability and Subcontracting.

- (a) Assignability. Contractor shall not assign or transfer any part or all of Contractor's obligation or Interest in this Contract without prior written approval of City. If Contractor shall assign or transfer any of its obligations or interests under this Contract without the City's prior written approval, it shall constitute a material breach of this Contract. This provision shall not prohibit contractor from subcontracting as otherwise provided for herein.
- (b) Subcontracting. Contractor shall not subcontract any part or all of Contractor's obligations or interests in this Contract unless the subcontractor has been identified in a format required by City. If Contractor shall subcontract any part of Contractor's obligations or interests under this Contract. The utilization of subcontractors shall not relieve Contractor of any of its responsibilities under the Contract, and Contractor shall remain responsible to City for the negligent acts, errors, omissions or neglect of any subcontractor, and to require that any subcontractor cease working under this Contract. City's right shall be exercisable in its sole and subjective discretion. City shall not be obligated to pay or be liable for payment of any monies which may be due to any subcontractor. Contractor shall include in any subcontract a requirement that the subcontractor comply with all requirements of this Contract in performing Contractor complete.

Sec. 25. Professional Services – Conflict of Interest Certification. If this Contract is for professional services other than for medical doctors or appraisers, CONTRACTOR certifies that CONTRACTOR is not an expert witness for any party in litigation against the CITY at the time of the issuance of this Contract.

Sec. 26. Minority and Women's Business Enterprises.

- (a) CONTRACTOR shall assist City Certified Minority Business Enterprises (MBEs), City Certified Woman Business Enterprises (WBEs) and City Certified Small Local Business Enterprises (SLBEs) grow, develop, and prosper in the public sector by implementation of the requirements of this Section.
- (b) CONTRACTOR shall provide the same U.S. Communities national discounted pricing received by the City to City Certified MBEs, WBEs and SLBEs when City Certified MBEs, WBEs, and SLBEs bid or submit a proposal on City of Kansas City, Missouri Construction or Maintenance Solicitations and other public sector Construction and Maintenance Solicitations to allow City Certified MBEs, WBEs, and SLBEs, to incorporate the same National Discounted U.S. Communities pricing received by the City in their bids and proposals to the City and other public entities and save the taxpayers money.

Sec. 27. Employee Eligibility Verification. CONTRACTOR shall execute and submit an affidavit, in a form prescribed by the CITY, affirming that CONTRACTOR does not knowingly employ any person in connection with the contracted services who does not have the legal right or authorization under federal law to work in the United States as defined in 8 U.S.C. §1324a(h)(3). CONTRACTOR shall attach to the affidavit documentation sufficient to establish CONTRACTOR's enrollment and participation in an electronic verification of work program operated by the United States Department of Homeland Security to verify information of newly hired employees, under the Immigration and Reform and Control Act of 1986. CONTRACTOR may obtain additional information about E-Verify and enroll at https://e-verify.uscis.gov/enroll/StartPage.aspx?JS=YES. For those CONTRACTORs enrolled in E-Verify, the first and last pages of the E-Verify Memorandum of Understanding that CONTRACTOR will obtain upon successfully enrolling in the program shall constitute sufficient documentation for purposes of complying with this section. CONTRACTOR shall submit the affidavit and attachments to the CITY prior to execution of the contract, or at any point during the term of the contract if requested by the CITY.

Sec. 28. Emergencies.

- (a) Disaster means any large scale event such as an act of terrorism, fire, wind, flood, earthquake or other natural or man-made calamity which results in, or has the potential to result in a significant loss of life or property.
- (b) During and after a disaster, CONTRACTOR shall provide special services to the CITY including CONTRACTOR shall open CONTRACTOR's facilities even on nights and weekends as necessary to meet the needs of the City during a disaster.
- (c) CONTRACTOR shall not charge CITY any fee for opening facilities during an emergency or for extending CONTRACTOR's hours of operation during a disaster. CITY shall pay CONTRACTOR the agreed upon contract prices for all purchases made by CITY during the

disaster and CONTRACTOR shall not charge CITY any additional mark-up, fee or cost for any purchases made by CITY during a disaster.

- (d) CONTRACTOR shall quickly mobilize CONTRACTOR's internal and external resources to assist CITY when a disaster unfolds.
- (e) Extended hours and personnel. During disasters, CONTRACTOR's facilities shall stay open 24 hours if requested by the CITY. CONTRACTOR shall utilize additional CONTRACTOR personnel to take CITY orders if necessary. CONTRACTOR's Call Center shall accept phone orders 24 hours a day.
- (f) CONTRACTOR shall have contingency plans with CONTRACTOR's suppliers to provide additional supplies and equipment quickly to CITY as needed.
- (g) CONTRACTOR shall cooperate with CITY to properly document any and all expenses incurred by CITY with CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR shall assist CITY in meeting any and all documentation requirements of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Sec. 29. Time of Delivery. Delivery is required to be made in accordance with the schedule shown in the solicitation and purchase order.

Sec. 30. F.O.B. Destination. All deliveries of Products shall be F.O.B. Destination and all freight charges are included in the Purchase Price charged by CONTRACTOR to the CITY.

- (a) The proposed pricing applies to normally stocked Graybar materials. Discounts offered are based on the Graybar List Price or Cost In effect at time of order.
- (b) Standard delivery policy provides customers with next day service, free of charge, for materials stocked in the branch and within the standard service area.
- (c) Orders requiring same-day or expedited next-day service, non-stock items, special order or special handling and materials obtained from other Graybar warehouses or manufacturers, may include shipping or handling charges. Any shipping, handling or other costs will be negotilated at time of order.

Sec. 31. Quality. All Products shall be new, in current production, and the best of their kind. When applicable, parts and maintenance shall be reasonably available. New equipment that is obsolete or technically outdated is not acceptable. Remanufactured or reconditioned items are not considered new. Items shall be properly packaged, packed, labeled, and identified in accordance with commercial standards acceptable to the trade and as required by ICC and other federal and state regulations. Packing slips will accompany the shipment.

Sec. 32. Brand Name or Equal. Whenever the name of the manufacturer or the supplier is mentioned on the face hereof and the words "or equal" do not follow, it shall be deemed that the words "or equal" shall follow such designations unless the face hereof specifies "no substitutions". The CITY may assume that items submitted are equal or it may request samples and proof thereof and unless approved before shipment, reserves right to return at the CONTRACTOR'S expense all items that are not acceptable as

equals, said items to be replaced by the CONTRACTOR with satisfactory items at the original submitted price.

Sec. 33. Commercial Warranty. The CONTRACTOR agrees that the Products and Services furnished under this Contract shall be covered by the most favorable commercial warranties the CONTRACTOR gives to any customer for such supplies or services and that the rights and remedies provided herein are in addition to and do not limit any rights afforded to the CITY by any other clause of this contract. CONTRACTOR represents that the warranties set forth herein are not less favorable than those currently extended to any other similarly situated government, governmental entity, political subdivision, city, state, school district or other public entity customer, for the same goods, in equal or less quantities, as part of the similar market basket, and under similar terms.

Sec. 34. Sellers invoice. Invoices shall be prepared and submitted in duplicate to address shown on the purchase order. Separate invoices are required for each purchase order. Invoices shall contain the following information: purchase order number, item number, description of supplies or services, sizes, unit of measure, quantity, unit price, and extended totals.

Sec. 35. Inspection and Acceptance. Inspection and acceptance will be at destination unless specified otherwise, and will be made by the CITY department shown in the shipping address or other duly authorized representative of the CITY. Until delivery and acceptance, and after any rejection, risk of loss will be on the CONTRACTOR unless loss results from negligence of the CITY. CONTRACTOR will be notified of rejected shipments. Unless agreed otherwise, items will be returned freight collect.

Sec. 36. Loss and Damaged Shipments. Risk of loss or damage to items prior to the time of their receipt and acceptance by the CITY is upon the CONTRACTOR. The CITY has no obligation to accept damaged shipments and reserves the right to return at CONTRACTOR's expense damaged merchandise even though the damage was not apparent or discovered until after receipt of the items.

Sec. 37. Late Shipments. CONTRACTOR is responsible to notify the CITY department receiving the items and the Senior Buyer of any late or delayed shipments. The CITY reserves the right to cancel all or any part of an order if the shipment is not made as promised.

Sec. 38. Tax Exemption - Federal and State.

- (a) The CITY is exempt from Federal Excise and Transportation taxes on purchases under Chapter 32, Internal Revenue Code. The federal tax registration number issued by the St. Louis District Director on November 11, 1974 is No. 43740340K.
- (b) The CITY is exempt from payment of Missouri Sales and Use Tax in Accordance with Section 39(10) Article 3, of the Missouri Constitution and Sections 144.040 and 144.615 RSMo 1969 and supplement thereto. A copy of the exemption from Missouri Sales and Use Tax is available upon request.

Sec. 39. Annual Appropriation of Funds.

(a) Multi-year term supply and service contracts and leases and the exercise of options to renew term contracts are subject to annual appropriation of funds by the City Council. Payments made under term contracts and leases are considered items of current expense. Purchase orders are

funded when issued, therefore are current expense items and are not subject to any subsequent appropriation of funds.

(b) In the event sufficient funds are not appropriated for the payment of lease payments or anticipated term contract payments required to be paid in the next occurring lease or contract term and if no funds are legally available from other sources, the lease or contract may be terminated at the end of the original term or renewal term and the CITY shall not be obligated to make further payments beyond the then current original or renewal term. The CITY will provide notice of its inability to continue the lease or contract at such time as the Manager of Procurement Services is aware of the nonappropriation of funds; however, failure to notify does not renew the term of lease or contract. If a lease is cancelled, the events of default will occur as described in the lease and/or the section titled TERMINATION FOR DEFAULT. The CITY has no monetary obligations in event of termination or reduction of a term contract since such contracts represent estimated quantities and are not funded as a contract, but only to the extent of purchase orders issued.

Sec. 40. Performance and Maintenance Bond and Payment Bond.

- (a) If a Work Order is estimated to exceed \$50,000.00 and is for the erection, construction, alteration, repair or improvement of any building, road, street, public utility or other public facility owned by the public entity as defined by Section 107.170, RSMo, CONTRACTOR shall obtain a performance and maintenance bond and payment bond as required by this Section. The City approved performance and maintenance bond and payment bond are incorporated in this Contract by reference and Contractor shall require its Surety to issue the performance and maintenance bonds on City approved forms.
- (b) All Bonds shall be executed by such sureties as are named in the current list of "Companies Holding Certificates of Authority as Acceptable Sureties on Federal Bonds and as Acceptable Reinsuring Companies" as published in Circular 570 (amended) by the Financial Management Service, Surety Bond Branch, U.S. Department of the Treasury. A certified copy of such agent's authority to act must accompany all Bonds signed by an agent. If the surety on any Bond furnished by Seller is declared bankrupt or becomes insolvent, or its right to do business is terminated in any state where any part of the Project is located or it ceases to meet the requirement of the preceding sentence, Seller shall within twenty (20) days thereafter substitute another Bond and surety, both of which must be acceptable to City.
- (c) The performance and maintenance bond and payment bond shall remain in effect at least one (1) year after the date when final payment becomes due, except as provided otherwise by Laws or Regulations or by the Contract Documents.
- (d) All Bonds required by the Contract Documents to be purchased and maintained by CONTRACTOR shall be obtained from surety that is duly licensed in the State of Missouri and in the Jurisdiction in which the Project is located, if not in Missouri, to issue Bonds. All surety companies shall hold an A.M. Best rating of B+, V, or better.
- (e) If the surety on any Bond furnished by Contractor is declared bankrupt or becomes insolvent, or its right to do business is terminated in any state where any part of the Project is located or it ceases to meet the requirement of Paragraph 5.01 B, Contractor shall within twenty (20) days thereafter substitute another Bond and surety, both of which must be acceptable to City.

Sec. 41. Prevailing Wage.

- A. Prevailing Wage. If a Work Order includes work that requires payment of prevailing wage as set forth in Sections 290.210 to 290.340, RSMo (the "Law"), CONTRACTOR shall pay workers prevailing wage in accordance with this Section and the Law. Under the Law, work that meets the definition of "construction" "includes construction, reconstruction, improvement, enlargement, alteration, painting and decorating, or major repair." "Maintenance work that is not subject to the Law is defined as "the repair, but not the replacement, of existing facilities when the size, type or extent of the existing facilities is not thereby changed or increased."
 - 1. Contractor shall comply and require its Subcontractors to comply with;
 - a. Sections 290.210 to 290.340, RSMo the State of Missouri Prevailing Wage Law (the "Law"); and
 - b. 8 CSR 30-3.010 to 8 CSR 30-3.060, the Prevailing Wage Law Rules (the "Rules"); and
 - c. the Annual Wage Order (Wage Order) issued by the State of Missouri's Department of Labor and Industrial Relations; and
 - d. any applicable Annual incremental Wage Increase (Wage Increase) to the Annual Wage Order.
 - 2. The Law, Rules, Wage Order and any Wage Increase are incorporated into and made part hereof this Contract and shall be collectively referred to in this Section as the "Prevailing Wage Requirements." In the event this Contract is renewed for an additional term, the Wage Order In effect as of the commencement date of the additional term, as amended by any applicable Wage Increase, shall be deemed incorporated herein and shall apply to and remain in effect for the duration of the additional term. The new Wage Order and any applicable Wage Increase shall govern notwithstanding the fact that the Wage Order being replaced might be physically attached to this Contract.
 - 3. Contractor shall pay and require its Subcontractors to pay to all workers performing work under this Contract not less than the prevailing hourly rate of wages for the class or type of work performed by the worker in accordance with the Law, Rules, Wage Order and any applicable Wage Increase. Contractor shall take whatever steps are necessary to insure that the prevailing hourly wage rates are paid and that all workers for Contractor and each of its Subcontractors are paid for the class or type of work performed by the worker in accordance with the Prevailing Wage Requirements.
 - 4. Prior to each of its Subcontractors beginning Work on the Site, Contractor shall require each Subcontractor to complete City's Form 00490 entitled "Pre-contract Certification" that sets forth the Subcontractor's prevailing wage and tax compliance history for the two (2) years prior to the bid. Contractor shall retain one (1) year and make the Pre-contract Certifications available to City within five (5) days after written request.
 - 5. Contractor shall keep and require each of its Subcontractors engaged in the construction of public works in performance of the Contract to keep full and accurate records on City's forms. Contractor shall:
 - a. Keep and require each of its Subcontractors engaged in the construction of public works In performance of the Contract to keep full and accurate records on City's "Daily Labor Force Report" Form indicating the worker's name, occupational title or classification group and skill and the workers' hours. City shall furnish blank copies of the Daily Labor

Force Report Form to Contractor for its use and for distribution to Subcontractors. Contractor shall submit its and its Subcontractors Daily Labor Force Reports to City each day; and

- b. Submit, and require each of its Subcontractors engaged in the construction of public works in performance of the Contract to submit, electronically, in a format prescribed by the City, Certified Payroll Report Information indicating the worker's name, address, social security number, occupation(s), craft(s) of every worker employed in connection with the public work together with the number of hours worked by each worker and the actual wages paid in connection with the Project and other pertinent information as requested by the City; and
- c. Submit, and require each of its Subcontractors engaged in the construction of public works in performance of the Contract to submit, electronically, in format prescribed by the City, a Payroll Certification. The Payroll Certification must be signed by the employee or agent who pays or supervises the payment of the workers employed under the Contract for the Contractor and each Subcontractor.

The Dally Labor Force Report, documents used to compile information for the Certified Payroll Report, and Payroll Certification are collectively referred to in this Section as the "Records."

- 6. Contractor shall make all of Contractor's and Subcontractors' Records open to inspection by any authorized representatives of City and the Missouri Department of Labor and Industrial Relations at any reasonable time and as often as they may be necessary and such Records shall not be destroyed or removed from the State of Missouri for a period of one (1) year following the completion of the public work in connection with which the Records are made. Contractor shall have its and its Subcontractors Certified Payroll Reports and Payroll Certifications available at the Contractor's office and shall provide the Records to the City electronically at City's sole discretion. In addition, all Records shall be considered a public record and Contractor shall provide the Records to the City within three (3) working days of any request by City at the Contractor's cost. City, in its sole discretion, may require Contractor to send any of the Records directly to the person who requested the Record at Contractor's expense.
- 7. Contractor shall post and keep posted a clearly legible statement of all prevailing hourly wage rates to be paid to all workers employed by Contractor and each of its Subcontractors in the performance of this Contract In a prominent and easily accessible place at the Site of the Work by all workers.
- 8. If the Contract Price exceeds \$250,000.00, Contractor shall and shall require each Subcontractor engaged in any construction of public works to have its name, acceptable abbreviation or recognizable logo and the name of the city and state of the mailing address of the principal office of the company, on each motor vehicle and motorized self-propelled plece of equipment which is used in connection with the Project during the time the Contractor or Subcontractor is engaged on the project. The sign shall be legible from a distance of twenty (20') feet, but the size of the lettering need not be larger than two (2") inches. In cases where equipment is leased or where affixing a legible sign to the equipment is impractical, the Contractor may place a temporary stationary sign, with the information required pursuant to this section, at the main entrance of the Project in place of affixing the required information on the equipment so long as such sign is not in violation of any state or federal statute, rule or regulation. Motor vehicles which are required to have similar

Information affixed thereto pursuant to requirements of a regulatory agency of the state or federal government are exempt from the provisions of this subsection.

- 9. Contractor must correct any errors in Contractor's or any Subcontractors' Records, or Contractor's or any Subcontractors' violations of the Law, Rules, Annual Wage Order and any Wage Increase within fourteen (14) calendar days after notice from City.
- 10. Contractor shall and shall require its Subcontractors to cooperate with the City and the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations in the enforcement of this Section, the Law, Rules, Annual Wage Order and any Wage Increase. Contractor shall and shall require its Subcontractors to permit City and the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to Interview any and all workers during working hours on the Project at Contractor's sole cost and expense.
- 11. Contractor shall file with City, upon completion of the Project and prior to final payment therefore, affidavits from Contractor and each of its Subcontractors, stating that each has fully complied with the provisions and requirements of the Missouri Prevailing Wage Law. City shall not make final payment until the affidavits, in proper form and order, from Contractor and each of its Subcontractors, are filed by Contractor.
- 12. Contractor shall forfeit as a statutory penalty to the City one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each worker employed, for each calendar day, or portion thereof, such worker is paid less than the prevailing hourly rates for any work done under this Contract, by Contractor or by any of Contractor's Subcontractors. If Contractor or any of its Subcontractors have violated any section(s) of 290.210 to 290.340, RSMo, in the course of the execution of the Contract, City shall when making payments to the Contractor becoming due under this Contract, withhold and retain therefrom all sums and amounts due and owing as a result of any violation of sections 290.210 to 290.340, RSMo.
- B. Prevailing Wage Damages. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that, based on the experience of City, violations of the Missouri Prevailing Wage Act, whether by Contractor or its Subcontractors, commonly result in additional costs to City. Contractor agrees that additional costs to City for any particular violation are difficult to establish and include but are not limited to: costs of construction delays, additional work for City, additional interest expenses, investigations, and the cost of establishing and maintaining a special division working under the City Manager to monitor prevailing wage compliance.
 - 1. In the event of the fallure by Contractor or any of its Subcontractors to pay wages as provided in the Missouri Prevailing Wage Act, City shall be entitled to deduct from the Contract Price, and shall retain as liquidated damages, one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day, per worker who is paid less than the prevailing hourly rate of wages, to approximate the additional costs. The sum shall be deducted, paid or owed whether or not the Contract Times have expired.
 - 2. City shall give written notice to Contractor setting forth the workers who have been underpaid, the amount of the statutory penalty and the amount of the liquidated damages as provided for in this Subparagraph. Contractor shall have fourteen (14) calendar days to respond, which time may be extended by City upon written request. If Contractor fails to respond within the specified time, the City's original notice shall be deemed final. If Contractor responds to City's notice, City will furnish Contractor a final decision in writing within five (5) days of completing any investigation.

- C. Excessive Unemployment.
 - Resident Laborers" means laborers who have been residents of the State of Missouri for at least thirty days and who intend to remain Missouri residents, and residents of Nonrestrictive States.
 - "Nonrestrictive States" means states identified by the Missouri Department of Labor and Industrial Relations Division of Labor Standards that have not enacted state laws restricting Missouri laborers from working on public works projects. A list of Nonrestrictive States can be found on the Division web site at <u>http://www.dolir.mo.gov/is/index.htm</u>.
 - 3. A period of Excessive Unemployment is declared when the Missouri Department of Labor and Industrial Relations Division of Labor Standards provides notice of such declaration. When in effect, notice will be provided on the Division web site at <u>http://www.dolir.mo.gov/ls/index.htm</u>. It is Contractor's obligation to determine whether a period of Excessive Unemployment is in effect when this Contract Is let.
 - 4. Contractor agrees to follow the provisions of Section 290.560 290.575 RSMo and agrees that if a period of Excessive Unemployment has been declared at any point during the term of this Contract, it will employ and require all Subcontractors of whatever tier to employ only Resident Laborers for the Work to be performed under this Contract. Provided, however, Contractor may use laborers who are not Resident Laborers when Resident Laborers are not available or are incapable of performing the particular type of work involved if Contractor so certifies in writing to City and City issues a written approval. This provision does not apply to regularly employed nonresident executive, supervisory or technical employees.

Sec. 42. Workforce. If Contractor is required to pay prevailing wages for the work performed pursuant to this Contract, Contractor agrees to comply with all requirements of City's Construction Employment Program as enacted in City's Code, Sections 3-501 through 3-525 and as hereinafter amended. Contractor shall meet or exceed the construction employment goals unless the same shall have been waived in the manner provided by law. Contractor's compliance with this provision is a material part of this Contract.

Contractor shall comply with City's Workforce Program Reporting System requirements. Contractor shall use City's Internet web based Workforce Program Reporting System provided by City and protocols included in that software during the term of this Contract. Contractor shall maintain user applications to City's provided system for all applicable personnel and shall require subcontractors to maintain applications.

REQUESTED ACTION BY COMMISSION: Approve utilizing the City of Bartow, FL Bid No. WD-2018-04 with American Water Chemicals, Inc. of Plant City, FL for Corrosion Inhibitor AWC A-782 for an estimated annual cost of \$40,000. The City of Bartow's procurement process satisfies the City's competitive bid requirements.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST: Bid Term Extension: April 13, 2018 - April 12, 2019

The Utility utilizes a corrosion inhibitor to prevent problems in the water distribution system pipework, in particular with both lead and copper. A small quantity of corrosion inhibitor is added to the water to provide a protective coating preventing leaching of these metals into the water supply. The Utility regularly performs testing of the water form customers homes to measure the efficiency of this system. We have always had good results. One such test is currently underway.

The Utility is seeking consent to piggyback a recently bid contract by the City of Barton which will enable the continued use of the same inhibitor that has been working satisfactorily heretofore. The original bid term was April 13, 2017 to April 12, 2018, the City of Bartow has extended the bid for the time period April 13, 2018 to April 12, 2019.

The previous years expenses were: FY 16/17 \$34,875 FY 15/16 \$31,500 FY 14/15 \$36,000

Technical Specifications for Calciquest 25/75

- 1. General Conditions
 - 1.1 The material to be provided under this specification shall be Calciquest 25/75 or equivalent, approved for potable water treatment, and listed/certified under the National Sanitation Foundation NSF Standard Number 60 and AWWA ["]Standard for Zinc Orthophosphate, AWWA B506 latest revision, and shall meet the requirements contained within these specifications.
- 2. Product Specifications
 - 2.1 This material shall contain no substances in quantities capable of producing injurious effects to public health or water quality. Calciquest 25/75 is a stabilized blend of long chain phosphates. The formula is proprietary to CalciQuest Inc.
- 3. Quality Control and Testing
 - 3.1 Sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA and ANSI/NSF Standard 60 specifications current revisions.
 - 3.2 The supplier of Calciquest 25/75 shall furnish unopened, new 55 gallon drums of Calciquest 25/75 as filled at the manufacturer.
 - 3.3 The Purchaser, at his option, will test and analyze a weekly composite sample of the material delivered. The major tests will be for minimum percentage of phosphate content, polyphosphate content, and orthophosphate content.

- 1. General Conditions
 - 1.1 The material to be provided under this specification shall be Calciquest 25/75 or equivalent, approved for potable water treatment, and listed/certified under the National Sanitation Foundation NSF Standard Number 60 and AWWA "Standard for Zinc Orthophosphate, AWWA B506 latest revision, and shall meet the requirements contained within these specifications.
- 2. Product Specifications
 - 2.1 This material shall contain no substances in quantities capable of producing injurious effects to public health or water quality. Calciquest 25/75 is a stabilized blend of long chain phosphates. The formula is proprietary to CalciQuest Inc.
- 3. Quality Control and Testing
 - 3.1 Sampling and testing shall be conducted in accordance with all AWWA and ANSI/NSF Standard 60 specifications current revisions.
 - 3.2 The supplier of Calciquest 25/75 shall furnish unopened, new 55 gallon drums of Calciquest 25/75 as filled at the manufacturer.
 - 3.3 The Purchaser, at his option, will test and analyze a weekly composite sample of the material delivered. The major tests will be for minimum percentage of phosphate content, polyphosphate content, and orthophosphate content.

REQUESTED ACTION BY COMMISSION: Authorize the purchase of a 28" trailer and outfit in the amount of \$40,816.10 from Texas Trailers of Gainesville, FL by utilizing the Florida Sheriff's Association Contract #FSA17-VEH15.0. The Florida Sheriff's Association procurement process satisfies the City's competitive bid requirements.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

The Fleet Administrator recommends the annual purchase of one (1) trailer for the Police Department.

Florida Sheriff's Association Contract #FSA17-VEH15.0 (Effective April 1, 2017 – March 31, 2018

The Fleet Maintenance Division intends to award the following vendor for purchase as follows (see attached Exhibit 1 for vendor details):

1. Texas Trailers for one (1) trailer for Police in the amount of \$40,816.10. This unit utilizes the Florida Sheriff's Contract #FSA17-VEH15.0, Spec #56.

The City of Boynton Beach has entered into a public private partnership to bring the Town Square Project to life. The project includes the police department moving to temporary space during construction. This required a lot of teamwork and resources by command staff to determine our needs for this temporary location. Some of the key obstacles included accreditation, FDLE requirements, safety and the overall functionality of the space.

One of the biggest challenges was our booking facility. Three options have been identified to overcome this challenge. First option, was to construct a solid foundation within the building that included restrooms. Second option, was to rent holding facilities for the next 14-24 months and place them within the building. This option also required restrooms to be constructed. Due to the cost associated with these options the command staff recommends a third option. The third option, was to purchase a 28" trailer and outfit it with portable holding cells and a restroom. The trailer will be kept outside of the temporary location under the fixed room that is already present. The trailer will receive electricity through the existing electric and be secured by chain link fencing. This will eliminate the security threat of having prisoners brought into our secured facility.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT CITY PROGRAMS OR SERVICES?

The trailer will be used as a temporary portable holding cell and restroom for prisoners during the transition of the PD.

FISCAL IMPACT: Budgeted

The current FY 17/18 budget includes the purchase of a K-9 vehicle budgeted for \$50,000 and has not been purchased. Staff is recommending reducing the K-9 fleet by 1 vehicle and utilizing these funds to purchase this trailer from account 501-2516-519-64-33.

It is staffs intention to outfit this command center trailer with the minimum requirements to utilize it as a

booking facility at the temporary location. Once the new police station is completed, the command trailer will be outfitted to meet the needs of a full command center. This command center will be used for special, community and significant events to function as an offsite police or city operation center.

Harbor Estates (North & South Roads) Neighborhood Improvement Project

The Harbor Estates Neighborhood experiences periodic roadway flooding and standing water during heavy rainfall events, which has affected the residential property owners located in the vicinity of North and South Roads. To improve the quality and reliability of the Harbor Estates Neighborhood Utilities, the City of Boynton Beach will provide a new stormwater system that will collect the stormwater and discharge through four (4) shallow outfalls located along the north edge of North Road and one (1) shallow outfall at the southeast corner of the neighborhood. The project also includes replacing aging and undersized water mains and upgrading fire hydrants in the project area. A new roadway and curbing will also be provided.

The Project is under construction. The water main is complete and in service. The storm water is about 60% completed and road work has started. The entire project is estimated to be completed in November 2017.

Central Seacrest Corridor Neighborhood Utility Improvements – Phase II Bid Award

The goal of the project is to replace aging and undersized water mains and improve drainage within the right of way. The project is a continuation of the work was completed during Phase I.

The Utilities Department will conduct Customer Outreach for the project that will include neighborhood informational meetings. Brochures and door hangers will be placed at each residence in the construction area prior to construction activity. There will be daily construction updates on Facebook as well as Twitter updates for road closures and construction activity. A complaint line will be available for residents to call City and Contractor staff directly, with immediate response to concerns and complaints. City staff will track and document all outcomes and resolutions.

NE 20th Avenue Drainage Improvements Project

The purpose of this project is to mitigate localized flooding within an existing residential neighborhood of 13 acres by decreasing the extent of inundated area water ponding duration during rainfall events. The project will also reduce nutrient loads to the environment and local waterways. In addition to the expected increase of resident's satisfaction and wellbeing; the community will no longer be exposed to flooding repercussions, i.e.



Action Plan - Section Nine

The following are flood mitigation activities recommended by the City of Boynton Beach Flood Mitigation Task Force in September 2012.

Action Items

1. Implement the Utility Department capital improvement project named *NE* 3rd Street Stormwater Improvements, which includes NE 1st Street and NE 6th Avenue in the Heart of Boynton area (See Appendix N for details of project).

Action: This area is from Boynton Beach Boulevard north to the C-16 Canal and from Seacrest east to Railroad Avenue. It includes the City's Public Works compound, which was a problem with TS Isaac because this is where the City vehicles are fueled but it was under water; we would not have been able to fuel our emergency vehicles if there had been five more inches of rain. Will require an RFQ for a study first and then the design would follow the study. The NE 1st Street and NE 6th Street area should be top priority.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Fund. Will research possibility of FEMA grant funds. This mitigation project will be submitted to the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2017 Progress: Utilities staff is doing in-house swales and exfiltration trenches to reduce flooding in the area. The project remains in the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC/LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2. Implement the Utility Department *Lakeside/NE 20th Avenue Neighborhood Utility Improvements* capital improvement project (See Appendix N).

Action: Has been on the books for a while and would require an RFQ to go out for engineering services to study the area and come up with a design.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Fund. Will research possibility of FEMA grant funds. This mitigation project will be submitted to the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2017 Progress: Both Lakeside Gardens and NE 20th Avenue Neighborhood Utility CIP are currently under construction. There has been a total investment of \$850,000 for engineering and construction.

3. Implement a program to encourage homeowners' associations (HOAs) to maintain their drainage control structures/systems.

December 2012 Section Nine, Page 1 of 21 **Action**: The Utilities Department will create a set of Standard Operating Procedures for the management companies of the HOAs so that they are educated as to what they should be doing pre-storm and post-storm. There should be a checklist for the management companies to follow. This will empower the HOAs to hold the management companies responsible if flooding occurs.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing outreach efforts in coordination with FDOT, SFWMD and LWDD through workshops, utilities annual report and other publications. SOPs were completed in 2016.

4. Implement the Utility Department capital improvement project named "Golfview Harbor Neighborhood Utility Improvements". This area is west of I-95 (See Appendix N).

Action: Primarily a swale project. To be completed in the next fiscal year of 2013-2014.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Funds. Will research possibility of FEMA grant funds.

2017 Progress: In-house swale project completed in 2016 in place of the CIP project.

5. Continue City participation in, and compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and the Community Rating System (CRS). Seek CRS classification improvements within capabilities of City programs, including adoption and administration of FEMA-approved ordinances and flood insurance rate maps (FIRMs) thus enhancing the City's flood mitigation efforts while securing insurance premium rewards for its residents and businesses.

Action: This is the responsibility of the Development Department. This is an ongoing policy and the City will continue its current approach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: 5 year cycle visit has been completed. The City improved to a Class 6 rating. On September 19, 2017 the City Commission approved by ordinance 17-029, the City's adoption of FEMA's Palm Beach County Flood Insurance Rate maps (FIRMs) to become effective October 5, 2017.

6. Implement the Utility Department *Chapel Hill Utility/Lake Eden Improvements* capital improvement project. This area is east of I-95 (See Appendix N).

Action: Primarily a swale project. Will be completed in the next fiscal year of 2013-2014.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Funds. Will research possibility of FEMA grant funds.

2017 Progress: Swales have been completed in portions of the neighborhood. This is an ongoing maintenance project.

7. Encourage all property owners to purchase flood insurance.

Action: This is the responsibility of the Development Department to be implemented through education and outreach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

8. Encourage drainage solutions such as the use of pervious concrete and pavement.

Action: This is current City policy and will continue as is. This is the responsibility of the Development Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

9. Provide ongoing training and evaluation of the CERT program.

Action: This is current on-going City policy and will continue as is. The CERT members meet with the City's Fire Department four times a year. Two of those meetings are within two months of hurricane season. The Boynton Beach CERT program is one of the best in the County.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: The City's CERT program continues to grow each year.

10. Implement the Utility Department *North and South Road Neighborhood Utility Improvements* capital improvement project (See Appendix N).

Action: The City has tried to implement this project but it is on hold. Originally it was a water main and stormwater project. The homeowners have refused to grant an easement in their side yards for the outfall. This area is at the seawall. Part of the problem is that the lots of some of the newer homes are built at a higher elevation, which has impeded the sheet flow of water.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program funds. Will research possibility of FEMA grant funds. This mitigation project will be submitted to the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2017 Progress: North and South Roads Neighborhood Utility CIP is currently under construction with a total investment of over 2 Million for engineering and construction.

11. Implement the Utility Department capital improvement project called *Replacement Stormwater Pump in Stormwater Retention Areas (See Appendix N)*.

Action: This is to help with Utility Department's operations and maintenance budget. Funded each year basically on an as needed basis. There is not a specific project area identified. The City may need a replacement pump if the flow exceeds the pump capacity. These funds would be used if something comes up that would exceed the operating budget

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Funds. Could only submit project for a grant if a specific pump or project is identified.

2017 Progress: This program has been implemented. Pumps are purchased and replaced on an as-needed basis.

- 12. Encourage the City's departments to come forward with projects to enhance flood mitigation, particularly in repetitive loss areas and areas of frequent flooding for which the Grant Coordinator will pursue appropriate grants to fund the projects. Some examples of available grants are:
 - Flood Mitigation Assistance Grant
 - Hazard Mitigation Grant
 - Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grant
 - Repetitive Flood Claims
 - Severe Repetitive Loss Grant

Action: The Grant Coordinator will follow up annually on this responsibility and provide a progress report to the Flood Mitigation Task Force in August of each year.

Funding: Staff Time (operating funds). Matching funds, if required will have to be budgeted in or will be assumed by the homeowner if agreed.

2017 Progress: The City has applied to the SFWMD Stormwater Grants program and the Local Mitigation Strategy during 2016.

- 13. Assign an individual to continually update information prior to, during, and after a hurricane or flood event, including road and bridge closures, evacuation orders, emergency shelter locations and electrical outages. This update responsibility can include some of the following options:
 - City website
 - Email advisements
 - Television Government Access Channel
 - BBTV
 - Electronic message boards
 - Reverse 911 telephone system

- E-News
- Public service announcements through local media (radio, newspapers, etc.)
- Social media including Twitter and Facebook
- Citizen Hotlines
- Brochure handouts at Points of Distribution (PODs). The POD in Boynton Beach is the Hester Center.

Action: This is a current City procedure and will continue as is as a responsibility of the Boynton Beach Emergency Management Division. The Standard Operating Procedure written for emergency information dissemination shall include the items listed above.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This is currently being implemented.

14. Implement the Utility Department *Stormwater Rehabilitation through the Entire City System* capital improvement project (See Appendix N).

Action: This is to help our operations and maintenance. Funded each year basically on an as needed basis. There is not a specific project area identified. This is used if something would exceed the operating budget.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Funds. Could only submit project for a grant if a specific pump or project is identified.

2017 Progress: Completed.

15. Ensure that City crews maintain and operate all flow control structures for which it is responsible and encourage private and regional entities to do the same.

Action: This is the responsibility of the Utility Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing coordination with FDOT, SFWMD and LWDD through meetings and workshops.

16. Evaluate the *City of Boynton Beach Flood Mitigation Plan*, particularly the Action Plan, annually.

Action: The Development Department will be responsible to prepare an evaluation of the Flood Mitigation Plan, including the Program for Public Information, for every annual meeting of the Flood Mitigation Plan Task Force. This responsibility will be ongoing.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

December 2012 Section Nine, Page 5 of 21 2017 Progress: The 2017 Flood Mitigation Plan Evaluation was completed in September and this evaluation will be communicated to Commission.

17. Update the City of Boynton Beach Flood Mitigation Plan every five years.

Action: The Development Department will be responsible to ensure that the Flood Mitigation Plan is updated every five years and coordinate the update with the *Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy's* five-year update committee.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This will be done in 2018.

18. Enhance communication methods in preparation for, response to, and recovery from natural hazard events by utilizing social media, smartphone applications, and other new technology.

Action: Palm Beach County has introduced a free smartphone app, PBC DART (Palm Beach County Disaster Assessment and Resource Tool). The American Red Cross Hurricane app use should b e encouraged. The City's Emergency Management Division will continue the use of social media and explore new technology as it becomes available

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Social media is currently being utilized as well as the Fire Department's CodeRED Emergency Notification System.

19. Review City Code of Ordinances and make recommendations, if necessary to strengthen maintenance requirements of private stormwater management facilities, including structures controlling flow and prohibiting parking in swales.

Action: The Utility Department will collaborate with the Building Official, Code Compliance Division and others to make code revisions that would improve private stormwater management facilities attenuation.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Restrictions on driveway widths and impervious area have been implemented in the Land Development Regulations and included on details in Utilities Engineering Handbook.

20. Ocean Inlet Drive and Shore Drive Stormwater Improvements should be submitted as a future Utility Department Capital Improvement Project.

Action: Flood conditions have been observed within these rights-of-way, in part, due to debris in storm drains. Staff recommends purchasing different types

of grates that would help allow for more efficient drainage. The Utilities Department may consider this area for a future capital improvement project.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program Funds. Research the possibility of FEMA grant funds. This mitigation project will be submitted to the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2017 Progress: Ocean Inlet Drive Stormwater Improvements Project was completed in early 2017 with a total cost of \$100.000. There are not drainage issues in Shore Drive.

21. Implement the Utility Department *Lake Boynton Estates Neighborhood Utility Improvements* capital improvement plan (See Appendix N).

Action: Includes potable water mains and stormwater improvements; primarily swales and some exfiltration. The project is in the final design stage is planned to be bid by the end of the calendar year (2012) pending approval of the City, which is being done by procurement in the City Attorney's office.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program funds. Research the possibility of FEMA grant funds. This mitigation project will be submitted to the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2017 Progress: Project is completed.

22. Implement the Utility Department *Seacrest Corridor Neighborhood Utility Improvements* capital improvement project (See Appendix N).

Action: Similar to the Lake Boynton Estates project; primarily a water main project that will include some stormwater improvements such as swaling and exfiltration. It is planned to be out for bid by December 2012.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program funds. Research the possibility of FEMA grant funds. This mitigation project will be submitted to the Palm Beach County Unified Local Mitigation Strategy (PBC LMS) Project Prioritization List (PPL).

2017 Progress: Phase I completed in March 2016 with a total cost of \$10 Million. Selection of a design-built team for the Phase II implementation with an approximate budget of \$2.5 M is underway.

23. Ensure adherence to the City's Emergency Procedures Manual, particularly in the event of evacuation orders.

Action: A consultant has been hired by the City to update the Emergency Procedures Manual, which will be completed by the end of October 2012. Emergency Management Division personnel should review key components of the procedures before June 1st of each year.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: The City's Emergency Procedures Manual that was adopted in 2013 is still in effect.

24. Complete the inventory of the City's drainage structures.

Action: This is a requirement of the City's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. As part of the 5-year permit cycle, 20% must be inventoried annually. To be completed by the Utility Department by March 2016.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This is an ongoing process to fulfill NPDES permit requirements. In addition, field data collection is ongoing to implement and populate the new Utilities GIS system.

25. Implement the following Utility Department Capital Improvement Plan stormwater project: *Stormwater Master Plan and Updates* – Review the status of the City's stormwater system and develop plans for its ongoing maintenance and improvement and ensure compliance with any NPDES regulations (See Appendix N).

Action: This is a "high priority" Capital Improvement Project scheduled to be completed in 2013. This will be a study of the Heart of Boynton area. Has to go to RFQ.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program funds. Research the possibility of FEMA grant funds.

2017 Progress: The Utilities Department implemented a Comprehensive Utilities Optimization Plan which includes a water, waste water and stormwater analysis and rate evaluation.

26. Encourage designation, protection, and maintenance of wetlands, mangroves and environmentally sensitive lands..

Action: The Army Corps of Engineers manages wetland ecosystems and requires permits for certain development activities. The Palm Beach County Department of Environmental Resources Management has no permit authority over jurisdictional wetland areas. All wetland areas claimed as jurisdictional by either the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) or the United States Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE) are exempt from the County's vegetation removal process; only native upland vegetation located outside of wetland boundaries are subject to permit. This recommendation is ongoing and is the responsibility of the City's Development Department. There are no plans to change the current approach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Conservation overlays are currently a part of the City comprehensive plan and designated on the City's future land use map. This is ongoing as part of development approval process.

27. Encourage FEMA to update Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) to include base flood elevations in all Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA).

Action: FEMA is in the process of updating the County's FIRMs at this time. The Development Department will keep the City updated on the progress of the mapping.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has recently developed new flood maps for the City of Boynton Beach which were effective on October 5, 2017. Flood maps are used as a basis for determining flood risks, building requirements and insurance premiums.

28. Increase the correction of localized drainage problems so that Level of Service standards are enhanced.

Action: The Utility Department will continue efforts to maintain, replace, and upgrade drainage features to minimize or eliminate localized drainage problems. The Director of the Utility Department shall submit records in August of each year to the Flood Mitigation Plan Task Force Chair outlining the previous year's accomplishments. This is reported annually to the Department of Environmental Protection.

Funding: Capital Improvement Program funds. Research the possibility of FEMA grant funds.

2017 Progress: The City report to FDEP on the MS4 - Annual Report the drainage improvements projects.

Completed in the previous year:

Central Seacrest Corridor Utilities Improvements Project Phase I

Ongoing during current year:

- Central Seacrest Corridor Phase II
- North & South Roads
- Ocean Inlet Drive, Completed
- NE 20th Avenue
- Lakeside Garden

29. Require that installation of stormwater management facilities made necessary by new development is the responsibility of the developer.

December 2012 Section Nine, Page 9 of 21 **Action**: This is current policy and will continue as is. This activity is ongoing as the responsibility of the Utility Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

30. Identify City parks and unbuildable lots (as determined by the Development Department) that could be designated for permanent open space and encourage such designation where possible.

Action: This responsibility will be a collaboration of the Parks and Recreation Department, Development Department, and the Public Works Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: City has a verbal contract with the Developer of the Riverwalk project to acquire approximately 5.76 acres of mangrove land on their parcel south of existing plaza. City will designate as a nature preserve and open space.

31. Consider areas for multiple uses that can be used for storage of floodwaters (retention/detention areas), such as ball fields, public rights of way, parks, and designated open space in locations that have flooding problems.

Action: This will be a joint responsibility of the Utility and Development Departments.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Evaluation is ongoing. Occasionally staff implements pumping of stormwater runoff to City Parks and Recreation facilities during storm events. No City parks have been designated as permanent open space over the past three years; acquisition of unbuildable lots is not economically feasible at this time.

32. The Development Department shall evaluate the building/site regulations of each zoning district and make recommendations for minimum open space requirements.

Action: The Development Department will be responsible to implement this activity.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: The City is currently in the process of conducting a Land Development Regulation audit as part of the CRA Redevelopment Plan implementation. As part of the audit open space requirements will be reviewed and studied for potential changes.

33. Require new development that requires site plan approval to incorporate historical drainage patterns in the analysis of the required stormwater storage.

Action: This is current City policy and the collaboration between the Utility and Development Departments will continue as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

34. Encourage developing provisions for stormwater design management practices in lowimpact development.

Action: The Utility and Development Departments have joint responsibility for this item.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This is being implemented on a voluntary basis through the Green Building Program.

35. Continue the City's maintenance program to clear debris from stormwater drainage areas.

Action: The Utility Department will assure that this program is implemented and shall make the records available to the CRS Coordinator each year. This activity is ongoing and the City will continue its current approach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This is being implemented.

36. As part of the City's NPDES program, continue sediment control to prevent clogged drainage systems such as street sweeping, curb and gutter cleaning and planting vegetation on bare ground.

Action: This is current policy and the Public Works Department will continue the current approach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

37. Prioritize the reduction of repetitive loss properties through various means of mitigation, update repetitive loss forms, and strive to remove properties from the Repetitive Loss List.

December 2012 Section Nine, Page 11 of 21 **Action**: This is an ongoing activity that will continue as a top priority of the City's Development Department, the results of which will be reported annually to the Flood Mitigation Task Force. This is current policy and will continue as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: As there is limited funding to mitigate and acquire property, no mitigation activities have been completed on the City's repetitive loss sites. City will continue to work on a case by case basis as funding opportunities arise.

38. Include notification of grants, loans, and service availability in all City media publications, seminars, and websites that pertain to flood mitigation.

Action: This item will become a part of the City's Program for Public Information (PPI) and will be a joint collaboration between the City Manager's Office and the Development Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

39. Provide information to residents, businesses, property owners on the purpose, importance, and proper maintenance of swales.

Action: This is an ongoing activity by the Utility Department and will continue the current approach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: The Utility Department continues to implement this.

40. Work with developers when redeveloping commercial or mixed-use sites along the Intracoastal Waterway by encouraging that they dedicate the easternmost portions of land granted as an easement or to be greenways for public access and use.

When redevelopment is proposed on private properties located along the Intracoastal Waterway, staff shall collaborate with the developers to encourage public access along the easternmost portion of the property (e.g., development of a greenway, pedestrian path, bikeway, etc.) by the granting of an easement or other legal means.

Action: This is an ongoing responsibility of the Development Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: As part of the Riverwalk (Mixed Use) development approval the developer is required to grant the City a public access easement on their property adjacent to the intra-coastal waterway. This easement must be dedicated prior to issuance of building permits.

41. Consider City acquisition of repetitive loss and/or adaptation action area properties along the Intracoastal Waterway.

Action: This responsibility will be a collaboration of the City Manager's Office, the Development Department and the Legal Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds). Research the possibility of FEMA and other grant funding.

2017 Progress: This has not been implemented to date, considering the high cost entailed.

42. Collaborate with Florida Communities' Trust to assist with funds in acquiring properties in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA).

Action: This responsibility will be a collaboration of the City Manager's Office, the Development Department and the Legal Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds) and grant trust funds.

2017 Progress: This has not been implemented to date, based on the changes with the City's FIRM maps. This item will be re-evaluated with the recent adoption of the new firm maps. On September 19, 2017 the City Commission approved by ordinance 17-029, the City's adoption of FEMA's Palm Beach County Flood Insurance Rate maps (FIRMs), effective October 5, 2017.

43. Collaborate with the Southeast Florida Regional Climate Change Compact as they make recommendations for land development standards with respect to low-lying coastal areas.

Action: The City will be asked to pass or approve by Commission resolution to adopt the Compact where feasible for the Boynton Beach community, saying we accept the Compact and will look to incorporate the feasible implementation strategies into the City's land development regulations and Comprehensive Plan. In early 2013 all of the municipalities will be presented with a resolution and will be asked by the County Administrators of Palm Beach, Broward, Miami-Dade and Monroe Counties to adopt. This will be the responsibility of the City Manager's Office.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds). Research grant funds for implementation.

2017 Progress: This has not been implemented to date, based on the impending changes with the City's FIRM maps. This item will be re-evaluated upon adoption of the new firm maps.

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- 44. Educate citizens about and encourage them to consider the following forms of retrofitting for areas or buildings with major flooding issues:
 - Install backflow valves on sewer systems
 - Elevation of structures by piers, posts and columns, and pilings
 - Create a secondary water barrier
 - Elevate the lowest floor above the 100-year flood level
 - Wet floodproofing (allowing water to enter uninhabited areas of the structure)
 - Dry floodproofing (sealing the structure to prevent flood waters from entering)
 - Levees and floodwalls (constructing a barrier around the structure to keep out flood waters)
 - Demolition (tearing down the structure and rebuilding with appropriate floodproofing techniques or relocating the structure)
 - Elevate the main breaker or fuse box

Action: This is an ongoing activity through education and outreach and is the responsibility of the Development Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

45. Encourage floodproofing techniques in order to preserve and revitalize neighborhoods.

Action: This is an ongoing activity through education and outreach and is the responsibility of the Development Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

46. Encourage property owners to use qualified hazard mitigation professionals to inspect building foundations and access damage after flood events.

Action: FEMA, insurance agents, the State National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) office and the City's Development Department will provide contact information

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

47. Identify, inform, and encourage homeowners' associations to install littoral/upland buffer plantings around lakes and retention areas.

Action: This will be a responsibility of the Development Department through education and outreach.

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

48. Identify privately owned and public natural and beneficial areas in the City and consider expansion of the City's properties that are designated natural and beneficial areas.

Action: The Development Department will implement this item. Recommendations will be presented to the Flood Mitigation Plan Task Force in its Task Force meetings.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: City has a verbal contract with the Developer of the Riverwalk project to acquire approximately 5.76 acres of mangrove land on their parcel south of existing plaza. City will designate as a nature preserve and open space.

49. Maintain strong enforcement of South Florida Water Management District and Lake Worth Drainage District regulations pertaining to floodplain management.

Action: The Utility and Development Departments continue this current policy as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

50. Encourage individual property owners to pursue percolation-oriented drainage improvements using best management practices through outreach and education. Drainage that seeps into the soil, rather than being directed out to the ocean, provides multiple benefits. Not only does it mitigate flooding, but it also recharges the aquifer, enhances water quality, and reduces erosion.

Action: The Development Department will include recommendations pertaining to percolation-oriented drainage in the form of outreach and education. This activity will be ongoing.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing, projects typically include exfiltration trench and/or injections wells as part of their onsite storm water management systems. As we further implement the requirements of NPDES program point source discharges are being measured for nutrients and contaminates, as well as best management practices are provided to prevent future discharges.

51. Implement strict enforcement of best management practices for reducing erosion during development activity.

Action: The Development Department will be responsible to implement this activity. This is current City policy and should continue as is. An accounting of enforcement of this activity will be included in each annual evaluation of this Plan.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

52. Consider dune restoration programs.

Action: This activity will be the responsibility of the Parks and Recreation Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds). Research the possibility of grant funds.

2017 Progress: Further study and inventory of the dunes is required prior to any restoration efforts.

53. Research whether the State will provide free sand and sandbags to residents prior to impending floods.

Action: This will be the responsibility of the City's Emergency Management Division. Research the possibility of the State providing sandbags through the County for distribution at PODs.

Funding: Staff time (Operating funds)

2017 Progress: This has not been implemented as a free provision. The County Emergency Management Operations Center can order sand and sandbags if necessary.

54. Ensure optimal staffing of emergency management personnel to receive and respond to emergency events.

Action: This practice will continue as in the past, in accordance with Incident Command System (ICS) standards and ensuring adherence to the City's Emergency Procedures Manual.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

55. Integrate response to flooded homes with appropriate response organizations (CERT, American Red Cross, faith based organizations and other non-profit entities).

Action: The Emergency Management Division will contact appropriate response organizations at least 24 hours prior to anticipated hurricane or flooding event. During or immediately following the event, contact with these organizations will be made again to ensure integration of response in accordance with the City's Emergency Procedures Manual.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This is currently implemented during events that provide a warning period.

56. Identify all critical facilities located within SFHAs and make contingency plans for each, in the event of flooding.

Action: The City's Fire and Life Safety Division will collaborate with the Risk Management Department to identify all critical facilities located within the SFHAs and to make the recommended contingency plans by [date] of each year. A preliminary report will be presented to the Palm Beach County Local Mitigation Strategy and the Boynton Beach Flood Mitigation Task Force.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: All critical facilities have been updated.

57. Continue to ensure that all new public buildings that serve first response and critical emergency/public needs, including record/data collection and communication centers/infrastructure, are located outside of flood zones or floodprone areas.

Action: The Development and Engineering Departments will be responsible for this activity and will continue the current policy as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

58. Annually update the list of nursing homes and smaller home care centers (Type 1 Group Homes) in the City and the priority list of critical facilities.

Action: The City's Fire Department completes this every year. This procedure will continue as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This is continuously updated.

59. Confirm that all nursing homes have an emergency plan.

Action: This is required every year by the City's Fire Department and will continue the current procedure as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

60. Keep Special Registry List and share with CERT teams.

Action: This list is maintained by the City's Fire Department and will continue its current approach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

61. The Stormwater crew will keep a registry of problem areas that requires the use of vacuum trucks in the event of a flood event, including after regular business hours.

Action: This is current policy and will continue as is. The Stormwater Director will coordinate with the Fire and Life Safety Division.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

62. Explore funding opportunities to retrofit critical facilities to be more flood and wind resistant.

Action: This is the responsibility of the City Manager's Office and is an ongoing policy that will continue as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: No grant funding has been identified to date, but the City monitors grant opportunities on an ongoing basis.

63. Continue to advertise evacuation routes.

Action: This responsibility of the Emergency Management Department will continue as is through education and outreach.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

64. Post contact information so that citizens know how to contact FEMA post-flood.

Action: The Emergency Management Department shall ensure that the literature and announcements included in the City's public information outreach includes this information. The City will continue this practice as is.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

65. Provide knowledgeable staff to assist citizens, before, during and after a flood event to help them understand their repair, rebuilding, flooding and mitigation options.

Action: The Building Official will coordinate this assistance based on staff availability and prioritized needs. This is a current City procedure and will continue as is

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: Ongoing.

66. Assure annual distribution of printed copies of the *Boynton Beach Hurricane Survival Guide* in multiple languages at City Hall.

Action: This item will be the responsibility of the Emergency Management Department. Currently the guide is not provided in printed form due to budget constraints.

Funding: Research grant availability.

2017 Progress: The guide is provided online but is not available in print.

67. Post the *Boynton Beach Hurricane Survival Guide* and a link to the *Palm Beach County Hurricane Survival Guide* on the City's website in a location that is easily accessed by the community. There are no plans to change this practice.

Action: This is current practice and will continue as is as the responsibility of the Emergency Management Department.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

2017 Progress: This continues to be implemented.

68. Implement the City's Program for Public Information (PPI), a copy of which can be found in the Appendix of this Plan.

Action: The Palm Beach County CRS Users' Group, of which the City of Boynton Beach is a member, will work with the CRS Program to implement this activity. Much of this information is distributed at the CRS Users' Group's Hurricane Expowhich in held in June of each year.

Funding: Staff time (operating funds)

INTRODUCTION

The City of Boynton Beach has been actively participating in the Community Rating System (CRS) since it entered the program in October 1991. The CRS is a component of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) which provides reductions to flood insurance premiums for residents and businesses within participating communities. In 2017 Boynton Beach advanced from a CRS rating of 7 to a rating of 6, which provides a 20% reduction in flood insurance premiums for properties located in a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), and a 10% discount for those outside the SFHA. These discounts are achieved as a result of communities to maintain their achieved flood insurance premium discounts, they must continue to implement their programs and provide annual status reports to the NFIP.

The City has developed a comprehensive outreach program to educate the community on the benefits of floodplain management and to highlight the importance of flood mitigation. In April 2013, the City established a Program for Public Information (PPI) Committee and began the process of evaluating existing outreach efforts and making recommendations to improve outreach. The Committee's work included the following:

- Assessment of the community's public information needs
- Formulation of messages and their intended effects
- Identification of outreach projects to convey the messages
- Examination of other information initiatives
- Preparation of a Program for Public Information (PPI) Implementation Guide

The PPI Implementation Guide was adopted by the City Commission on September 15, 2015.

PPI COMMITTEE ANNUAL EVALUATION MEETING

In accordance with the *CRS Coordinator's Manual*, the City PPI Committee must meet annually to monitor and evaluate the implementation of flood-related outreach. The Committee assesses whether desired outcomes are achieved and what, if anything, should be changed. The PPI Committee met on August 31, 2017 from 3:30 – 5:00 PM. Committee members and other meeting attendees are listed below.

OUTREACH MESSAGES AND OUTCOMES

The PPI Implementation Guide identifies 10 flood-related messages and associated outcomes (Table 1). The Committee reviewed these messages and outcomes at the annual meeting and agreed to keep them.

TARGET AREAS AND AUDIENCES

The Committee reviewed the target areas and audiences identified in the PPI and agreed that, while it is important that the whole community receive information pertaining to flooding, the following areas and groups need to continue to be targeted.

Target Areas

1. Properties in Repetitive Loss Areas

Any area that has been subject to repetitive losses from flooding, as defined by the NFIP, needs to be targeted for public information. Targeted outreach to property owners in these areas will be undertaken more frequently than on an annual basis. The information specified in the 2017 *CRS Coordinator's Manual* will be included.

2. Areas that were impacted by the January 2014 flood

The 1,000-year flood event in January 2014 identified areas in the City that are particularly vulnerable to flooding. The property owners could benefit from public information, especially that which encourages purchase of flood insurance.

Target Audiences

1. Homeowner associations play a critical role in neighborhood outreach and can be efficiently contacted through a neighborhood database maintained by the City.

2. Property management companies can have a strong influence on the decisions of homeowners.

3. Greater Boynton Beach Chamber of Commerce represents a major component of the local business community. James Nugent, current Director at Large of the Chamber, serves on the PPI Committee and can effectively disseminate flood-related information to its members.

4. Landscaping companies are an important target audience because grass clippings and debris they produce can accumulate in storm drains and reduce drainage flows, making flooding more likely.

In addition to the groups listed above, which were identified in the PPI Implementation Guide, the Committee determined to add three additional target audiences:

5. Properties recently designated as within a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) by the new FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps released in October 2017. FEMA, in cooperation with Palm Beach County, recently initiated the Palm Beach County Map Change Campaign, a media campaign designed to promote flood insurance. Properties recently designated as being located within Special Flood Hazard Areas were targeted for special outreaches.

6. Condominium associations (in addition to homeowner associations)

7. Coastal properties on the Intracoastal Waterway and the Ocean which are especially impacted by seasonal King Tides and sea level rise

OUTREACH PROJECT ASSESSMENT

The City of Boynton Beach PPI Implementation Guide recommends a total of 28 projects and initiatives to enhance the City's outreach program. This list includes ongoing outreach methods as well as some that are recommended at specific times during a year (e.g., at the beginning of hurricane season or immediately before or after a storm or tide event). Decisions as to which specific projects are most appropriate to implement each year are left to the discretion of City staff.

At the annual evaluation meeting, the PPI Committee reviews the list of recommended outreach projects, reports on outreach conducted over the past year, and recommends new projects to continually improve the PPI. Highlights of the City's PPI outreach from May through October 2017 are as follows:

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- Publication of a "Flood Hazard Information" brochure which was distributed by mail and/or email to all Boynton Beach Utilities service customers in September–October, 2017
- Regional outreach Palm Beach County TV Channel 20. Palm Beach County's Department of Emergency Management provides storm and flood-related information on Channel 20, which is available to the whole Palm Beach community. Programs are aired continually and include such topics as the Governor's Hurricane Conference and messages from State and County emergency management authorities.
- Booth at Home Depot Safety Expo. Each year local jurisdictions work together with local Home Depot stores to distribute information pertaining to hurricane preparedness. This year's expo took place in Boynton Beach at 1500 8th Avenue on June 6, 2017.
- Article on storm drain maintenance included in the Boynton Beach Utilities 2016 Water Quality Report, which was mailed to approximately 43,000 Boynton Beach Utilities service customers, posted on the City website, and posted on the City's Facebook page in June 2017
- Yellow Pages Palm Beach County includes flood-related information in the Yellow Pages of its community's telephone books. Topics include property protection, flood insurance and hurricane preparedness.
- Installation of 300 new storm drain stickers throughout the City, which read "Keep pollution out of our waters! This inlet drains to local waterways"
- Eight flood-related Facebook posts on the Boynton Beach Utilities Facebook page using the hashtag #FloodFridays, reaching a combined total of 1,967 people
- Creation of a designated City Flood Awareness Hotline at 561-742-6366
- Maintenance of a Flood Awareness web page on the City's website (http://www.boynton-beach.org/floodinfo/).
- Coordination with Florida Department of Transportation and Palm Beach County about new construction projects and maintenance of State and County roads; coordination with Lake Worth Drainage District about canal maintenance
- Participation in "Inlet-to-Inlet Micro Regional Collaboration" with municipalities from Boca Raton to Lake Worth, to address climate and sea level rise adaptation planning
- Upcoming public Flood Awareness Workshop on November 8, 2017 featuring presentations on City stormwater management services, sea level rise, and the new FEMA Flood Insurance Rate maps

A complete list of outreach projects implemented from May 2017 to April 2018 will be included in a spreadsheet accompanying this report when submitted for the City's annual recertification prior to May 1, 2018.

FLOOD RESPONSE PREPARATIONS

The City of Boynton Beach has a Flood Response Preparations plan (FRP) that is intended to prepare messages and materials before the threat of a storm, thereby reducing the time, effort, and resources required to disseminate important information when needed. The FRP guides the municipality through outreach efforts immediately before, during, and after a possible flood event. The PPI Committee enlisted Boynton Beach Fire Marshal Kathy Cline to conduct an annual review of the FRP, a role formerly performed by recently retired Fire Marshal Rick Lee.

The FRP was not implemented during the year prior to the PPI Committee meeting on August 31, 2017, as there had been no significant flood events during that time. However, soon after the PPI Committee meeting, on September 9–10, the City was impacted by Hurricane Irma. The PPI Committee documented the application of the City's FRP in communicating messages to the community before, during, and after Hurricane Irma. This documentation will be included in the spreadsheet that will accompany this report when it is submitted for CRS recertification prior to May 1, 2018.

FLOOD INSURANCE PROMOTION

The PPI Committee confirmed its commitment to continually promote flood insurance to property owners and renters in the original two target areas identified in the PPI Implementation Guide, plus two additional areas:

- 1. Properties in Repetitive Loss Areas
- 2. Areas that were impacted by the January 2014 flood

3. Other flood-prone areas of the City

3. Properties recently designated as within an SFHA by the new FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps released in October 2017

From May through October 2017 the City of Boynton Beach has continued to promote flood insurance across the target areas using a variety of outreach methods, including the following:

- Direct mailings to properties in Repetitive Loss Areas
- Letter from the City's elected officials accentuating the importance of flood insurance, mailed to all Boynton Beach Utilities service customers as part of the Flood Hazard Information brochure in September–October 2017
- City website
- City social media posts
- City Flood Awareness Hotline
- Flood Awareness Workshop, November 8, 2017

Minister Bernard Wright, 713 NW 2 street, CEO Bernard Wright Ministry and the Robert E. Wells Foundation, wanted to commend retiring Jeff Livergood and present him with a certificate from the Heart of Boynton Beach residences for his gracious service. Well wishes on his journey. **Charles Kanter**, 2905 South Greenleaf Circle, noted based on what was on the agenda, Quantum will be welcoming the City Hall into the Quantum Community. He stated there were some of the best restaurants in town, some of the nicest facilities. He was requesting some speed bumps on Quantum Boulevard. It was not so much the volume of the traffic, it was the high speed of the traffic. He was only asking for parity with Renaissance Commons.

Vice Mayor Romelus requested staff to put together a report regarding the speed bumps.

Susan Oyer, **140 SE 27th Way**, noted Earth Day was quickly approaching. Distributed some information regarding Earth Day. The City of West Palm was planting 10,000 trees in 10 years. The City of West Palm Beach was giving away free trees. She believed it was time to focus on Boynton Beach. Boynton Beach needs more trees, especially on the major roads. There was no reason why we are not as beautiful as Boca Raton. The City of Boynton Beach should have some big beautiful trees. Good Luck Jeff Livergood.

Suzanne Ross, Schoolhouse Children's Museum & Learning Center, indicated Palm Beach and Martin County will have "The Great Give". This was a 24-hour online giving event to raise funds for non-profits throughout the community. Some of the nonprofits participating were Habitat of Humanity Connect to Boynton, Eat Better Live Better, Faith Farm ministry and many more. She requested the City to get involved with "the Great Give". On Saturday May 5th the Museum will host the Princess and Superhero Day.

Samantha Shields, The Hat Foundation, spoke about the Hunger Crisis; informed the Commission 12% of Americans are facing hunger conditions daily. She indicated there were 38M people going hungry every day. The Foundation has taken the positon to feed 1M children by September 18, 2018. They are requesting help from the City Commission to support this cause. She noted it only takes 10,000 people to pledge \$100 to raise \$1M.

Commissioner McCray asked the location of the foundation. Ms. Shields responded the Foundation does not have a physical location.

Joe Maryuma introduced himself as a candidate for Judge for Palm Beach Circuit Court Group 18. He provided some information regarding his background. He graduated from Florida Atlantic University in 2002 Magna Cum Laude and attended Florida International University Law School where he graduated Cum Laude, 5th in his class. He currently represents juveniles. He has been the Assistant Public Defender for Palm Beach County for the 12 past years. Mr. Maryuma stated he has a strong commitment to promoting the judicial economy. People should not have to wait years for a case to conclude. He stated he has learned that a good judge should be fair, respectful and efficient. The primary is August 28, 2018. **Harry Woodworth, 985 NE 5th Place**, noted one of the sober homes had closed and gone home. Stated Ocean Palm Plaza also known as Yachtsman Club, met with the City before Christmas, and has done very little to comply. There was a landscaping plan which has been in effect since 1993. The landlord paved one of the areas and planted some grass, but did not irrigate; the grass died. Mr. Woodworth said something needed to be done about this; the guy was doing absolutely nothing. The City Code has requirements, which the landlord was not following.

Vice Mayor Romelus said to bring this to the CRA where it can be discussed, she indicated they could not discuss funding at this venue. Mr. Woodworth stated it was not a funding issue, this was a compliance issue.

Tim Collins, Fish Depot Seafood Market, came to the Commission to request the City Manager consider a Land Use Ordinance change. He noted the kitchen which was being used was in an old air stream trailer, it was not adequate to keep up with the demand. Mr. Collins indicated container boxes can be used to house his kitchen equipment. They are using a container in Miami Dade County as well as Broward.

Vice Mayor Romelus requested to add this as a Future Agenda item.

Mr. Collins said beyond a restaurant use, these container boxes can have houses inside. Ms. LaVerriere stated the staff had conversations regarding these container boxes. Commissioner McCray asked to provide some information on the containers for discussion. Ms. LaVerriere stated in the first meeting in May staff will have some information for discussion regarding the container boxes. Andrew Mack, Director of **Development**, advised the best thing to do was to have Mr. Collins meet with staff to discuss his vision.

Herb Suss, 1711 Wood Fern Drive, noted on June 2, 2018 the City will see the CERT people in action. He has always spoken about climate changes; there was a current which goes up the east coast that will cause a major effect on the climate. He informed the Commission Madeline Albright has just written a book on Fascism. He said one broadcasting company now owns 70% of the Nation's news stations. Mr. Suss asked about the status of the Police Chief search

Ms. LaVerriere replied the application submittal period ended April 2, 2018. A review of the applicants will begin by the end of June.

Vice Mayor Romelus saw no one coming forward, Public Audience was closed.

Vice Mayor Romelus recognized the City retiring staff member Jeff Livergood and recognize a staff member of Lois Frankel's office

Ms. LaVerriere stated next Friday is Mr. Livergood's last day. She stated Jeff was her go to person when institutional knowledge was needed. As part of Jeff's retirement he has purchased a travel vehicle. He has named the vehicle the beast.

Mr. Livergood said the lettering BEAST-Brad's Education Account Spent trekking. His son had made him very proud as a father. He recalled there was a project he was involved on a steering committee where the City established its values; diversity, integrity, stewardship and creativity. The values are not spoken about as much; we are well served to be reminded of those core values. Getting employees to think for themselves and not being criticized for new ideas.

Commissioner McCray noted it has been a pleasure to work with Jeff and hoped he enjoys his retirement.

Commissioner Casello said Jeff has always made him look like a rock star. Whenever there were any issues, they were taken care of immediately. Jeff has always thought outside of the box. He taught his employees to think outside the box. He had made Boynton Beach a better place.

Commissioner McCray told of a time when Jeff had taken the doors off at Sara Sims Park; when asked what he was doing, he said he was thinking outside the box. I told him to get back in the box; they had a great laugh.

Commissioner Katz wished Jeff well and indicated the highest compliment an employee can be paid was to be called professional, which means someone who does what was expected and goes above and beyond and does it well. Commissioner Katz said no one could be critical of the work which Mr. Livergood has done for the City of Boynton Beach.

Mr. Livergood noted the City was in good hands. He had an awesome opportunity at the City of Boynton Beach.

Vice Mayor Romelus said at her first budget meeting she got a little riled up, Jeff came to her after the meeting and gave her the best compliment "she got it". Jeff, you are one of a kind.

Captain Kelly Boynton Beach Police Department, and Captain McNiven, explained this purchase was for replacing ProQA and Aqua Software which provides dispatchers with pre-arrival instructions for callers with a medical emergency. This program was extremely rigid and has arbitrary standards which have nothing to do with patient care, often requiring dispatchers to ask questions which have nothing to do with a caller's emergency. If the dispatcher deviates from the listed instructions, the call is considered non-compliant which makes getting the Dispatch Center accredited through IAED. The current program is also one dimensional as it only provides instructions for medical calls. Power Phone provides 90 plus integrated protocols for police, fire, and medical calls. The program is completely customizable to the agency which allows the City of

Boynton Beach to make modifications to fit the citizens of Boynton Beach. The protocols provided are guided, but also flexible to be able to adapt to the ever changing conditions a caller provides. Captain Kelly said no call was the same and this program allows for that adjustment to specific situations without being considered non-compliant. The program pulls up specific pre-arrival instructions for each individual situation, instead of requiring the dispatcher to make additional choices. This requires less time and is much more efficient. The entire project was completely reimbursable through Palm Beach County 911.

Vice Mayor Romelus stated this would be free a solution and provide better efficiency for the Police Department.

7. BIDS AND PURCHASES OVER \$100,000

A. Approve utilizing the Palm Beach County contract (Bid #WUD 16-001/VMG) extension through March 14, 2019 with Aquifer Maintenance and Performance Systems, Inc. (AMPS, Inc.) of West Palm Beach, FL with the same terms, conditions, specifications and pricing. This contract will be utilized for well rehabilitation services on an AS-NEEDED BASIS, with an estimated annual expenditure of \$300,000. Palm Beach County complied with Public Contract Bid requirements equal to or exceeding the City of Boynton Beach's requirements.

Vice Mayor Romelus requested a motion.

Commissioner Katz moved to approve. Commissioner McCray seconded the motion.

B. PROPOSED RESOLUTION NO. R18-063 - Authorize the City Manager to sign a proposal with Routeware, Inc. of Portland, OR, utilizing the HGACBuy Contract # FL03-17 for the purchase of onboard computing system for installation in Public Works Solid Waste vehicles for the amount of \$92,827.00 plus travel costs not to

exceed \$7,500. In addition to the purchase cost there will be a monthly maintenance fee of \$10,092.92 for an estimated annual expenditure of \$121,116. The HGACBuy cooperative's bid process satisfies the City's competitive bid requirements.

Jeff Livergood, Director of Public Works and Engineering, explained the City of Boynton Beach was doing things the old fashion way. He informed the Commission if a truck becomes disabled and cannot finish the route, another truck will be dispatched to complete the route. Because of communication, streets can be missed and customers call in to ask why their trash was not picked up. Mr. Livergood explained Automatic Vehicle Location systems (AVL) are being used by many different companies. The benefits of photographs of what was being seen on the road will help the City eliminate some costs of returning to homes to pick up trash which was missed.

Commissioner McCray asked if there would be a charge to the residents to come back to get the garbage. Mr. Livergood responded at this time a decision has not been made to charge citizens to return for pickups. There may be some options of charging in the future. He indicated maybe give the customer a one-time waiver of charges to pick up trash which was not placed outside. He stated this can be used as an education tool, for both the driver and the citizens.

Davidson Monestime, Solid Waste Manager, said there was a perception of service failure on the side of the driver. If the driver can take a picture, automatically loads to the software, the driver and the City are cleared of any failure. The customer will be able to review a photo with a time stamp. This will be an education for the customer as they realize the trash was not out at the required time and would need to wait until the next pick up.

Mr. Livergood provided background information regarding Routeware. Noted Routeware has more than 18 years focused on improving efficiencies in the Waste Hauling Industry, Headquartered in Portland, OR. The Company has thousands of trucks at hundreds of locations throughout the U.S. and Canada. The City will know where the trucks are at all times. Mr. Livergood explained some of the reports through Routeware were Idle times, driver behavior, dispatching, safety, and fuel consumption. The City will know the speed at any given time, whether or not the vehicle was speeding. This will not be used as disciplinary tool, but will be used for teaching. Each driver will have a tablet which will give up-to-date information.

Commissioner McCray requested clarification of the travel costs. Mr. Livergood responded the vendor will be travelling to the City of Boynton Beach for onsite training and the City will be paying for the company travel expenses.

Commissioner McCray asked if all of the trucks have this software. Mr. Livergood responded they will, except the supervisor vehicle.

Mr. Livergood explained the office sees the status changes by color. The Color allows the office staff to see if there was any idle time and if so where and why.

Mr. Monestime stated the driver's workbook will allow the driver to add new work orders without having to write down the information. The screen allows the driver to see all work orders. Mr. Monestime said this was a paperless system.

Commissioner McCray asked how fast the trucks were allowed to drive and use the system at the same time. Mr. Monestime stated there was a threshold for 5 miles per hour. He indicated changes cannot be made if the truck was in motion.

Mr. Livergood noted with the fleet automation there was a higher efficiency, safer driver performance optimized through better training, more pickups per route per day, additional revenue from extras and added customers.

Commissioner McCray stated this would be an added bonus. Mr. Livergood replied there will be real time status updates, throughout the day, service verification, fewer customer calls, less overtime, reliable and accurate communication. There will be turn by turn directions. Each truck would have cameras mounted, to provide photos within 15 seconds. He stated everyone wins. There will be fewer mistakes. The supervisors no longer need to trail the trucks to make sure the entire route have been completed.

Commissioner McCray said he has concerns about the photos of the property. Mr. Livergood stated the photos would be stored in the cloud. He would caution the residents to wear clothes when taking out their trash.

Mr. Livergood noted they worked with the City IT staff and they were excited to have this into place. This is familiar technology with easy deployment. This will help with the recycling as well. The program can track how much recycling was actually picked up. This was a high tech solution; this has been placed into the budget next year to add the street sweeper.

Commissioner McCray asked how many street sweepers the City has. Mr. Livergood stated the City currently has one street sweeper.

Mr. Monestime stated the software used with Waste Management was called onboard computing. The most important aspect was reporting for idle time reporting. Explained this system will allow for some changes in which sites are selected which has faster times and are better for disposal.

Vice Mayor Romelus stated this seemed to be a great program.

Commissioner Casello asked if annual monthly maintenance fee of \$10,000 was a locked in figure. Mr. Livergood stated this amount was locked in for the term of the contract.

Ms. LaVerriere explained the purchase was being funded out of the Sanitation Fund versus the General Fund.

Commissioner Casello stated there must be a better way of having a one man operation for the recycling. He has seen one driver doing both the driving and putting the recycling bins into the truck.

Mr. Monestime said there was a better way; but at the present time Palm Beach County uses a split stream system. There is a single stream system which allows for one truck to take all recyclables and separates.

Vice Mayor stated there was a truck which can pick up both of the recyclables and separates the recyclables.

Mr. Livergood explained there were two issues, one being manpower and the method of disposal of the recyclable product. He stated some counties have a single stream, which means all recycling goes into one truck; recycling are not separated. Palm Beach County has split streams which mean they have the blue and yellow bins, they need to be separated and the truck needs to separate the recycled product prior to being placed in the truck. The second issue was manpower; there was one staff member who performs both duties as driver and picker. Having one driver reduces overtime.

Commissioner McCray asked when the Commission can expect an update regarding how well this software was doing.

Mr. Monestime noted 6 months was a reasonable time to address the software's efficiency.

Commissioner McCray asked if this timeframe was sufficient. He indicated when the Commission allocates this amount of money for a project, they need to know that the system was working.

Mr. Monestime stated 6 months was a fair timeframe. Stated AVL has proven to be very successful in other counties.

Mr. Livergood stated he would encourage the Commission to sit down with staff and go over the reports from Routeware.

Motion

Commissioner Katz moved to approve. Commissioner McCray seconded the motion.

Vote

The motion unanimously passed.

Ms. LaVerriere indicated it was that time of year again to begin to start working on the budget. She noted July 16-18, Budget Workshops at Intracoastal Park Clubhouse; Monday, July 16, 2018 @ 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 17, 2018 @ 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, July 18, 2018 @ 2:00 P.M. if needed, but they always allow for a third day. The City will be adopting a tentative millage rate and a Fire assessment resolution. The Mayor last year added a pre-proposed budget workshop. This proposed budget workshop is set for May 29th @ 6:30pm, to provide the public the opportunity to provide input prior to staff completing the purposed budget. During the workshop in July the workshop was completed, and then the City takes input from the Commission.

Commissioner Casello asked for clarification of the May 29th workshop.

Ms. LaVerriere explained it was a preliminary budget workshop; the public has an opportunity to provide some input prior to the completion of the proposal of the budget.

Commissioner McCray stated this was an input budget workshop for the citizens.

Vice Mayor Romelus asked if everyone was onboard. There was a consensus.

Ms. LaVerriere said these dates will be placed on the website and the meetings will be noticed.

- B. **PROPOSED RESOLUTION NO. R18-065** Authorize the Mayor to sign lease documents for temporary space needed for City Services to operate during construction of Town Square project at the following locations:

2045 High Ridge Road - for the Library 209 N Seacrest Blvd - for Library Annex 3301 Quantum Blvd - for City Hall 3602-3606 Quantum Blvd - for Police Headquarters

Vice Mayor Romelus read Proposed Resolution No. R18-065 by title only into the record.

Attorney Cherof indicated there may be additional language in the body of the Resolution, which indicates there maybe one sublease with an assignment of lease to avoid any penalty associated with the sublease.

Commissioner McCray explained when the Commission does something of this magnitude the public should know where these funds are going.

Tim Howard, Assistant City Manager, explained the four leases are unique and different. Each lease has a different expiration date. The intent in the plan was to stagger the move. The library will move first than the Police station.

Mr. Howard stated the lease at 2045 High Ridge Road was for the Library, will be a 20month lease. The Library on High Ridge Road and the Annex located next to the post office. The Main Library site is 23,000 square feet. The monthly estimated rental was \$25,975. The rent will began on June 1, 2018, this would house the main part of the Library.

Commissioner McCray asked the total cost for the City for the Main Library.

Ms. LaVerriere indicated the total estimated cost for the Main Library was \$519,500.

Vice Mayor Romelus asked if this will be a fully operational library or will there be a limitation with the number of books available for the Public.

Mr. Groff, Assistant City Manager, stated the main Library temporary location would be a fully operational library, minus some of the programs which are prohibited from being done from a temporary space. There will be fully stacked area of books, DVD's, sitting areas and computer areas. There was some things which could not occur at the temporary Library. The annex space will have limited services. The Library would be able to offer 95% of the services being offered presently.

Commissioner McCray asked where the Library archives will be housed. He understands there must be some environmental concerns for the archives. Mr. Groff stated there would be an area set up for the archives set up with the air-conditioning.

Vice Mayor Romelus asked if the online High School program for the library will be available. Mr. Groff stated the High School program will continue.

Vice Mayor Romelus requested an explanation on why the Library annex was being moved in the downtown area.

Craig Clark, Library Director, explained the City decided to keep the program in this area because most of the children. He stated I-95 was a barrier for children walking across that area. This would be more of an afterschool/ homework help site. There will be some computers and some collections. The Library Annex will be limited; the building was only 4,000 square feet. There will be Storytime in the morning. The temporary site on High Ridge will not be able to have any type of programs at the temporary site. The City was taking a 63,000 square foot building and placing it into a 23,000 square foot space. There will be books open to the public, assisting customers with some computers to use; not as many as they have right now.

Commissioner Casello asked how many children live on the other side of I-95. He wanted to know where those statistics were coming from.

Mr. Clark stated he believed most of the kids are from the Heart of Boynton, most are dropped off by busses, walk or ride their bikes to the Library.

Commissioner Casello asked how many site locations were investigated before the City decided on this particular site.

Mr. Groff stated the challenge with this move was the City was looking for short-term leases. When the search began there were over 30 buildings for consideration. The good thing about Boynton Beach was there was not a lot available space. What was found were new buyers and subleases. Mr. Groff explained for the Police Department they needed to go out a second time to secure a lease. Most commercial space does not want to have short term leases.

Commissioner Casello asked if the City will be charged during the buildout. Mr. Groff responded the City would not be charged during the buildout. The goal was timing the leases with the timing of the construction schedule.

Commissioner McCray asked how many staff will be housed at the Library Annex.

Mr. Clark replied there will be three AmeriCorps staff, four full-time youth services staff and maybe a couple of part-time staff to support the full-time staff members.

Commissioner McCray inquired what happens if the City buildings are not done within those twenty months.

Mr. Groff explained all of the leases have extension which the City can exercise if needed. Extra time has been built in. Mr. Groff indicated he was very comfortable with the schedule.

Commissioner McCray asked if something happens with building City Hall, Police Department or the Library and they are not able to move because the Contractors do not meet their deadlines, who will pay the extended lease payments. He asked do the Contractors pick up those payments. Mr. Groff replied there are liquidated damages in the contracts. If the contractors do not meet those timeframe, they would pay those deadlines and those damages are used to pay for the City damages such as extended lease payments.

Mr. Howards indicated the lease at 209 N Seacrest Boulevard for the Library annex, the monthly rent was \$8,360 for a total of \$167,200 for the 20 months.

Mr. Howard noted the lease for 3301 Quantum Boulevard was for City Hall and City Services, except for the Police Department or the Commission Chambers. Commissioner McCray asked where the Commission will hold their meetings.

Mr. Howard stated they are looking at a couple of locations, the Intercostal Park Clubhouse, the Woman's Club, or Fire Station Five in the big training room. Staff was still deciding on where the chambers will be located.

Commissioner McCray asked how the residents will pay their water bill. Mr. Howard indicated this was being worked on; the payments will be taken at the temporary space for City Hall. Noted staff was looking for additional locations in the downtown area.

Mr. Howard said the lease for City Hall located at 3301 Quantum Blvd, will have 23,000 square feet and the monthly rent is estimated at \$42,166, the yearly total is \$1.12M for 24 months. Mr. Howard explained those rental payments will be budgeted for in the upcoming budget process.

Mr. Howard said the last lease was for 3602-3606 Quantum Boulevard for Police Headquarters. The size of the space was 27,300 square feet at an estimated rental cost of \$24,501 and a yearly cost \$588,042 will begin August 1, 2018.

Ms. LaVerriere indicated the total cost of \$2.286M for all building for 20-24 months.

Vice Mayor Romelus asked if this cost included the \$250,000 for the Police Headquarters retrofit. Ms. LaVerriere indicated this was only for the rents.

Mr. Howards stated in addition to the rents for the different spaces, for the main Library site, there was some buildout which was needed. There was an estimate of \$25,000 which was a one-time cost. For City Hall there was some buildout which was required. There was an estimate of \$46,000. This lease has a tentative improvement allowance from the landlord of \$46,000. This would be an even swap. The Police Department buildout was being estimated at \$250,000.

Commissioner McCray noted with the rent and buildout the City was looking at \$ 2.8M. How would the City handle people coming to the Police Department, and how would they know where the temporary police station would be located.

Mr. Groff stated this was a concern; the City needs to do marketing. He stated a lobby will be made available for the citizens. There will be some signs on the building. It maybe a little bit more difficult where to find the Police Department, there will be a very nice lobby, the same services will be offered at the temporary building.

Vice Mayor Romelus asked if there would be signage at the current location.

Mr. Groff replied there will be some temporary signage. Once the building was demolished, the area will be fenced with instruction and direction explaining where the City Hall has moved. Usually within 6-8 months must people will get into the flow.

Vice Mayor Romelus opened up to Public Comment.

Susan Oyer 140 SE 27 Way, requested to see some maps of the proposed leased buildings.

Ms. LaVerriere indicated the approval was needed.

Herb Suss, **1711 Wood Fern Drive** understood the need for the Police station and City Hall but not for the Library. Inquired as to the distance between the Library annex and the main Library.

Mr. Howard replied the distance was 2.6 miles from the Library annex to the temporary main Library.

Ms. Suss said the Libraries are separated by 2.6 miles. He was worried about the children. He indicated the City has a Library which was fairly new. He indicated the Commission was moving in the wrong direction. There must be a way in which to construct a Town Center and not demolish the Library. The Library was a fairly new building. He asked if there has been a traffic study.

Vice Mayor Romelus explained this was a temporary location, so the City did not need to have a traffic study. Vice Mayor Romelus stated the Library Annex was located in this area with the intention of keeping the kids in the area. The children will not need to travel to High Ridge nor go to I-95. Mr. Suss stated this was a waste of money that the City built the Library.

Commissioner Katz explained the cost to remediate the problems in the existing Library structure plus the opportunity cost of the loss value of developing the land was substantially higher than repairing the structures and leaving the structure there. The City will save millions of dollars by demolishing the structure and rebuilding and allowing more development as opposed to having one structure existing and needing repairs because of water intrusion and other issues.

Commissioner McCray noted he has the same concerns regarding the Library. He said he previously asked Mr. Livergood if that was a good time to add onto the Library and was told it would be. He stated he was not happy about demolishing the Library. He felt it was a waste of taxpayers' money. He worked hard for this Library with Virginia Ferace. The only problem he had was why the Library did not face Seacrest Boulevard.

Commissioner Katz noted no additional taxes would be raised above and beyond existing revenue from the CRA and the City of Boynton Beach.

Commissioner Casello asked if the City of Boynton Beach reached out to other law enforcement facilities regarding using their facilities as holding cells.

Acting Chief Kelly Harris explained the City of Boynton Beach needs the temporary facilities in-house so the officers can interview and process prisoners. The City would need to stand in line with every other agency. This would delay the processing time. Commissioner Casello stated the City has not reached out to the other agencies.

Acting Chief Harris noted the City has worked directly with the Sheriff office on previous occasions, such as DUI's as well as other arrests. Acting Chief Harris stated the reality was the temporary time frame to ask the Sheriff department to put the City at the head of the line, PBSO was not willing to do this. There are other agencies which bring their prisoners to PBSO in order to process prisoners.

Motion

Commissioner Katz moved to approve. Commissioner McCray seconded the motion.

R15-073 - Approve award of the bid for a "Two Year Term for the Supply of Injection Molded Mobile Refuse Containers and Parts for the Automated Garbage Collection Program", Bid No. 048-2510-15/JMA, to Rehrig Pacific Company of Orlando, FL. Purchases will be made on an "AS NEEDED" basis, the annual anticipated expenditure is \$100,000.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST: BID TERM: JULY 20, 2015 to JULY 19, 2017

The Solid Waste Division of Public Works purchases mobile refuse carts for the automated garbage collection program. The carts are located at residences throughout the City, and are emptied by automated Solid Waste trucks twice weekly. Two cart sizes are offered to residents, 65 gallon and 95 gallon carts, which are specific to the automated vehicles.

On May 14, 2015, Procurement Services received two bids and one "no bid" in response to the advertised bid. The bids were evaluated by the Public Works Department for compliance with specifications and bid submittal requirements and it was determined that Rehrig Pacific Company is the lowest, responsive, responsible bidder.



- I. GENERAL
 - <u>General Description</u> The Mobile refuse container shall be designed to contain the average solid waste material accumulated by a household. The container shall be designed, such as to be lifted by either or both American Standard, semiautomated or fully automated collection equipment. The container shall be warranted against material and workmanship defects for no less than 10 years, non-prorated, during which time it will be generally maintenance-free under normal usage conditions. The bidder shall submit a copy of its warranty.
 - Quantity The successful bidder shall provide approximately 1,500 containers per year, in accordance with specifications. These containers will be provided on an "as needed" basis. Delivery dates to be at the City's discretion.



Container Resin Weight

When considering the overall strength characteristics and longevity of a plastic container, there are several factors to consider. Processing, material, engineering (design) and weight are all factors in determining the durability of an automated container. It is our belief that the resin weight of a cart is crucial when producing a cart that can absorb and withstand the abuse inflicted by today's collection equipment.

Rehrig Pacific manufactures carts using the injection molding process. Unlike the rotational and blow molding processes, the injection molding process allows the manufacturer to design molds that allow for additional plastic to be injected into the critical wear areas of the container, such as the sidewalls, bottom and the lifting skirt area. This added material is a crucial component and is what gives our container the strength and durability to withstand the rigors of automated collection equipment. Other manufacturing processes outside of injection molding do not possess this ability, making it impossible to reinforce the areas of a container that matter the most.

In recent years, some container manufacturers (both injection and rotational molders) have made the decision to introduce carts to the market that possess far less resin than their original designs. While it is unclear as to why this decision was made, rising costs of resin (raw material) appears to be the main factor. Some manufacturers have introduced carts with nearly 5 pounds less raw material (resin) to compete in the market. On a 34-pound cart (resin weight) this would represent roughly 15% less material. To include the reduction in resin weight, some of these manufacturers have decided to reduce or prorate their cart warranties to better prepare themselves for the increases in failures that they anticipate experiencing from these lower quality carts.

Unlike our competition, Rehrig Pacific Company has made the decision to continue to deliver high quality carts to the marketplace without compromising the durability of our products. Instead of removing plastic from our container, we have increased our capacity and moved our production closer to our customers. This allows us to better offset resin increases with lower freight rates.

Our container failure rate is approximately 0.25% and is testament to the design and durability of our products. Rehrig Pacific stands by our commitment to quality and we believe that we have the strongest and longest lasting container on the market today. That is why we continue to offer and stand by our 10-year, non-prorated warranty for our containers.

Stability and Maneuverability

Rehrig Pacific Company specifically designed its containers so that the cart is extremely stable and self-balancing when it is empty or loaded. The wide reinforced top lip gives strength to the cart body. The ground hugging features keep our cart stable even in high winds and on uneven terrain. Containers that do not have this feature have a tendency to fall over on their side after the container has been emptied at the curb.

Ergonomic design features such as our large heavy-duty handle make maneuvering our cart an effortless task. The integrated foot tilter on our 65 and 95-gallon carts help the resident handle a full cart with more ease.

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Plastic Material

Rehrig Pacific Company uses only the highest grade HDPE especially formulated to meet the demands of refuse and recycling bin and cart applications. We currently purchase our resin from DOW Plastics & Exxon Mobil. The DOW material used in the manufacturing of the Rehrig Pacific carts and bins is DMDB-7905 NT 7 and the Exxon material is HD-6605, both materials are a narrow molecular weight copolymer that is designed for a wide range of injection molding applications. The materials provide excellent impact strength, stress crack resistance and process ability. These materials are ideally suited for articles requiring rugged physical performance in cold temperature environments, such as refuse and recycling carts and bins. If you would like to learn more about these materials please reference the Materials Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) attached.

Ultraviolet Stabilization

Rehrig Pacific Company utilizes an H.A.L.S. (Hindered Amine Light Stabilizer) ultraviolet stabilizer (U.V.) package, which is considered a superior U.V. stabilizer package. This master-batch (or concentrate) contains maximum light stable color pigments that have the highest rating possible to prevent fading. The master-batch also contains ultraviolet inhibitors similar to or better than the Chemisorb 944 and thermal stabilizers in final levels to ensure minimal degradation in the field. At Rehrig Pacific we introduce our H.A.L.S. ultraviolet package into our rollout carts and bins at a 1.5%-2.0% let down ratio by total resin weight of the container.

In contrast to "screener" U.V. stabilizers, the H.A.L.S. package protects the plastic resin at the chemical level. The package is designed to seek damaged or broken polymer chains at the chemical level and repair and protect the polymer chains from U.V. rays, thus maintaining the physical material properties of the plastic resin and container. Other U.V. stabilizers act as "screeners", similar to suntan lotion, in which the stabilizer attempts to screen the plastic and container from U.V. rays. Unfortunately, moisture can wash off "screeners", leaving the container exposed to harmful U.V. rays.

Color deterioration is controlled by the quality and type of pigment, separate from the deterioration of physical properties. U.V. rays interact with the pigment and can modify the pigment, depending on the amount and intensity of the U.V. rays and the quality of the pigment. Certain color pigments are more difficult to control especially variations of the color red and bright fluorescent colors.

MINIMUM PERFORMANCE STANDARD: For this particular bid, 35 mph was set as the minimum wind velocity to tip in any of the three directions, and 25 mph for lid tip.

TEST PROCEDURE:

- 1. A large wind machine with a 54 inch diameter exit opening is used for the test. The wind was supplied by a Gates Super HC drive.
- 2. Position the cart 48 inches from the end of the exit opening. (Beyond stagnant air zone.)
- 3. The bottom of the cart is to be level with the exit opening and is to rest on a concrete surface that has a surface texture similar to a roadway.
- 4. The bottom of the cart is placed against the top half of a 1" wood dowel. The bottom half is wedged into the test foundation which the cart wheels rest on, with the dowel's length parallel to the ground surface, so that the slight ½" protrusion of the dowel holds back the cart edges and/or wheels to prevent the cart from rolling or sliding.
- 5. The wind velocity is raised until the cart starts to move. This wind speed is measured using a certified anemometer. The anemometer is moved along the windward edges of the cart to find the position with the highest wind velocity.
- 6. Measure the air velocity to tip the cart, at the position with the highest velocity.
- 7. Test cart three times each in each of the three orientations toward the wind tunnel opening front, side and back.



MINIMUM PERFORMANCE STANDARD: No standard has been set although some local standards may exist.

TEST PROCEDURE:

- 1. A large wind tunnel with a 54 inch diameter exit opening is used for the test. The wind was supplied by a Gates Super HC drive with capability to achieve various velocities.
- 2. Position the cart in the steady wind stream zone. (Approx. 48 inches from the opening.)
- 3. The bottom of the cart is to be level with the exit opening and is to rest on a concrete surface that has a surface texture similar to a roadway.
- 4. Test cart in three orientations toward the wind tunnel opening front, side and back.
- 5. In each orientation, the cart should be tested against a barrier to simulate performance against a street curb. The barrier should prevent the cart from sliding.
- 6. Measure the air velocity at the leading surface of the cart using a certified volometer. Placement of the volometer in front of the cart and a few inches down from the top of the cart is ideal.
- 7. The wind velocity is raised in increments with sufficient time between changes to monitor whether the cart is stable. The highest wind velocity achieved is recorded.
- 8. The carts are blocked against a barrier that is placed behind the wheels. The point of nonstability (end point) is when the cart tipped over. The wind speed is taken as the average of at least 3 repetitions.
- 9. Modifications in cart characteristics or positioning may also be tested and noted.

This endorsement modifies insurance provided under the following: COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY COVERAGE PART

- WHO IS AN INSURED (Section II) is amended to include any person or organization that you agree in a "written contract requiring insurance" to include as an additional insured on this Coverage Part, but:
 - a) Only with respect to liability for "bodily injury", "property damage" or "personal injury"; and
 - b) If, and only to the extent that, the injury or damage is caused by acts or omissions of you or your subcontractor in the performance of "your work" to which the "written contract requiring insurance" applies. The person or organization does not qualify as an additional insured with respect to the independent acts or omissions of such person or organization.
- **2.** The insurance provided to the additional insured by this endorsement is limited as follows:
 - a) In the event that the Limits of Insurance of this Coverage Part shown in the Declarations exceed the limits of liability required by the "written contract requiring insurance", the insurance provided to the additional insured shall be limited to the limits of liability required by that "written contract requiring insurance". This endorsement shall not increase the limits of insurance described in Section III Limits Of Insurance.
 - b) The insurance provided to the additional insured does not apply to "bodily injury", "property damage" or "personal injury" arising out of the rendering of, or failure to render, any professional architectural, engineering or surveying services, including:
 - i. The preparing, approving, or failing to prepare or approve, maps, shop drawings, opinions, reports, surveys, field orders or change orders, or the preparing, approving, or failing to prepare or approve, drawings and specifications; and
 - **ii.** Supervisory, inspection, architectural or engineering activities.

- c) The insurance provided to the additional insured does not apply to "bodily injury" or "property damage" caused by "your work" and included in the "products-completed operations hazard" unless the "written contract requiring insurance" specifically requires you to provide such coverage for that additional insured, and then the insurance provided to the additional insured applies only to such "bodily injury" or "property damage" that occurs before the end of the period of time for which the "written contract requiring insurance" requires you to provide such coverage or the end of the policy period, whichever is earlier.

The insurance provided to the additional insured by this endorsement is excess over any valid and collectible "other insurance", whether primary, excess, contingent or on any other basis, that is available to the additional insured for a loss we cover under this endorsement. However, if the "written contract requiring insurance" specifically requires that this insurance apply on a primary basis or a primary and non-contributory basis, this insurance is primary to "other insurance" available to the additional insured which covers that person or organization as a named insured for such loss, and we will not share with that "other insurance". But the insurance provided to the additional insured by this endorsement still is excess over any valid and collectible "other insurance", whether primary, excess, contingent or on any other basis, that is available to the additional insured when that person or organization is an additional insured under such "other insurance".

 - a) The additional insured must give us written notice as soon as practicable of an "occurrence" or an offense which may result in a claim. To the extent possible, such notice should include:

- ii. The names and addresses of any injured persons and witnesses; and
- **iii.** The nature and location of any injury or damage arising out of the "occurrence" or offense.

 - i. Immediately record the specifics of the claim or "suit" and the date received; and
 - ii. Notify us as soon as practicable.

- B. BLANKET ADDITIONAL INSURED BROAD FORM VENDORS

The following is added to SECTION II – WHO IS AN INSURED:

Any person or organization that is a vendor and that you have agreed in a written contract or agreement to include as an additional insured on this Coverage Part is an insured, but only with respect to liability for "bodily injury" or "property damage" that:

- a. Is caused by an "occurrence" that takes place after you have signed and executed that contract or agreement; and
- b. Arises out of 'your products' which are distributed or sold in the regular course of such vendor's business.

The insurance provided to such vendor is subject to the following provisions:

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COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY

- a. The limits of insurance provided to such vendor will be the limits which you agreed to provide in the written contract or agreement, or the limits shown in the Declarations of this Coverage Part, whichever are less.
- b. The insurance provided to such vendor does not apply to:
 - (1) "Bodily Injury" or "property damage" for which the vendor is obligated to pay damages by reason of the assumption of liability in a contract or agreement. This exclusion does not apply to liability for damages that the vendor would have in the absence of the contract or agreement;
 - (2) Any express warranty unauthorized by you;
 - (3) Any physical or chemical change in "your products" made intentionally by such vendor;
 - (4) Repackaging, unless unpacked solely for the purpose of inspection, demonstration, testing, or the substitution of parts under instructions from the manufacturer, and then repackaged in the original container;
 - (5) Any failure to make such inspections, adjustments, tests or servicing as vendors agree to perform or normally undertake to perform in the regular course of business, in connection with the distribution or sale of "your products";
 - (6) Demonstration, installation, servicing or repair operations, except such operations performed at such vendor's premises in connection with the sale of "your products"; or
 - (7) "Your products" which, after distribution or sale by you, have been labeled or relabeled or used as a container, part or ingredlent of any other thing or substance by or for such vendor.

Coverage under this provision does not apply to:

- Any person or organization from whom you have acquired "your products", or any ingredient, part or container entering into, accompanying or containing such products; or
- Any vendor for which coverage as an additional insured specifically is scheduled by endorsement.

C. DAMAGE TO PREMISES RENTED TO YOU

 The following replaces the last paragraph of Paragraph 2., Exclusions, of SECTION I – COVERAGES – COVERAGE A BODILY IN-

JURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABIL-ITY:

Exclusions c. through n. do not apply to damage to premises while rented to you, or temporarily occupied by you with permission of the owner, caused by:

- a. Fire;
- b. Explosion;
- c. Lightning;
- Smoke resulting from such fire, explosion, or lightning; or
- e. Water.

A separate limit of insurance applies to such damage to premises as described in Paragraph 6. of Section III – Limits Of Insurance.

This insurance does not apply to damage to premises while rented to you, or temporarily occupied by you with permission of the owner, caused by:

- Rupture, bursting, or operation of pressure relief devices;
- Rupture or bursting due to expansion or swelling of the contents of any building or structure, caused by or resulting from water;
- c. Explosion of steam boilers, steam pipes, steam engines, or steam turbines.
- The following replaces Paragraph 6. of SEC-TION III – LIMITS OF INSURANCE:

Subject to 5. above, the Damage To Premises Rented To You Limit is the most we will pay under Coverage A for damages because of "property damage" to any one premises while rented to you, or temporarily occupied by you with permission of the owner, caused by fire; explosion; lightning smoke resulting from such fire, explosion, or lightning; or water. The Damage To Premises Rented To You Limit will apply to all damage proximately caused by the same "occurrence", whether such damage results from fire; explosion; lightning; smoke resulting from such fire, explosion, or lightning; water; or any combination of any of these.

The Damage To Premises Rented To You Limit will be the higher of:

- a. \$300,000; or
- b. The amount shown on the Declarations of this Coverage Part for Damage To Premises Rented To You Limit.

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COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY

We waive this right where you have agreed to do so as part of a written contract, executed by you prior to loss.

Any person or organization that is a premises owner, manager or lessor and that you have agreed in a written contract or agreement to name as an additional insured on this Coverage Part is an insured, but only with respect to liability for "bodily injury", "property damage", "personal injury" or "advertising injury" that:

- a. Is "bodily injury" or "property damage" caused by an "occurrence" that takes place, or "personal injury" or "advertising injury" caused by an offense that is committed, after you have signed and executed that contract or agreement; and
- Arises out of the ownership, maintenance or use of that part of any premises leased to you.

The insurance provided to such premises owner, manager or lessor is subject to the following provisions:

- a. The limits of insurance provided to such premises owner, manager or lessor will be the limits which you agreed to provide in the written contract or agreement, or the limits shown on the Declarations of this Coverage Part, whichever are less.
- b. The insurance provided to such premises owner, manager or lessor does not apply to:
 - (1) "Bodily injury" or "property damage" caused by an "occurrence" that takes place, or "personal injury" or "advertising injury" caused by an offense that is committed, after you cease to be a tenant in that premises; or
 - (2) Structural alterations, new construction or demolition operations performed by or on behalf of such premises owner, manager or lessor.
- c. The insurance provided to such premises owner, manager or lessor is excess over any valid and collectible other insurance available to such premises owner, manager or lessor, unless you have agreed in a written contract for this insurance to apply on a primary or contributory basis.

F. BLANKET ADDITIONAL INSURED – LESSORS OF LEASED EQUIPMENT

The following is added to SECTION II – WHO IS AN INSURED:

Any person or organization that is an equipment lessor and that you have agreed in a written contract or agreement to include as an additional insured on this Coverage Part is an insured, but only with respect to liability for "bodily injury", "property damage", "personal injury" or "advertising injury" that:

a. Is "bodily injury" or "property damage" caused by an "occurrence" that takes place, or "personal injury" or "advertising injury" caused by an offense that is committed, after you have

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signed and executed that contract or agreement; and

b. Is caused, in whole or in part, by your acts or omissions in the maintenance, operation or use by you of equipment leased to you by such equipment lessor.

The insurance provided to such equipment lessor is subject to the following provisions:

- a. The limits of insurance provided to such equipment lessor will be the limits which you agreed to provide in the written contract or agreement, or the limits shown on the Declarations of this Coverage Part, whichever are less.
- b. The insurance provided to such equipment lessor does not apply to any "bodily injury" or "property damage" caused by an "occurrence" that takes place, or "personal injury" or "advertising injury" caused by an offense that is committed, after the equipment lease expires.
- c. The insurance provided to such equipment lessor is excess over any valid and collectible other insurance available to such equipment lessor, unless you have agreed in a written contract for this insurance to apply on a primary or contributory basis.

G. INCIDENTAL MEDICAL MALPRACTICE

 The following is added to the definition of "occurrence" in the DEFINITIONS Section:

Unless you are in the business or occupation of providing professional health care services, "occurrence" also means an act or omission committed in providing or failing to provide "incidental medical services" to a person.

The following is added to the DEFINITIONS Section:

"Incidental medical services" means:

- Medical, surgical, dental, laboratory, x-ray or nursing service or treatment, advice or instruction, or the related furnishing of food or beverages;
- b. The furnishing or dispensing of drugs or medical, dental, or surgical supplies or appliances;
- c. First aid; or
- d. "Good Samaritan services".

"Good Samaritan services" means any emergency medical services for which no compensation is demanded or received. The following is added to Paragraph 2.a.(1) of SECTION II – WHO IS AN INSURED:

Unless you are in the business or occupation of providing professional health care services, Paragraphs (1)(a), (b), (c) and (d) above do not apply to any "bodily injury" arising out of any providing or failing to provide "incidental medical services" by any of your "employees", other than an employed doctor. Any such "employees" providing or failing to provide "incidental medical services" during their work hours for you will be deemed to be acting within the scope of their employment by you or performing duties related to the conduct of your business.

 The following exclusion is added to Paragraph 2., Exclusions, of SECTION I – COV-ERAGES – COVERAGE A BODILY INJURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABILITY:

Sale Of Pharmaceuticals

"Bodily injury" or "property damage" arising out of the willful violation of a penal statute or ordinance relating to the sale of pharmaceuticals committed by, or with the knowledge or consent of, the insured.

 The following is added to Paragraph 5. of SECTION III – LIMITS OF INSURANCE:

For the purposes of determining the applicable Each Occurrence Limit, all related acts or omissions committed in the providing or failing to provide "incidental medical services" to any one person will be considered one "occurrence".

 The following is added to Paragraph 4.b., Excess Insurance, of SECTION IV – COM-MERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY CONDI-TIONS:

This insurance is excess over any valid and collectible other insurance, whether primary, excess, contingent or on any other basis, that is available to any of your "employees" for "bodily injury" that arises out of providing or failing to provide "incidental medical services" to any person to the extent not subject to Paragraph 2.a.(1) of SECTION II – WHO IS AN INSURED.

- H. PERSONAL INJURY ASSUMED BY CON-TRACT
 - The following replaces Exclusion e., Contractual Liability, in Paragraph 2. of SECTION I – COVERAGES – COVERAGE B PER-SONAL AND ADVERTISING INJURY LI-ABILITY:

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e. Contractual Liability

"Personal injury" or "advertising injury" for which the insured is obligated to pay damages by reason of the assumption of liability in a contract or agreement. This exclusion does not apply to:

- Liability for damages that the insured would have in the absence of the contract or agreement; or
- (2) Liability for damages because of "personal injury" assumed in a contract or agreement that is an "insured contract", provided that the "personal injury" is caused by an offense committed subsequent to the execution of the contract or agreement. Solely for the purposes of liability assumed in an "Insured contract", reasonable attorneys fees and necessary litigation expenses incurred by or for a party other than an insured will be deemed to be damages because of "personal injury", provided that:
 - (a) Liability to such party for, or for the cost of, that party's defense has also been assumed in the same "insured contract"; and
 - (b) Such attorney fees and litigation expenses are for defense of that party against a civil or alternative dispute resolution proceeding in which damages to which this insurance applies are alleged.
- The following replaces the third sentence of Paragraph 2. of SUPPLEMENTARY PAY-MENTS – COVERAGES A AND B:

Notwithstanding the provisions of Paragraph 2.b.(2) of Section I – Coverage A – Bodily Injury And Property Damage Liability or Paragraph 2.e. of Section I – Coverage B – Personal and Advertising Injury Liability, such payments will not be deemed to be damages because of "bodily injury", "property damage" or "personal injury", and will not reduce the limits of insurance.

- The following replaces Paragraph 2.d. of SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENTS – COVER-AGES A AND B:
 - d. The allegations in the "suit" and the information we know about the "occurrence" or offense are such that no conflict appears to exist between the interests of

the insured and the interests of the indemnitee;

- The following replaces the first subparagraph of Paragraph f. of the definition of "insured contract" in the DEFINITIONS Section:
 - f. That part of any other contract or agreement pertaining to your business (including an indemnification of a municipality in connection with work performed for a municipality) under which you assume the tort liability of another party to pay for "bodily injury," "property damage" or "personal injury" to a third person or organization. Tort liability means a liability that would be imposed by law in the absence of any contract or agreement.

I. AMENDED BODILY INJURY DEFINITION

The following replaces the definition of "bodily injury" in the DEFINITIONS Section:

"Bodily injury" means bodily injury, mental anguish, mental injury, shock, fright, disability, humiliation, sickness or disease sustained by a person, including death resulting from any of these at any time.

J. BODILY INJURY TO CO-EMPLOYEES AND CO-VOLUNTEER WORKERS

The following is added to Paragraph 2.a.(1) of SECTION II – WHO IS AN INSURED:

Paragraph (1)(a) above does not apply to 'bodily injury" to a co-"employee" in the course of the co-"employee's" employment by you or performing duties related to the conduct of your business, or to "bodily injury" to your other 'volunteer workers" while performing duties related to the conduct of your business.

K. AIRCRAFT CHARTERED WITH CREW

The following is added to Exclusion g., Aircraft, Auto Or Watercraft, in Paragraph 2. of SECTION I – COVERAGES – COVERAGE A BODILY IN-JURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABILITY:

This exclusion does not apply to an aircraft that is:

- (a) Chartered with crew to any insured:
- (b) Not owned by any insured; and
- (c) Not being used to carry any person or property for a charge.

L. NON-OWNED WATERCRAFT

 The following replaces Paragraph (2) of Exclusion g., Aircraft, Auto Or Watercraft, in Paragraph 2. of SECTION I – COVERAGES – COVERAGE A BODILY INJURY AND PROPERTY DAMAGE LIABILITY:

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- (2) A watercraft you do not own that is:
 - (a) Fifty feet long or less; and
 - (b) Not being used to carry any person or property for a charge.
- 2. The following is added to Paragraph 2. of SECTION II – WHO IS AN INSURED:

Any person or organization that, with your express or implied consent, either uses or is responsible for the use of a watercraft that you do not own that is:

- (1) Fifty feet long or less; and
- (2) Not being used to carry any person or property for a charge.
- M. INCREASED SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENTS
 - The following replaces Paragraph 1.b. of SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENTS – COVER-AGES A AND B of SECTION I – COVER-AGES:
 - b. Up to \$2,500 for cost of bail bonds required because of accidents or traffic law violations arising out of the use of any vehicle to which the Bodily Injury Liability Coverage applies. We do not have to furnish these bonds.
 - The following replaces Paragraph 1.d. of SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENTS – COVER-AGES A AND B of SECTION I – COVER-AGES:
 - d. All reasonable expenses incurred by the insured at our request to assist us in the investigation or defense of the claim or "suit", including actual loss of earnings up to \$500 a day because of time off from work.
- N. MEDICAL PAYMENTS INCREASED LIMIT

The following replaces Paragraph 7. of SECTION III – LIMITS OF INSURANCE:

- Subject to 5. above, the Medical Expense Limit is the most we will pay under Coverage C. for all medical expenses because of "bodily injury" sustained by any one person, and will be the higher of:
 - (a) \$10,000; or
 - (b) The amount shown on the Declarations of this Coverage Part for Medical Expense Limit.
- O. KNOWLEDGE AND NOTICE OF OCCUR-RENCE OR OFFENSE

The following is added to Paragraph 2., Duties In The Event of Occurrence, Offense, Claim or Suit, of SECTION IV – COMMERCIAL GEN-ERAL LIABILITY CONDITIONS:

- e. The following provisions apply to Paragraph a. above, but only for the purposes of the insurance provided under this Coverage Part to you or any insured listed in Paragraph 1. or 2. of Section II – Who Is An Insured:
 - (1) Notice to us of such "occurrence" or offense must be given as soon as practicable only after the "occurrence" or offense is known to you (if you are an individual), any of your partners or members who is an individual (if you are a partnership or joint venture), any of your managers who is an individual (if you are a limited liability company), any of your trustees who is an individual (if you are a trust), any of your "executive officers" or directors (if you are an organization other than a partnership, joint venture, limited liability company or trust) or any "employee" authorized by you to give notice of an "occurrence" or offense.
 - (2) If you are a partnership, joint venture, imited liability company or trust, and none of your partners, joint venture members, managers or trustees are individuals, notice to us of such "occurrence" or offense must be given as soon as practicable only after the "occurrence" or offense is known by:
 - (a) Any individual who is:
 - A partner or member of any partnership or joint venture;
 - (ii) A manager of any limited liability company;
 - (iii) A trustee of any trust, or
 - (iv) An executive officer or director of any other organization;

that is your partner, joint venture member, manager or trustee; or

After reviewing the two (2) bid submittals, Staff has recommended the project be awarded to Anzco, Inc. as the lowest, responsive, responsible bidder.

The cost of this will be submitted to FEMA for reimbursement.

The netting provides safety for the players, parents, and visitors to the park. Without this netting the risk of injury is significantly increased.

METHOD OF AWARD: Successful Bidder awarded shall ensure that proper and sufficient staff, equipment, organization, etc. will be provided for this contract to meet the specifications denoted herein at a paramount level.

Once opened, the bids will be tabulated and evaluated by the City before recommendation and/or notice of intent to award. The City, in its sole discretion, reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids for any reason whatsoever. The City further reserves the right to waive irregularities and technicalities and/or to request resubmission. There is no obligation on the part of the City to award the bid to the lowest bidder, or any bidder. The City reserves the right to make the award to a responsible bidder submitting a responsive bid most advantageous and in the best interest of the City. The City shall be the sole judge of the bids and the City's decision shall be final.

The City intends to award a contract to the lowest, responsive, responsible total price bidder for, taking into consideration experience, staffing, equipment, materials, references and past performance.

INSURANCE: It shall be the responsibility of the successful bidder to maintain workers' compensation insurance, property damage, liability insurance and vehicular liability insurance, during the time any of bidder's personnel are working on City of Boynton Beach property. - Refer to the Scope of Work, Item 4 is revised as follows:
 - "4. The new fence shall be installed per the 2017 Florida Building Code, 6th Edition or most current and any County and/or local laws, ordinances, codes and regulations.
 - a. Existing netting poles, netting, wire, and hardware.
 - i. Existing poles that support the existing netting that are part of the existing chain link fence shall be cut to match the existing chain link fence pole height and capped.

Responses shall be <u>signed</u> above the <u>typed or printed name and title</u> of the signer. The signer shall have the authority to contractually bind the proposer to the submitted bid. Bidder must note their Federal I.D. number on their bid submittal.

<u>FAMILIARITY WITH LAWS:</u> The bidder is presumed to have full knowledge of and be in compliance with all Federal, State, and Local laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations that in any manner affect the equipment and the services provided to the City. Ignorance on the part of the bidder will in no way relieve bidder of responsibility to adhere to such regulations.

<u>BID FORMS:</u> The bidder will submit a bid on the bid forms provided. All bid prices, amounts and descriptive information must be legibly entered. The bidder must state the price and the time of delivery for which they propose to deliver the equipment or service requested. The bidder IS required to be licensed to do business as an individual, partnership or corporation in the State of Florida. Place all required bid forms in a sealed envelope that has the company's name and address, proposal title, number, proposal date and time on the outside of the sealed envelope. Proposals not submitted on appropriate proposal forms may be rejected. All proposals are subject to the conditions specified herein. Proposals which do not comply with these conditions are subject to rejection.

<u>EXECUTION OF BID:</u> Proposal must contain an original signature of an authorized representative in the space provided on all affidavits and proposal sheets.

<u>NO BID</u>: If not submitting a proposal, respond by returning one copy of the "STATEMENT OF NO BID" and explain the reason by indicating one of the reasons listed or in the space provided. Repeated failure to quote without sufficient justification shall be cause for removal of the vendor's name from the mailing list. NOTE: To qualify as a respondent, bidder must submit a "NO BID" and it must be received no later than the stated bid receiving date and hour.

<u>BID DEADLINE:</u> It is the bidder's responsibility to assure that the bid is delivered at the proper time and place prior to the bid deadline. The City of Boynton Beach is <u>not</u> responsible for the U.S. Mail or private couriers in regards to mail being delivered by a specified time so that a proposal can be considered. Bids which for any reason are delivered by the deadline will not be considered. If no award has been made, the City reserves the right to consider bids that have been determined by the City to be received late due to mishandling by the City after receipt of the bid. Offers by telegram or telephone are not acceptable.

<u>MINOR IRREGULARITIES/RIGHT TO REJECT</u>: Bidders are expected to examine the specifications, delivery schedules, Bid prices and extensions and all instructions pertaining to supplies and services. Failure to do so will be at the bidder's risk. The City of Boynton Beach reserves the right to waive irregularities or informalities in Bids or to reject all Bids or any part of any Bid deemed necessary for the best interest of the City. The City may reject any response not submitted in the manner specified by the solicitation documents.

<u>RIGHTS OF THE CITY:</u> The City expressly reserves the right to:

- A. Waive as an informality, minor deviations from specifications at a lower price than the most responsive, responsible bidder meeting all aspects of the specifications and consider it, if it is determined that total cost is lower and the overall function is improved or not impaired;
- B. Waive any defect, irregularity or informality in any bid or bidding procedure;
- C. Reject or cancel any or all bids;
- D. Reissue an Invitation to Bid;
- E. Extend the bid deadline time and date;
- F. Procure any item by other means;
- G. Increase or decrease the quantity specified in the Invitation to Bid;
- H. Consider and accept an alternate bid as provided herein when most advantageous to the City.

<u>STANDARDS</u>: Factors to be considered in determining whether the standard of responsibility has been met include whether a prospective bidder has:

- A. Available the appropriate financial, material, equipment, facility and personnel resources and expertise, or the ability to obtain such, necessary to indicate its capability to meet all contractual requirements;
- B. A satisfactory record of performance;
- C. A satisfactory record of integrity;
- D. Qualified legally to Contract within the State of Florida and the City of Boynton Beach;
- E. Supplied all necessary information in connection with the inquiry concerning responsibility.

<u>INFORMATION AND DESCRIPTIVE LITERATURE</u>: Bidders must furnish all information requested in the spaces provided on the bid form. Further, as may be specified elsewhere, each bidder must submit for bid evaluation cuts, sketches, and descriptive literature and technical specifications covering the products offered. Reference to literature submitted with a previous bid or on file with the buyer will not satisfy this provision.

<u>INTERPRETATIONS:</u> Any questions concerning conditions and specifications should be directed to this office in writing no later than ten (10) days prior to the bid deadline. Inquiries must reference the date by which the bid is to be received.

<u>CONFLICT OF INTEREST</u>: The award hereunder is subject to all conflict of interest provisions of the City of Boynton Beach, Palm Beach County, of the State of Florida.

<u>ADDITIONAL QUANTITIES:</u> The City reserves the right to acquire additional quantities of the bid products or services at the prices bid in this invitation. If additional quantities are not acceptable, the bid sheets must be noted **"BID IS FOR SPECIFIED QUANTITY ONLY".**

SAMPLES: Samples of items, when called for, must be furnished free of expense, and if not used, tested or destroyed, upon request, will be returned at the bidder's expense. Request for City of Boynton Beach 5 Bid No. 014-1211-18/IT the return of samples may be made within ten (10) days following the bid deadline. Each individual sample must be labeled with the bidder's name, manufacturer's brand name and number, and item reference.

<u>DEMONSTRATIONS</u>: Performance of the equipment/services upon request can be deemed a part of the evaluation process in determining the award of bidder. Demonstrations of the merits of the equipment/services that meet City requirements shall be requested by Procurement Services. Equipment demonstrated shall be a minimum of one (1) year old. All required staff, to be assigned per the individual bid product or service application, will form the Bid Award Committee to evaluate and submit a group award recommendation. The City reserves the right to make separate and independent awards based on its needs and the combined evaluation results.

<u>SUBCONTRACTING</u>: If a bidder subcontracts any portion of a Contract for any reason, the bidder must state the name and address of the subcontractor and the name of the person to be contacted on the attached "Schedule of Subcontractors". The City of Boynton Beach reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids wherein a subcontractor is named and to make the award to the bidder, who, in the opinion of the City, will be in the best interest of and/or most advantageous to the City. The City also reserves the right to reject a bid of any bidder if the bid names a subcontractor who has previously failed in the proper performance of an award or failed to deliver on time Contracts of a similar nature, or who is not in a position to perform properly under this award. The City reserves all rights in order to make a determination as to the foregoing.

<u>ADDENDA:</u> From time to time, the City may issue an addendum to change the intent or to clarify the meaning of the Contract documents. Since all addenda are available to bidders at Procurement Services, it is each bidder's responsibility to check with Procurement Services and immediately secure all addenda before submitting bids. It is the usual practice for the City to mail an addendum to known bidders, but it cannot be guaranteed that all bidders will receive ALL addenda in this manner. Each bidder shall acknowledge receipt of ALL addenda by notation on the bid and shall adhere to all requirements specified in each addendum prior to submission of the bid.

<u>ESCALATOR CLAUSE:</u> Any bid which is submitted subject to an escalator clause will be rejected, unless addressed in the Special Conditions Section of the bid documents.

<u>EXCEPTIONS:</u> Incorporation in a bid of exceptions to any portion(s), of the Contract documents may invalidate the bid. Exceptions to the Technical and Special Provisions shall be clearly and specifically noted in the bidder's submittal on a separate sheet marked "**EXCEPTIONS TO THE SPECIFICATIONS**" and this sheet shall be attached to the bid. The use of bidder's standard forms, or the inclusion of manufacturer's printed documents shall not be construed as constituting an exception within the intent of the Contract documents.

<u>ALTERNATES:</u> Where a base bid is provided for, the bidder shall submit a bid on the base bid and may exercise their own prerogative in submitting a bid on alternate items. The Owner reserves the right to accept or reject the alternates or base bid or any combination thereof. The Owner, or a representative, further reserves the unqualified right to determine whether any particular item or items of material, equipment, or the like, is an approved equal, and reserves the unqualified right to a final decision regarding the approval or rejection of the same.

NONCONFORMANCE TO CONTRACT CONDITIONS: Items may be tested for compliance with specifications under the direction of appropriate testing laboratories. The data derived from any tests for compliance with specifications are public records and open to examination thereto in accordance with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. delivered as per delivery date in the bid and or Purchase Order may result in the bidder being found in default in which event any and all procurement costs may be charged against the defaulted Contractor. Any violation of these stipulations may also result in the vendor's name being removed from the City of Boynton Beach's vendor mailing list.

<u>DISPUTES:</u> In case of any doubt or difference of opinion as to the items to be furnished hereunder, the decision of the City Manager shall be final and binding on both parties.

<u>ANTITRUST CAUSE OF ACTION</u>: In submitting a bid to the City of Boynton Beach, the bidder offers and agrees that if the bid is accepted, the bidder will convey, sell, assign or transfer to the City of Boynton Beach all rights, title and interest in and to all causes of action it may now or hereafter acquire under the antitrust laws of the United States and State of Florida for price fixing relating to the particular commodities or services purchased or acquired by the City of Boynton Beach. At the City of Boynton Beach's discretion, such assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the purchasing agency tenders final payment to the bidder.

<u>GOVERNMENTAL RESTRICTIONS:</u> In the event any governmental restrictions may be imposed which would necessitate alteration of the material, quality, workmanship or performance of the items offered on this submittal prior to their delivery, it shall be the responsibility of the successful bidder to notify the City at once, indicating in a letter the specific regulation which required an alteration. The City reserves the right to accept any such alterations, including any price adjustments occasioned thereby, or to cancel the Contract at no expense to the City.

<u>LEGAL REQUIREMENTS:</u> Federal, State, County, and City laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations that in any manner affect the items covered herein apply. Lack of knowledge by the bidder will in no way be a cause for relief from responsibility.

<u>PUBLIC ENTITY CRIMES</u>: As provided in Fla. Stat. § 287.133(2)(a), a person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a Bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a Bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit Bids on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and my not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided S.S. 287.017 for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.

BID GUARANTEE/BID BOND:

All bids shall be submitted upon the bid form(s) herein, or verbatim copy thereof. Bids shall be accompanied by an acceptable 5% bid bond, cash, certified check, or money order if the bid amount exceeds \$25,000.00. Said bid bond is to be furnished and executed by a surety company of recognized standing, authorized to do business in the State of Florida, and having a Registered Agent in Florida for purposes of service of process. The bid bond amount shall be 5% of the bid price and shall constitute a guarantee that the contractor, if awarded the contract, will enter into a written contract with the City to perform this work pursuant to the bid.

Guarantee of the successful bidder shall be forfeited to the City upon the successful bidder's failure or refusal to execute and deliver the Contract and bonds required within ten (10) days after he has received the Contracts for execution, not as a penalty, but as liquidated damages for the costs and expense incurred should said bidder fail to submit satisfactory surety or fail to comply with any other requirements of the specifications or of his bid. Such, checks or Bid Bonds will be returned to all except the awarded vendor after Commission award. The awarded

vendor's bid bond will be returned upon receipt of: Payment Bond, Public Construction Bond, Contract, and insurance requirements.

PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION BOND:

A. Bidder shall submit in conjunction with its bid a statement identifying the surety company or companies which will provide the Public Construction Bond required under the terms of the Contract should bidder be the successful bidder and be awarded the Contract. The disclosure shall contain an affirmation by bidder that the surety so designated has preliminarily agreed to issue the Public Construction Bond required under the terms of the Contract should bidder be awarded the Contract.

B. Within ten (10) days of receipt of the Contract documents for execution, the successful bidder shall furnish a Public Construction Bond in the amount of 100 percent of the accepted bid as security for faithful performance of his Contract and for payment of all persons performing labor or furnishing materials in connection therewith, prepared on the form or bond attached hereto.

C. The Contractor is required at all times to have a valid Public Construction Bond in force covering the work being performed. A failure to have such bond in force at any time shall constitute a default on the part of the Contractor.

If the surety company writing the Public Construction Bond becomes disqualified according to the provisions of Article 18 below, then this shall automatically constitute failure on the part of the Contractor to meet the above requirements unless Contractor provides substitute Public Construction Bond within thirty (30) days of written demand by the CITY.

D. The Public Construction Bond shall continue in effect for one (1) year after completion and acceptance of the work with liability equal to 25% of Contract price, or an additional bond shall be conditioned that the Contractor will, upon notification by the City, correct any defective or faulty work or materials which appear within one (1) year after completion of the Contract.

POWER OF ATTORNEY:

Attorneys-in-fact who sign Bid Bonds or Contract Bonds shall file with each bond an original, certified and dated copy of their power of attorney.

QUALIFICATION OF SURETY:

The Bid Bond and the Public Construction Bond shall be executed by a surety company of recognized standing authorized to do business in the State of Florida and having a resident agent in the State of Florida for purposes of service of process. The surety company shall hold a current certificate of authority as acceptable surety on Federal Bonds, in accordance with U.S. Department of Treasury Circular 570, current revision, or meet the criteria established as to acceptable surety companies by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, March 18, 1958, or the equivalent thereof. A surety shall be deemed not qualified if the surety shall have a receiver appointed for it, or if it shall declare or file or has filed for bankruptcy.

<u>ADVERTISING:</u> In submitting a bid, the bidder agrees not to use the results as a part of any commercial advertising. Violation of this stipulation may be subject to action covered under "NONCONFORMANCE WITH CONTRACT CONDITIONS".

<u>ASSIGNMENT:</u> Any Purchase Order issued pursuant to this bid invitation and the funds which may be come due hereunder are not assignable except with the prior written approval of the City.

LIABILITY: The selected bidder(s) shall hold and save harmless the City of Boynton Beach, Florida its officers, agents, volunteers and employees from liability of any kind in the performance of this Contract. Further, the selected bidder(s) shall indemnify, save harmless and undertake the defense of the City, its City Commissioners, agents, servants an employees from and against any and all claims, suits, actions, damages, or causes of action arising during the term of this Contract, for any personal or bodily injury, loss of life, or damage to property arising directly or indirectly from bidder's operation pursuant to this Contract and from and against all costs, counsel fees, expenses and liabilities incurred in an about any such claims, the investigation thereof, or the defense of any action or proceedings brought thereon, and from and against any orders or judgments which may be entered therein. The City shall notify the bidder within ten (10) days of receipt by the City of any claim, suit or action against the City arising directly or indirectly from the operations of the bidder hereunder, for which the City may be entitled to a claim or indemnity against the bidder, under the provisions of this Contract. Bidder shall have the right to control the defense of any such claim suit or actions. The bidder shall also be liable to the City for all costs, expenses, attorneys' fees and damages which may be incurred or sustained by the City by reason of the bidder's breach of any of the provision of the contract. Bidder shall not be responsible for negligent acts of the City or its employees.

<u>OPTIONAL CONTRACT USAGE BY OTHER GOVERNMANTAL AGENCIES</u>: If a bidder is awarded a contract as a result of the solicitation, if bidder has sufficient capacity or quantities available, provide to other governmental agencies, so requesting, the products or services awarded in accordance with the terms and conditions of the solicitation and resulting contract. Prices shall be F.O.B. Destination to the requesting agency.

<u>AWARD OF CONTRACT:</u> The low monetary bid will <u>NOT</u> in all cases be awarded the Contract or Purchase Order. Contracts or Purchase Orders will be awarded by the City to the most responsive, responsible bidder whose bid represents the most advantageous bid to the City, price and other factors considered. Evaluation of bids will be made based upon the evaluation factors and standards set forth herein. The City reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to waive technical errors as set forth herein. In the event of a Court challenge to an award by any bidder, damages, if any, resulting from an award shall be limited to actual bid preparation costs incurred by the challenging bidder. In no case will the award be made until all necessary investigations have been made into the responsibility of the bidder and the City is satisfied that the most responsive, responsible bidder is qualified to do the work and has the necessary organization, capital and equipment to carry out the required work within the time specified.

<u>AS SPECIFIED:</u> A Purchase Order will be issued to the successful bidder with the understanding that all items/services delivered must meet the specifications herein. Items/services delivered not as specified, will be returned at no expense or penalty to the City of Boynton Beach.

<u>DELIVERY</u>: Prices shall be quoted F.O.B. Boynton Beach, Florida. F.O.B. destination indicates that the seller is responsible for the shipment until it reaches its destination. Any and all freight charges are to be included in the bid total. The bidder's invoice payment terms must be shown.

<u>WARRANTY REQUIREMENTS:</u> Each item, including all components and all installed accessories and equipment, shall be guaranteed by the bidder to be free of defective parts and workmanship. This warranty shall be for a period of <u>365</u> days or the time designated in the standard factory warranty, whichever is longer. The warranty will be the same as that offered to the commercial trade and shall be honored by any of the manufacturer's authorized dealers. Warranty will cover parts, labor and any necessary shipping. Warranty repairs may be accomplished on City property, if space is available; this will be at the sole discretion of the City. Contact Procurement Services for permission to perform warranty service on City property. Warranty to start at the time of acceptance by the City; however, in cases where vehicles or

equipment are not immediately placed in service, the bidder will provide a delay of warranty start-up time. The period of warranty delay will be coordinated by Procurement Services.

<u>PRICES, TERMS AND PAYMENT:</u> Firm prices shall be quoted, typed or printed in ink, and include all packing, handling, shipping charges and delivery to the destination shown herein. Bidder is requested to offer a cash discount for prompt invoice payment. Discount time will be computed from the date of satisfactory delivery at place of acceptance or from receipt of correct invoice at the office specified, whichever is later.

Upon delivery, the City shall make final inspection. If this inspection shows that the equipment/service has been delivered/performed in a satisfactory manner in accordance with the specifications, the City shall receive the same. Final payment due the bidder shall be withheld until visual inspection is made by the **PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT** and merits of performance evaluated. Bidder further certifies that if awarded as the successful bidder, and the material equipment, etc. delivered is subsequently found to be deficient in any O.S.H.A. requirement in effect on date of delivery, all costs necessary to bring the materials, equipment, etc., into compliance with the aforementioned requirements shall be borne by the bidder.

Bidder certifies that all employees, subcontractors, agents, etc. shall comply with all O.S.H.A. and State safety regulations and requirements.

PALM BEACH COUNTY INSPECTOR GENERAL:

The contractor is aware that the Inspector General of Palm Beach County has the authority to investigate and audit matters relating to the negotiation and performance of any contracts resulting from this solicitation, and in furtherance thereof, may demand and obtain records and testimony from the contractor and its subcontractors and lower tier subcontractors. The contractor understands and agrees that in addition to all other remedies and consequences provided by law, the failure of the contractor or its subcontractors or lower tier subcontractors to fully cooperate with the Inspector General when requested, may be deemed by the municipality to be a material breach of this contract justifying its termination.

<u>PUBLIC RECORDS</u>: Sealed documents received by the City in response to an invitation are exempt from public records disclosure until thirty (30) days after the opening of the Bid unless the City announces intent to award sooner, in accordance with Florida Statutes 119.07.

The City is public agency subject to Chapter 119, Florida Statutes. The Contractor shall comply with Florida's Public Records Law. Specifically, the Contractor shall:

- A. Keep and maintain public records required by the CITY to perform the service;
- B. Upon request from the CITY's custodian of public records, provide the CITY with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in chapter 119, Fla. Stat. or as otherwise provided by law;
- C. Ensure that public records that are exempt or that are confidential and exempt from public record disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and, following completion of the contract, Contractor shall destroy all copies of such confidential and exempt records remaining in its possession once the Contractor transfers the records in its possession to the CITY; and
- D. 

 - iii. Guy hooks, steel, and anchors are to be galvanized.
- d. Install new netting
 - i. Netting shall extend 5' (five feet) beyond the height of the backstop.
 - 1. Field 1
 - 2. Field 2
 - ii. Netting shall extend 20' (twenty feet) above existing chain link fence.
 - 1. Field 3
 - 2. Field 4
 - iii. All netting shall be broken into sections, from pole to pole (max. pole span 35' (thirty-five feet).
 - iv. All netting shall have a heavy duty top and bottom cable. Cable shall be a minimum of 3/16"
 - v. Snap hooks to secure netting to cable shall be stainless, 2-3/8" in length.
 - vi. All netting shall be jet-dyed all the way through, #36 x 1-7/8" twisted knotted square mesh nylon netting panels (min. 340lb tensile strength with a 3/8" solid rope border (min. 2440lb tensile strength breaking strength).
 - vii. All netting shall be secured to the top and bottom cables using snap hooks, one edge of the netting shall be permanently secured to pole."

- Q3: In regards to the netting being retractable, are we using the 2 3/8" stainless steel snap hooks on the top, bottom, as well as both sides of the netting? Or are we using the snap hooks on 3 sides and making 1 side permanent? If we are to make one side permanent can we use steel galvanized hog rings.
- A3: The Scope of Work has been revised per this Addendum. See revised Scope of Work 4.d.
- Q4: Scope of work calls for netting to be 5' beyond height of backstop for field number 1 and 2, also scope of work says 20' above chain link field 3 and 4, I just want to clarify, are we are going 20' above all chain link fences on all 4 fields and only going 5' tall above fence on fields above back stops?
- A4: See Scope of Work 4.d.i .1, 4.d.i.2, 4.d.ii.1, and 4.d.ii.2. Fields 1 and 2 the netting shall be 5' beyond height of backstop. Fields 3 and 4 the netting shall be 20' above existing chain link fence.
- Q5: Do you want all posts evenly spaced or would you rather all posts be spaced 35' apart and then at the end of a run we have a short section?
- A5: See Scope of Work 4.b.ii and 4.b.iii.



REQUESTED ACTION BY COMMISSION: PROPOSED ORDINANCE NO. 18-005 - SECOND READING - Approve Telecommunications in Public Rights-of-Way (CDRV 18-001) - Amending Part II Code of Ordinances Chapter 25.1 Communications Facilities in Right-of-Way for consistency with the State's Advanced Wireless Infrastructure Deployment Act. City-initiated. (*Tabled to May 1,* 2018)

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

The Florida legislature adopted the Advanced Wireless Infrastructure Deployment Act effective July 1, 2017 that revised regulations applicable to communications facilities in the public rights-of-way. The proposed amendments are to Chapter 25.1 of Part II of the Code of Ordinances. Staff has simultaneously prepared related amendments to Chapter 3 of Part III. Land Development Regulations, to maintain consistency with the proposed amendments to Chapter 25.1. The proposed amendments to Chapter 3 also include provisions for amateur radio towers and antennas to ensure compliance with requirements and restrictions of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). The amendments to Chapter 3 are now being processed under a separate ordinance, and will soon return to the Commission for consideration.

The proposed code revisions establish uniform standards and guidelines for the siting, design, and permitting of communication towers, communication antennas, and wireless communication facilities sited within public rights-of-way, and establish review procedures to ensure that applications for same are acted upon consistent with state and federal laws. The recommended amendments also seek to minimize visual and other impacts of wireless communication facilities on surrounding areas by establishing standards for location, design, landscape screening, and compatibility.

Following First Reading of the Ordinance, and receipt of feedback from representatives for certain communications and telecommunications companies, staff made additional revisions to the proposed regulations taking into consideration the comments from others while maintaining compliance with and/or furthering the intent of the Act.

Second Reading for this item was tabled at the April 17th hearing to allow additional time for staff to review last minute comments received from Verizon and T-Mobile, and draft any warranted changes. Staff forwards this item to the Commission for Second Reading with changes to the proposed ordinance, involving Sections 25.1-6(8)(b)(10) and 25.1-6(12)(b)(1). The changes involve the application submittal requirements for a tower in the right-of-way, and the restriction on the size of an antenna and potential conflict with State Law. Specifically, the first change would eliminate the requirement for photographs showing site conditions and conditions of adjacent properties, and only require the "graphic depictions and or simulated renderings" as required in sub-paragraph (10)(b) if the tower is not meeting the stealth standards, by placing this requirement under Section 25.1-6(12)(b). This same section would also be edited with appropriate wording indicating the specific intent of the sub-section to not conflict with the size allowance of State Law.

PART II. CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 25.1 - COMMUNICATIONS RIGHTS-OF-WAY

Sec. 25.1-1 Title.

This Chapter shall be known and may be cited as the City of Boynton Beach Communications <u>Facilities in Public</u> Rights-of Way Ordinance.

Sec. 25.1-2. Intent and Purpose; <u>Applicability to State-controlled Rights-of-Way</u>.

(1) Intent and purpose. It is the intent of the city to promote the public health, safety and general welfare by: (a) providing for the placement or maintenance of communications facilities in the public rights-of-way within the city; (b) adopting and administering reasonable rules and regulations not inconsistent with state and federal law, including Florida Statutes § 337.401 as it may be amended by the Advanced Wireless Deployment Act, the city's home-rule authority, and in accordance with the provisions of the Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 and other federal and state law; (c) establishing reasonable rules and regulations necessary to manage the placement or maintenance of communications facilities in the public rights-of-way by all communications services providers; (d) protecting the city's unique and extraordinary aesthetic gualities; and (e) minimizing disruption to the public rights-of-way. In regulating its public rights-of-way, the city shall be governed by and shall comply with all applicable federal and state laws.

(2) <u>State-controlled rights-of-way.</u> This chapter shall apply to wireless and communications facilities in public rights-of-way under the control and jurisdiction of the city. This article shall also apply to wireless and communications facilities in public rights-of-way under the control and jurisdiction of the Florida Department of Transportation, provided that the City is authorized to apply this article under a permit-delegation agreement between the city and Department in accordance with F.S. § 337.401(1)(a), or as otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 25.1-3. Definitions.

(1) Generally. For purposes of this chapter, the following terms, phrases, words and their abbreviations <u>and derivations</u> shall have the meaning given herein, unless otherwise expressly stated. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future tense; words in the plural number include the singular number; and words in the singular number include the plural number; and the masculine gender includes the feminine gender. "And" and "or" may be read conjunctively or disjunctively. The words "shall" and "will" are mandatory, and "may" is permissive. Unless otherwise expressly stated, words not defined in this chapter shall be given the meaning set forth in Title 47 of the United States Code, and, if not defined therein, their common and ordinary meaning. References to governmental entities (whether persons or entities) refer to those entities or their successors in authority. If specific provisions of law referred to herein are renumbered, then the reference shall be interpreted broadly to cover government actions, however nominated, and include laws, ordinances and regulations now in force or hereinafter enacted or amended.

(2) Definitions:

Abandonment shall mean the permanent cessation of all uses of a communications facility; provided that this term shall not include cessation of all use of a facility within a physical structure where the physical structure continues to be used. For example, cessation of all use of a cable

within a conduit, where the conduit continues to be used, shall not be *Abandonment* of a facility in public rights-of-way.

Antenna means any transmitting or receiving device mounted on, within, or incorporated into a or structure and used in communications that radiate or capture electromagnetic waves, digital signals, analog signals, radio frequencies (excluding radar signals), light, wireless telecommunications signals or other communication signals. For the purposes of this, the term "antenna" does not include any device designed for over-the-air reception of radio or television broadcast signals, or multi-channel multi-point distribution service.

Applicable codes means uniform building, fire, electrical, plumbing, or mechanical codes adopted by a recognized national code organization and the Florida Building Code and the Florida Fire Prevention Code and or local amendments to those codes enacted to address building, accessibility and fire code standards and threats of destruction of property or injury to persons, or local codes or ordinances adopted to implement this subsection. The term includes objective design standards adopted by ordinance that may require a small wireless facility to meet reasonable location context, color, stealth, and concealment requirements. The term also includes objective design standards adopted by ordinance that may require a new utility pole that replaces an existing utility pole to be of substantially similar design, material, and color or that may require reasonable spacing requirements concerning the location of ground-mounted equipment.

Applicant means the person registering and applying to locate wireless facilities in the right-ofway of the city and includes the applicant's successors-in-interest and anyone owning and maintaining the wireless facilities.

<u>Application means a request submitted by an application to an authority for a permit to place or co-locate wireless facilities.</u>

Authority means a county or municipality having jurisdiction and control of the public rights-of-way of any public road.

City shall mean the City of Boynton Beach, Florida. <u>Where appropriate, the word "City" may refer</u> to the City Commission or the relevant City officer or Board considering an application under this chapter.

<u>City-owned real property means real property to which the city holds title, easement, or a leasehold interest, but does not include the public rights-of-way.</u>

<u>City-owned facility or city-owned structure means any facility, structure or infrastructure to which</u> the city holds title, easement, or a leasehold interest, including, but not limited to, communications facilities, utility poles, towers, buildings, and communications infrastructure, regardless of whether located within or outside the public rights-of-way.

<u>Cluttered</u> shall mean placement in a confused, disordered, disorganized, or jumbled or crowded state, which can occur when too much is located in too small of an area given the reasonable location context.

<u>Collocation means</u> to install, mount, maintain modify, operate, or replace one or more wireless facilities on, under, within, or adjacent to a wireless support structure or utility pole. The term does

not include the installation of a new utility pole or wireless support structure in the public rightsof-way.

Communications Services shall mean the transmission, conveyance or routing of voice, data, audio, video, or any other information or signals to a point, or between or among points, by or through any electronic, radio, satellite, cable, optical, microwave, or other medium or method now in existence or hereafter devised, regardless of the protocol used for such transmission or conveyance.

Communications Services Provider shall mean any person, <u>including a municipality or</u> county, providing communications services through the placement or maintenance of a communications facility in public rights-of-way. *Communications Services Provider* shall also include any person, <u>including a municipality or county</u>, that places or maintains a communications facility in public rights-of-way but does not provide communications services.

Communications Facility(ies) or *Facility* or *System(s)* shall mean any permanent or temporary <u>physical</u> plant, equipment and property, including, but not limited to, cables, wires, conduits, ducts, fiber optics, poles, antennae, converters, splice boxes, cabinets, hand holes, manholes, vaults, drains, surface location markers, appurtenances, and other equipment or pathway placed or maintained or to be placed or maintained in the public rights-of-way of the city and used or capable of being used to transmit, convey, route, receive, distribute, provide or offer communications services. <u>The term includes wireless facilities.</u>

Concealed means an ancillary structure, equipment compound, or communications facility or area (collectively "physical improvements") that is not readily identifiable as such, and is designed to be aesthetically compatible with existing and proposed building(s) and uses on and adjacent to the proposed location of such physical improvements.

FCC shall mean the Federal Communications Commission.

In Public Rights-of-Way or *in the Public Rights-of-Way* shall mean in, on, over, under or across the public rights-of-way.

Maintain shall mean to exercise physical control over a wireless facility in the public rights-of-way, including ownership or the right to maintain and repair. A person providing service only through resale or only through use of a third party's unbundled network elements is not "maintaining" the wireless facilities through which such service is provided. The transmission and receipt of radio frequency signals through the airspace of the public rights-of-way does not constitute "maintaining" facilities in the public rights-of-way.

<u>Micro wireless facility means a small wireless facility having dimensions no larger than 24 inches in length, 15 inches in width, and 12 inches in height and an exterior antenna, if any, no longer than 11 inches.</u>

Ordinance shall mean this Ordinance.

Pass-through provider means any person who, upon registering with the city, places or maintains a communications facility in the city's rights-of-way and that does not remit communications service taxes as imposed by the city pursuant to Florida Statutes Ch. 202.

<u>Permit means the public rights-of-way permit that must be obtained before a person may construct</u> in the public rights-of-way and shall include, but not be limited to, the City's public rights-of-way engineering and construction permits issued by the City Engineer or his or her designee.

Person shall include any individual, child, firm, association, joint venture, partnership, estate, trust, business trust, syndicate, fiduciary, corporation, organization or legal entity of any kind, successor, assignee, transferee, personal representative, all other groups or combinations, and shall include the city to the extent the city acts as a communications services provider.

Place or maintain or *placement or maintenance* or *placing or maintaining* shall mean to erect, construct, install, maintain, grade, excavate, place, repair, extend, replace, expand, remove, occupy, locate or relocate. A communications services provider that owns or exercises physical control over communications facilities in public rights-of-way, such as the physical control to maintain and repair, is *placing or maintaining* the facilities. A party providing service only through resale or only through use of a third party's unbundled network elements is not *placing or maintaining* the communications facilities through which such service is provided. The transmission and receipt of radio frequency signals through the airspace of the public rights-of-way does not constitute *placing or maintaining* facilities in the public rights-of-way.

<u>Pole Attachment means any attachment of a wireless facility by a wireless provider to an existing utility pole or structure utilized for electric, telephone, cable television, street lights, or other lighting, and other utilities.</u>

Public Rights-of-Way shall mean a public right-of-way, public utility easement, public highway, street, lane, bridge, sidewalk, road, waterway, tunnel, alley, or similar property <u>regardless of which</u> <u>governmental entity has jurisdiction and control over such</u> for which the city is the authority that has jurisdiction and control and may lawfully grant access to such property pursuant to applicable law, and includes the surface, the air space over the surface and the area below the surface to the extent the city holds a property interest therein. *Public Rights-of-Way* shall not include private property. *Public Rights-of-Way* shall not include any real or personal city property except as described above and shall not include city buildings, fixtures, poles, conduits, facilities or other structures or improvements, regardless of whether they are situated in the public rights-of-way. No reference herein, or in any permit, to public rights-of-way shall be deemed to be a representation or guarantee by the city that its interest o9r other right to control the use of such property is sufficient to permit its use for such purposes, and a registrant shall be deemed to gain only those rights to use as are properly in the city and as the city may have the undisputed right and power to give.

Registrant shall mean a communications services provider or other person that has registered with the city in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.

Registration or *Register* shall mean the process described in this chapter whereby a communications services provider provides certain information to the city.

<u>Small wireless facility or small wireless facilities means a wireless facility that meets the following gualifications:</u>

(a) Each antenna associated with the facility is located inside an enclosure of no more than 6 cubic feet in volume or, in the case of antennas that have exposed elements, each antenna and all of its exposed elements could fit within an enclosure of no more than 6 cubic feet in volume; and

(b) All other wireless equipment associated with the facility is cumulatively no more than 28 cubic feet in volume. The following types of associated ancillary equipment are not included in the calculation of equipment volume: electric meters, concealment elements, telecommunications demarcation boxes, ground-based enclosures, grounding equipment, power transfer switches, cutoff switches, vertical cable runs for the connection of power and other services, and utility poles or other support structures.

<u>Stealth design means a method of camouflaging any antenna, wireless facilities, or other ancillary supporting communications facility, including, but not limited to, supporting electrical, optical, or mechanical, or other equipment, which enhances compatibility with adjacent land uses and which is visually and aurally unobtrusive. Stealth design may include a repurposed structure.</u>

<u>Utility pole means a pole or similar structure that is used in whole or in part to provide</u> communications services or for electric distribution, street lights or other lighting, cable television, traffic control, signage, or a similar function. The term includes the vertical support structure for traffic lights but does not include a horizontal structure to which signal lights or other traffic control devices are attached and does not include a pole or similar structure 15 feet in height or less unless an authority grants a waiver for such.

Wireless facility or wireless facilities means equipment at a fixed location which enables wireless communications between user equipment and a communications network, including radio transceivers, antennas, distributed antenna systems ("DAS"), wires, coaxial or fiber-optic cable or other cables, regular and backup power supplies, and comparable equipment, regardless of technological configuration, and equipment associated with wireless communications. The term includes small wireless facilities and micro wireless facilities. The term does not include:

(a) The structure or improvements on, under, within, or adjacent to the structure on which the equipment is collocated;

(b) Wireline backhaul facilities; or

(c) Coaxial or fiber-optic cable that is between wireless structures or utility poles or that is otherwise not immediately adjacent to or directly associated with a particular antenna.

Wireless infrastructure provider means a person who has been certificated to provide telecommunications service in the state and who builds or installs wireless communication transmission equipment, wireless facilities, or wireless support structures but is not a wireless services provider.

Wireless provider means a wireless infrastructure provider or a wireless services provider.

Wireless services means any services provided using licensed or unlicensed spectrum, whether at a fixed location or mobile, using wireless facilities.

Wireless services provider means a person who provides wireless services.

Wireless support structure means a freestanding structure, such as a monopole, a guyed or selfsupporting tower, or another existing or proposed structure designed to support or capable of supporting wireless facilities. The term does not include a utility pole.

Sec. 25.1-4. Registration for Placing or Maintaining Communications Facilities in Public Rights-of-Way.

(1) A communications services provider that desires to place or maintain a communication facility in public rights-of-way in the city shall first register with the city in accordance with this chapter. Subject to the terms and conditions prescribed in this chapter, a registrant may place or maintain a communication facility in public rights-of-way. A communications services provider with an existing communications facility in the public rights-of-way of the city as of the effective date of this ordinance shall comply with this chapter's registration requirements within sixty (60) days from the effective date of this chapter, or be in violation thereof.

(2) A registration shall not convey any title, equitable or legal, to the registrant in the public rights-of-way. Registration under this chapter governs only the placement or maintenance of communications facilities in public rights-of-way. <u>Other ordinances, codes or regulations may apply to the placement or maintenance in the public rights-of-way of facilities that are not communications facilities.</u> Registration does not excuse a communications services provider from obtaining appropriate access or pole attachment agreements before locating its facilities on the city's or another person's facilities. Registration does not excuse a communications services provider from complying with all applicable city ordinances, codes or regulations, or submitting right-of-way permit applications, including this chapter.

(3) Each communications services provider that desires to place or maintain a communication facility in public rights-of-way in the city shall file a single registration with the city which shall include the following information:

(a) Name of the applicant;

(b) Name, address, <u>email address</u>, and telephone number of the applicant's primary contact person in connection with the registration, and the person to contact in case of an emergency;

(c) Evidence of the insurance coverage required under this chapter and acknowledgement that registrant has received and reviewed a copy of this chapter, which acknowledgment shall not be deemed an agreement;

(d) A copy of the applicant's certificate of authorization or license to provide communications services issued by the Florida Public Service Commission, the Federal Communications Commission, or other federal or state authority, if any;

(e) For an applicant that does not provide a Florida Public Service Commission certificate of authorization number, if the applicant <u>or registrant</u> is a corporation <u>or limited liability company</u>, proof of authority to do business in the State of Florida, including the number of the certificate of incorporation;

(4) The Utilities and Engineering Departments shall review the information submitted by the applicant. If the applicant submits information in accordance with subsection (3) above, the registration shall be effective and the city shall notify the applicant of the effectiveness of registration in writing. If the city determines that the information has not been submitted in accordance with subsection (3) above, the city shall notify the applicant of the non-effectiveness of registration, and reasons for the non-effectiveness, in writing. The city shall so reply to an applicant within thirty (30) days after receipt of registration information from the applicant. <u>Non-effectiveness of registration shall not preclude an applicant from filing subsequent applications for registration under the provisions of this section.</u>

(5) <u>Cancellation of Registration</u>. A registrant may cancel a registration upon written notice to the city stating that it will no longer place or maintain any communications facilities in public rights-of- way within the city and will no longer need to obtain permits to perform work in public rights-of- way. A registrant cannot cancel a registration if the registrant continues to place or maintain any communications facilities in public rights-of-way.

(6) <u>Limited Rights conferred by Registration</u>. Registration shall not in itself establish any right to place or maintain or priority for the placement or maintenance of a communication facility in public rights-of-way within the city, but shall establish for the registrant a right to apply for a permit, if permitting is required by the city. Registrations are expressly subject to any future amendment to or replacement of this chapter and further subject to any additional city's ordinances, as well as any state or federal laws that may be enacted.

(7) A registrant shall renew its registration with the city by April 1 of even numbered years in accordance with the registration requirements in this chapter, except that a registrant that initially registers during the even numbered year when renewal would be due or the odd numbered year immediately preceding such even numbered year shall not be required to renew until the next even numbered year. Within thirty (30) days of any change in the information required to be submitted pursuant to subsection (3), except, as of October 1, 2001, subsection (3)(c), a registrant shall provide updated information to the city. If no information in the then- existing registration has changed, the renewal may state that no information has changed. Failure to renew a registration may result in the city restricting the issuance of additional permits until the communications services provider has complied with the registration requirements of this chapter.

(8) In accordance with applicable city ordinances, codes or regulations and this chapter, a <u>right-of-way utilization</u> permit <u>and a building permit</u> shall be required of a communications services provider that desires to place or maintain a communication facility in public rights-of-way. An effective registration shall be a condition precedent to obtaining a permit. Notwithstanding an effective registration, permitting requirements shall continue to apply. A permit may be obtained by or on behalf of a registrant having an effective registration if all permitting requirements are met. Individual rights-of-way permits shall be obtained from the Department of Engineering on appropriate form currently in use.

(9) A registrant that places or maintains communications facilities in the public rights ofway shall be required to pay compensation to the city as required by applicable law and ordinances of the city.

(9) <u>City-owned Structures, Facilities, and Real Property.</u> The city may construct or designate existing city-owned structures, facilities, and real property, within the public rights-of-way, including any accompanying equipment or communications facilities necessary to provide communications services via such structures, facilities, or real property, for the purpose of housing privately or publicly owned antennas and other communications facilities, or to provide communications services to, or support the provision of communications services by, providers of communications services within the city. The city may also allow the placement of an antenna or other communications facility upon a city owned structure or real property, or otherwise allow

the use of city-owned facilities outside of the rights-of-way, upon such terms as the city may deem acceptable, in writing, and subject to such rental, use, utility, license, or other fees as may be consistent with the law and established by the city commission via resolution.

(a) In the interests of facilitating the safe, efficient, and aesthetically desirable use of the public rights-of-way, and to otherwise avoid the negative effects upon the public welfare of, and address safety concerns relating to, proliferation of structures within the rights-of-way, the city may, in a competitively neutral and nondiscriminatory manner, offer to an applicant who wishes to install, construct, place, or maintain an antenna or other communications facility in the public rights-of-way, to place or co-locate such antenna or communications facility upon or within a city-owned structure outside of the rights-of-way where feasible. Such antenna or communications facility shall meet the requirements of this chapter.

(b) The city reserves and does not waive any right that the city may have in its capacity as a property owner or utility provider with respect to city-owned structures, facilities, and real property, and may exercise control over such to the extent not prohibited by law. When the city allows the placement of communications facilities upon, or the use of, city-owned structures, facilities, and real property, the city shall be deemed to be acting within its proprietary capacity or capacity as a utility provider, as appropriate and otherwise consistent with the law. The provisions of this article shall not limit the city's discretion with respect to the use, installation, construction, placement, or maintenance of city-owned structures, facilities, and real property, subject to 337.401(7)(f), Florida Statutes

Sec. 25.1-5. Transfer, Sale or Assignment of Assets in Public Rights-of-Way.

(1) If a registrant transfers, sells or assigns its assets, located in public rights-of-way incident to a transfer, sale or assignment of the registrant's assets, the transferee, buyer or assignee shall be obligated to comply with the terms of this chapter. Written notice of any such transfer, sale or assignment shall be provided by such registrant to the city within twenty (20) days after the effective <u>closing</u> date of the transfer, sale or assignment. If the transferee, buyer or assignee is a current registrant, then the transferee, buyer or assignee is not required to reregister. If the transferee, buyer or assignee is not a current registrant, then the transferee, buyer or assignee shall register as provided in Section 25.1-2-4 within sixty (60) days of the transfer, sale, or assignment.

(2) If permit applications are pending in the registrant's name, the transferee, buyer or assignee shall notify the Engineering and Utilities Departments that the transferee, buyer or assignee is the new applicant.

(3) Any encumbrance on the communications facilities of the registrant in the public rights-of-way shall be subject and subordinate to the rights of the city under this chapter and applicable law.

Sec. 25.1-6. Placement or Maintenance of a Communication Facility in Public Rights-of-Way.

(1). Prohibitions.

(a) <u>No communications services facilities or other communications facilities shall be</u> installed in the City's rights-of-way without a right-of-way utilization permit. (b) Wireless facilities, other than small wireless facilities and micro wireless facilities, are prohibited within the public rights-of-way.

(c) <u>To comply with clear zone requirements and the safe operation of traffic control,</u> no wireless facilities or other communications facilities shall be closer than 8 feet from the street curb or edge of pavement if no curb is present.

(d) Wireless facilities are prohibited within the public rights-of-way of roadways and railways under the jurisdiction and control of the Florida Department of Transportation unless approved by the City, as provided in any agreement between the City and the Florida Department of Transportation.

(e) Wireless facilities are prohibited on arms used to support or mount traffic control signals and warning signals and on arms attached to utility poles.

(f) Wireless facilities are prohibited in the rights-of-way of any geographic area approved as an historic district either by the city, the State of Florida, or listed on the National Register of Historic Places that were adopted by Ordinance on or before April 1, 2017 unless:

<u>1.</u> <u>The city's Historic Preservation Board recommends approval of the method to</u> <u>deploy the wireless facilities in stealth so as not to detract from contributing historic</u> <u>structures and the ambiance of the district; and</u>

2. The City accepts the recommendation and approves of the application.

(g) Wireless facilities are prohibited on utility poles or similar structures 15 feet or less in height unless incorporated into and hidden in the pole under a top mounted street light.

(h) Wireless facilities may not block or interfere with the view of signs of commercial businesses or street signs.

(i) <u>Wireless facilities, excluding micro wireless facilities, shall not be suspended on</u> <u>cables strung between existing utility poles in the City.</u>

(2) The applicant or applicant's successor must agree to remove the wireless facilities at any time if warranted by public health or safety as determined by the City.

(3) <u>Grounds for denial</u>. The City may deny a proposed collocation of a small wireless facility in the public rights-of-way if the applicant fails to comply with any provision of this chapter or if the proposed collocation:

(a) Materially interferes with the safe operation of traffic control equipment;

(b) Materially interferes with sight lines or clear zones for transportation, pedestrians, or public safety purposes:

(c) <u>Materially interferes with compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, or</u> similar federal or state standards and regulations regarding pedestrian access or movement:

(d) <u>Materially fails to comply with the most current edition of the Florida Department</u> of Transportation Utility Accommodation Manual; or

(e) Fails to comply with applicable codes.

(1)(<u>4</u>) <u>A</u> registrant <u>or applicant</u> shall at all times comply with and abide by all applicable provisions of the state, federal and local law and city ordinances, codes and regulations in placing or maintaining a communication facility in public rights-of-way. <u>The burden of proof shall at all times be on an applicant to establish compliance with requirements under this chapter and state and federal law.</u>

(2) (5) A registrant shall not <u>place</u>, commence to place or maintain a communication facility in public rights-of-way until all applicable permits, if any, have been issued by the city or other appropriate authority, except in the case of an emergency. <u>No wireless facility shall operate unless</u> the City has conducted a final inspection and issued a Certificate of Completion pursuant to the Florida Building Code as adopted and amended.

(a) The term "*emergency*" shall mean a condition that affects the public's health, safety or welfare, which includes an unplanned out-of-service condition of a pre-existing service.

(b) Registrant shall provide prompt notice to the city of the placement or maintenance of a communication facility in public rights-of-way in the event of an emergency, and shall be required to apply for an after-the-fact permit <u>within 30 days</u> if a permit would have originally been required to perform the work undertaken in public rights-of-way in connection with the emergency.

(c) Registrant acknowledges that as a condition of granting such permits, the city may impose reasonable rules or regulations governing the placement or maintenance of a communication facility in public rights-of-way. Permits shall apply only to the areas of public rights-of-way specifically identified in the permit. The city may issue a blanket permit to cover certain activities, such as routine maintenance and repair activities that may otherwise require individual permits.

(d) Further, once the emergency is abated, the communications facility placed in the public right-of-way during the emergency shall be removed unless permitted without the emergency as a basis.

(6) Application Review; Decisions; Time-frames; Permit Duration

(a) <u>Notification of Completeness.</u> Within 14 days after receiving an application, the city shall determine and notify the applicant by electronic mail to the email address provided in the application as to whether the application is complete. If an application is deemed incomplete, the city shall specifically identify the missing information. An application is deemed complete if the city does not provide notification to the applicant within 14 days.

(b) <u>Application Review Period.</u> The city shall approve or deny an application within 60 days after receipt of the complete application, or it is deemed approved in accordance with F.S. § 337.401. If the city does not use the 30-day negotiation period provided in Sub-Section (7), "Alternative Collocations", the parties may mutually agree to extend the 60-day application review period. The city shall grant or deny the application at the end of the extended period.

(c) *Permit Duration.* A right-of-way utilization permit issued pursuant to an approved application shall remain in effect for one (1) year unless extended by the city.

(d) <u>Notification Procedure.</u>

(1) The city shall notify the applicant of approval or denial by electronic mail. The city shall approve a complete application unless it does not meet the applicable codes.

(2) If the application is denied, the city will specify in writing the basis for denial, including the specific code provisions on which the denial was based, and send the documentation to the applicant by electronic mail on the day the city denies the application.

(e) <u>Opportunity to Cure Deficiencies</u>. The applicant may cure the deficiencies identified by the city and resubmit the application within 30 days after notice of the denial is sent to the applicant. If the curative information is not provided within such time frame, the application will be considered withdrawn or closed. The city shall approve or deny the revised application within 30 days after receipt or the application is deemed approved. Any subsequent review shall be limited to the deficiencies cited in the denial.

(f) <u>Consolidated Applications.</u> An applicant may file a consolidated application and receive a single permit for the collocation of up to 30 small wireless facilities. If the application includes multiple small wireless facilities, the city may separately address small wireless facility collocations for which incomplete information has been received or which are denied.

(7) <u>Alternative Collocations.</u>

(a) If an applicant seeks to place a wireless facility upon a city utility pole or seeks to install a new utility pole, the city may, within 14 days after the date that a wireless facility application is filed, request that the proposed location of the wireless facility be moved to another location in the right-of-way and placed on an alternative utility pole or support structure or may place a new utility pole, including for aesthetic or public safety reasons, or a location outside the right-of-way on city-owned structures or property in accordance with Section 25.1-4. The City may offer an alternative location in the right-of-way for a wireless facility for health, safety, general welfare, or aesthetic reasons.

(b) The city and the applicant may negotiate the alternative location, including any objective design standards and reasonable spacing requirements for ground-based equipment, for 30 days after the date of the request. At the conclusion of the negotiation period, if the alternative location is accepted by the applicant, the applicant must notify the city of such acceptance and the application shall be deemed granted for any new location for which there is agreement and all other locations in the application. If an agreement is not reached, the applicant must notify the city of such non-agreement and the city shall grant or deny the original application within 90 days after the date the application was filed.

(c). A request for an alternative location, an acceptance of an alternative location, or a rejection of an alternative location shall be in writing and provided by electronic mail.

(8) Application requirements.

(a) Except as otherwise provided herein, a permit to construct or install wireless facilities or other communications facilities in the public rights-of-way shall not be granted except upon administrative review and approval pursuant to the requirements of this Chapter.

(3) (b) As part of any permit application to place a new or replace an existing communications facility in public rights-of-way, the registrant shall provide the following:

(a) An engineering plan signed and sealed by a Florida Registered Professional Engineer, or prepared by a person who is exempt from such registration requirements as provided in Florida Statutes § 471.003, identifying the location of the proposed facility, including a description of the facilities to be installed, where it is to be located, and the approximate size of facilities and equipment that will be located in public rights-of-way;

(17)(1) A permit application to place a new or replace an existing communications facility in public rights-of-way shall include plans showing the location of the proposed installation of facilities in the public rights-of-way. Plans submittal. For each proposed wireless facility location, submit plans signed and sealed by a Florida Registered Professional Engineer, or prepared by a person who is exempt from such registration requirements as provided in Florida Statutes § 471.003 showing:

a. The location of each proposed communications facility:

<u>b.</u> <u>True-to-scale site plan depicting all physical improvements</u> including property lines within a 40 foot radius;

<u>c.</u> <u>A graphical depiction of each proposed communications facility to be installed;</u>

- d. The size of each proposed communications facility;
- e. The specifications for each communications facility; and
- <u>f.</u> <u>Existing utilities in the immediate vicinity.</u>

(17) (2) The plans shall be in a hard copy format or an electronic format specified by the city, provided such electronic format is maintained by the registrant. Such plans in a format maintained by the registrant shall be provided at no cost to the city. The plans shall be in a digitized format showing the two-dimensional location of the facilities based on the city's geographical database, or other format acceptable to the city. The city shall maintain the confidentiality of such plans and any other information provided in accordance with Florida Statutes § 202.195, as it may be amended.

(17)(3) If the actual installation deviates or will deviate from the submitted plans due to unforeseen conditions or any other reason, the registrant shall promptly provide revised plans.

(b)(4) A description of the manner in which the communications facility will be installed (i.e. anticipated construction methods or techniques);

(5) <u>A description of the stealth design techniques proposed to minimize</u> the visual impact of the wireless communications facility;

(c)(6) A <u>maintenance of</u> traffic plan for <u>any-maintenance of</u> any disruption of the public rights-of-way;

(d)(7) Information on the ability of the public rights-of-way to accommodate the proposed facility, if available (such information shall be provided without certification as to correctness, to the extent obtained from other persons);

(e)(8) If appropriate given the facility proposed, an estimate of the cost of restoration to the public rights-of-way;

(f)(9) <u>The timetable for construction of the project or each phase thereof</u>, and the areas of the city which will be affected;

(10) <u>A \$150.00 collocation fee per wireless facility per year for attachments to an authority pole; and</u>

(g)(11) Such additional information requested by the city that the city finds reasonably necessary with respect to the placement or maintenance of the communications facility that is the subject of the permit application to review such permit application.

(9) Factors considered in granting permit. In addition to any applicable requirements or standards imposed by this code of ordinances, the following factors shall be considered in determining whether to issue a permit to a registrant to place or maintain a communications facility within the public rights-of-way, consistent with the requirements of Section 337.401(7), Fla.Stat.:

- (a) Height and dimensions of the proposed communications facility;
- (b) Proximity of the communications facility to residential structures and residential district boundaries, and the uses on those properties;
- (c) <u>Surrounding topography, tree coverage and foliage;</u>
- (d) Compliance with the objective design standards set forth herein with particular reference to design characteristics that have the effect of concealing, reducing, or eliminating visual obtrusiveness;
- (g) Proposed ingress and egress (where applicable);
- (h) <u>The location context must be reasonable. Proximity to other structures within the</u> rights-of-way cannot create a hazardous or safety condition;
- (i) Proximity to and/or interference with other private or public uses within or outside the rights-of-way, including, but not limited to, utilities, easements, traffic control devices, and other uses; and

- (k) Suitability of the right-of-way or the proposed section of the right-of-way for the proposed communications facility with reference to safety, engineering, and/or aesthetic concerns.
- (I) Any other requirements set forth in this chapter.

Based upon a review of these factors, the City may still utilize the alternative collocation process as provided in Sub-Section (7), herein.

(10) Non-interference; Encouraged Technology; Additional Regulations.

- (5)(a) All communications facilities shall be placed or maintained so as not to unreasonably interfere with the use of the public rights-of-way by the public and with the rights of property owners who adjoin any of the public rights-of-way.
- (5)(b) All facilities shall be placed underground to the extent that similarly situated utilities (electric, communications, etc.) are so required. The city may require the use of trenchless technology (i.e., directional bore method) for the installation of facilities in the public rights-of-way as well as joint trenching or the co-location of facilities in the existing conduit. The registrant shall be liable for the displacement, damage or destruction of any property, irrigation system or landscaping as a result of the placement or maintenance of its facility within the public rights-of-way. The city may promulgate reasonable rules and regulations concerning the placement or maintenance of a communications facility in public rights of way consistent with this chapter and other applicable law. All facilities shall be placed underground to the extent not inconsistent with the rules of the Public Service Commission. The use of trenchless technology (i.e., directional bore method) for the installation of facilities in the public rights-of-way as well as joint trenching or the co-location of facilities in existing conduit is strongly encouraged, and shall be employed wherever feasible. Notwithstanding the foregoing, small wireless facilities and micro wireless facilities and their associated support structures are exempt from this undergrounding requirement.
- (c) The city may promulgate additional reasonable rules and regulations concerning the placement or maintenance of a communication facility in public rights-of-way consistent with this chapter and other applicable law.

(11) <u>Requirements for Wireless and communications facilities.</u>

<u>Wireless and communications facilities shall be placed in the public rights-of-way pursuant to the following requirements:</u>

- (a) Any aesthetic requirements and provisions of this chapter governing antennas shall apply to wireless and communications facilities located within the right-of-way.
- (b) It is strongly encouraged that <u>wireless and communications facilities be concealed</u> and <u>utilize stealth design</u>, as defined by Chapter. Such stealth design and concealment shall eliminate the need to locate any ground or elevated equipment

on the exterior of a pole, or other structure in order to preserve and promote the unique aesthetic character of the city.

- (c) In order to avoid the clustering of multiple items of approved ground equipment or elevated equipment in a single area, only one equipment box may be located in any single wireless and communication facility location. Where an applicant demonstrates that undergrounding and stealth design and concealment goals cannot be employed under this subsection and the city agrees with such demonstration, the individual approved exterior equipment boxes or containment devices shall not exceed 28 cubic feet in volume and the configuration and dimensions of such shall be the least visually obtrusive as possible. The use of foliage and vegetation or other concealment method around any approved equipment may be required by the city based on conditions of the specific area where the equipment is to be located.
- (d) Insofar as wireless facilities are constructed underground, the wireless infrastructure provider shall become a member of, and maintain membership in Florida utility notification one call system. Wireless facilities shall have five-foot horizontal clearance from other underground utilities and their appurtenances unless applicant can demonstrate compliance with all Applicable Codes and non-interference with existing underground facilities.
- (12) Objective Design Standards.
 - (a) Wireless facilities shall meet the following reasonable location, context, color, stealth, and concealment requirements. Design standards may be waived if the city determines that the design standards are not reasonably compatible for the particular location of a wireless facility or that the design standards impose excessive expense in relation to the aesthetic concerns of the City. The waiver shall be granted or denied within 45 days after the date of the request.

<u>1.</u> <u>Any above-ground wireless facilities shall meet stealth design</u> requirements.

2. Wireless facilities may increase the height of a metal street light pole only if the antenna is top-mounted and not wider than the pole, or if the antenna is hidden in a cylinder that appears like an original part of the pole. A cellular antenna shall not extend more than ten (10) feet above the utility pole or structure upon which the wireless facility is to be collocated.

<u>3.</u> <u>A new utility pole that replaces an existing utility pole shall be of substantially similar design, material, and color as the existing utility pole unless the existing pole is made of wood, which is no longer permitted.</u>

4. <u>The antennas and related equipment shall be in a color that will provide the</u> most camouflage as determined by the city. Ground based wireless facilities shall be painted forest green, unless determined otherwise by the city. When on a black pole, wireless facilities shall be painted black, unless determined otherwise by the city. 5. Wires serving the wireless facilities must be concealed within or flush mounted to the pole on which the facilities are collocated and insulated in accordance with applicable codes.

(b) <u>Antennas placed upon structures within the rights-of-way must meet the following</u> additional requirements if stealth design, concealment, and this chapter's requirements regarding such cannot be met:

1. Top mounted antennas and their enclosures must not extend more than one quarter of the diameter of the supporting structure, beyond edge of the supporting structure at the level of antenna attachment. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the City will permit the antenna and enclosure so long as it meets the volumetric requirements provided in State law; and

2. For public safety purposes, under no circumstances shall antennas be mounted less than 12 feet above ground level.

3. Provide Photographs and Graphic or Simulated Renderings, as follows:

a. Photographs clearly showing the nature and location of the site where each wireless or other communications facility is proposed to be located including photographs showing the location and the relationship of the communication facility to adjacent properties:

b. True-to-scale graphic depictions or simulated renderings accurately representing the visual impact of the wireless communications facilities when viewed from the street and from adjacent properties.

(c) <u>Street light fixtures with stealth wireless facilities are encouraged to meet the following standards:</u>

(1) On street lights, luminaires and bases should be roughly equal in size and volume for a balanced appearance.

(2) The decorative base of a street light should be between 10-25% of the pole height.

(3) The length of arms extending from the base should be between 20-25% of pole height;

(4) Arms should extend from the pole at a location within 20% of pole height from the top of the pole.

(5) <u>Street light fixtures must meet AASHTO structural guidelines for roadway</u> application and ANSI requirements for vibrations.

(6) New or replacement poles that support wireless or communications facilities shall match the style, design, and color of the utility poles in the surrounding area.

(d) Size and Height Requirements. Pole height shall be measured from the ground to the top of the utility pole, which measurement shall include any antennas built into or appended to the utility pole. The size and height of new wireless or communications facilities in the rights-of-way shall be no greater than the maximum size and height of any other utility or light poles located in the same portion of the right-of-way within the city other than a utility pole for which a waiver has previously been granted, measured from grade in place within 500 feet of the proposed location of the small wireless facility. If there is no utility pole within 500 feet, the height of the utility pole shall be limited to 50 feet; provided, however, that applicants proposing wireless or communications facilities with antennas to be located on existing poles or other structures may increase the height of the existing pole or other structure up to 10 feet, if necessary, to avoid adversely affecting existing pole attachments. Additionally, the overall height, above ground, of any wireless or communications facility shall not exceed 40 feet, or the existing height of other utility or light poles located in the same portion of the right-of-way, whichever height is less.

(e) <u>Setback Requirements.</u>

(1) Wireless and communications facilities shall be located at least ten feet from a driveway, at least ten feet from the edge of existing trees 12 inches or greater in diameter, at least 25 feet from a traffic signal pole unless mounted upon such traffic signal pole, and at least 15 feet from any pedestrian ramp and 8 feet from the street curb. The city may require greater setbacks from these and other fixtures in the right-of-way to ensure proper sight lines for public safety purposes and in other cases as deemed necessary to advance the purposes of this article.

(2) If the right-of-way is within or abuts a residential zoning district, wireless communication facilities must be located where the shared property line between two residential parcels intersects the right-of-way, whenever possible unless an unsafe condition, cluttered appearance, or other violation of this article would result.

(3) If the right-of-way is within or abuts a nonresidential district, wireless facilities must be located between tenant spaces or adjoining properties where their shared property lines intersect the right-of-way, whenever possible, unless an unsafe condition, cluttered appearance, or other violation of this article would result.

(f) Waiver. The city engineer may waive any requirement under this section if the city determines that such requirement is not reasonably compatible for the particular location of a small wireless facility or that such requirement imposes an excessive expense, or where the waiver serves the intent or purposes of this chapter. The waiver shall be granted or denied within 45 days after the date of the request.

(13) New Structures; Availability of Alternatives. For the placement of any new utility poles, pole type structures, or other freestanding structure associated with any communications facility, the City shall have the right to utilize the alternative collocation process as provided in Sub-Section (7) of this Section, and as provided in Section 337.401(7), Fla.Stat.

(9)(14) <u>Limitations</u>; No Property Right. A permit from the city constitutes authorization to undertake only certain activities in public rights-of-way in accordance with this chapter, and does not create a property right or grant authority to impinge upon the rights of others who may have an interest in the public rights-of-way.

(15) <u>Construction; Maintenance; Safety; Restoration and Inspection.</u>

(10) (a) A registrant shall maintain its communication facility in public rights-of-way in a manner consistent with accepted industry practice and applicable law.

(6) (b) All safety practices required by applicable law or accepted industry practices and standards shall be used during the construction, installation, placement or maintenance of communications facilities.

(7) (c) After the completion of any placement or maintenance of a communication facility in public rights-of-way or each phase thereof, <u>A-a</u> registrant shall, at its own expense, restore the public rights-of-way to <u>at least</u> its original condition <u>before such work</u>. <u>after the completion of any placement or maintenance of a communication facility in public rights-of way or each phase thereof</u>. If the registrant fails to make such restoration within thirty (30) days, <u>or such longer period of time as may be reasonably required under the circumstances</u>, following the completion of such placement or maintenance, the city may perform such restoration as it deems necessary and charge all costs of the restoration against the registrant in accordance with Florida Statutes § 337.402, as it may be amended. For 12 months following the original completion of the work, the registrant shall guarantee its restoration work and shall correct any improper restoration work at its own expense that does not satisfy the requirements of this chapter. for twelve (12) months following the original completion of the work.</u>

(11) (d) In connection with excavation in the public rights-of-way, a registrant shall, where applicable, comply with the Underground Facility Damage Prevention and Safety Act set forth in Florida Statutes Ch. 556, as it may be amended.

(12) (e) A registrant shall use and exercise due caution, care and skill in performing work in the public rights-of-way and shall take all reasonable steps to safeguard work site areas. The person constructing, installing, and maintaining wireless facilities must be a licensed electrician, certified to work as a lineworker, or successfully complete an accredited lineworker apprenticeship program.

(14) (f) A registrant shall not place or maintain its communications facilities so as to interfere with, displace, damage or destroy any utilities, including but not limited to, sewers, gas or water mains, storm drains, pipes, cables or conduits of the city or any other person's facilities lawfully occupying the public rights-of-way of the city.

(16) (g) The city shall have the right to make such visual inspections of communications facilities placed or maintained in public rights-of-way as it finds necessary to ensure compliance with this chapter. In the event the city determines that a violation exists with respect to registrant's placement or maintenance of facilities in the public rights-of-way that is not considered to be an emergency or danger to the public health, safety or welfare, the city will provide registrant at least three (3) days written notice setting forth the violation and requesting correction.

(16) Modifications; Removal and Relocation; Antenna Co-locations.

(a) The grant of a permit under this chapter shall not limit the authority and discretion of the city to regulate and control the public rights-of-way, and the city may at any time require the removal or relocation of a communications facility within the rights-of-way in the interests of the public welfare, health, or safety, or as otherwise authorized by law. The wireless facilities provider must remove its wireless facilities within 30 days of notice that the City will remove a utility pole.

(8) (b) Removal or relocation at the direction of the city of a registrant's communications facility in public rights-of-way shall be governed by applicable requirements of Florida Statutes §§ 337.403 and 337.404, as they may be amended, in addition to any other applicable city regulations or provisions of law. Unless otherwise provided by law, this City Code, or agreement, a registrant shall bear all costs of any removal or relocation of its facilities.

(13) (c) <u>Coordination of work; work schedule.</u> In the interest of the public's health, safety and welfare, upon request of the city, <u>and as notified by the city of the other work</u>, <u>construction</u>, <u>installation or repairs referenced below</u>, a registrant shall coordinate placement or maintenance activities under a permit with any other work, construction, installation or repairs that may be occurring or scheduled to occur within a reasonable time frame in the subject public rights-of-way. The city may require registrant to alter its placement or maintenance schedule as the city determines to be reasonably necessary so as to minimize disruptions and disturbance in the public rights-of-way. The city may provide a more definite time frame based on individual city construction or maintenance schedules.

(15)(e) No warranties; vacation of rights-of-way. The city makes no warranties or representations regarding the fitness, suitability, or availability of the city's public rights-of-way, <u>city-owned structures</u>, and <u>city-owned real property</u> for the registrant's communications facilities and any performance of work, or costs incurred by registrant or provision of services shall be at registrant's sole risk. Nothing in this chapter shall affect the city's authority to add to, vacate or abandon public rights-of-way, <u>or add vehicular travel lanes</u>, and the city makes no warranties or representations regarding the availability of any added, vacated or abandoned public rights-of-way for communications facilities.

(f) Alteration of Rights-of-Way; Other Work and Facilities in Rights-of-Way.

(18)1. The city reserves the right to place and maintain, and permit to be placed or maintained, sewer, gas, water, electric, storm drainage, communications, and other types of facilities, cables or conduit, and to do, and to permit to be done, any underground and overhead installation or improvement that may be deemed necessary or proper by the city in public rights-of-way occupied by the registrant.

(18) <u>2.</u> Registrant shall, if registrant so agrees, allow the city facilities to be colocated within the city's public rights-of-way through the use of a joint trench during registrant's construction project. Such joint trench projects shall be negotiated in good faith by separate agreement between registrant and the city and may be subjected to other city rights-of-way requirements. (18) <u>3.</u> The city further reserves without limitation the right to alter, change, or cause to be changed, the grading, installation, relocation, or width of the public rights-of-way within the limits of the city and within said limits as same may from time to time be altered.

(19) <u>4</u>. A registrant shall, on the request of any person holding a permit issued by the city, temporarily raise or lower its wireless or other communications facilities to permit the work authorized by the permit. The expense of temporarily raising or lowering facilities shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and the registrant shall have the authority to require such payment in advance. The registrant shall be given not less than thirty (30) days advance written notice to arrange for such temporary relocation. If the city requests a temporary raising or lowering of a facility for a public purpose, the city shall not be charged for the temporary raising or lowering of the facility subject to 337.403 and 337.404, Florida Statutes.

(g) Replacement and maintenance of wireless facilities.

- (1) The city shall not require approval or require fees or other charges for:
 - <u>a.</u> <u>Routine maintenance;</u>

b. <u>Replacement of existing wireless facilities with wireless facilities</u> that are substantially similar or of the same or smaller size; or

c. <u>A communications service provider authorized to occupy the rights-</u> of-way and who is remitting taxes under chapter 202; or

d. Installation, placement, or replacement of micro wireless facilities that are suspended on cable strung between existing utility poles in compliance with applicable odes by or for a communications services provider authorized to occupy the rights of way and who is remitting taxes under chapter 202.

(2) Notwithstanding this paragraph, for public safety the wireless provider must give reasonable notice to the City Engineer before undertaking the activities of replacement or maintenance, and a right-of-way permit shall be required for work that involves excavation, closure of a sidewalk, or closure of a vehicular lane.

(4)(h) <u>Additional Authority; Permit Conditions.</u> To the extent not otherwise prohibited by state or federal law <u>and this chapter</u>, the city shall have the power to prohibit or limit the placement of new or additional communications facilities within <u>all or parts of</u> the public rights-of-way if there is insufficient space to accommodate all of the requests to place and maintain facilities in that area of the public rights-of-way, for the protection of existing facilities in the public rights-of-way or to accommodate city plans for public improvements or projects that the city determines are in the public interest. The city may impose reasonable conditions upon the grant of a permit, in addition to the specific requirements of this code, as deemed appropriate to advance the intent or purposes of this chapter.

(i) The approval of the installation, placement, maintenance, or operation of a small wireless facility or other wireless facility pursuant to this chapter does not authorize the installation, placement, maintenance, or operation of any communications facilities other than small wireless facilities in the right-of-way.

(j) <u>Make-Ready for Collocation.</u>

1. For a city utility pole that does not support an aerial facility used to provide communications services or electric service, the applicant seeking to collocate a small wireless facility shall provide a make-ready estimate at the applicant's expense for the work necessary to support the small wireless facility, including pole replacement, and perform the make-ready work. If pole replacement is required, the scope of the make-ready estimate is limited to the design, fabrication, and installation of a utility pole that is substantially similar in color and composition. The city shall not condition or restrict the manner in which the applicant obtains, develops, or provides the estimate or conducts the make-ready work subject to usual construction restoration standards for work in the right-of-way. The replaced or altered utility pole shall remain the property of the city.

2. <u>The city shall not require more make-ready work than is required to meet</u> <u>applicable codes or industry standards.</u>

3. Fees for make-ready work shall not include costs related to pre-existing damage or prior noncompliance. Fees for make-ready work, including any pole replacement, shall not exceed actual costs or the amount charged to communications service providers other than wireless services providers for similar work and shall not include any consultant fee or expense.

<u>4.</u> <u>Fees for make-ready work must be paid to the City, even if they exceed the applicant's estimate, before the wireless facilities may be operational.</u>

Sec. 25.1-7 Suspension of Permits.

(1) Subject to Section 25.1-8 below, the Director of Engineering, or his designee may suspend a permit for work in the public rights-of-way for one or more of the following reasons:

(a) Failure to satisfy permit conditions, including conditions set forth in this chapter or other applicable city ordinances, codes or regulations governing placement or maintenance of communications facilities in public rights-of-way, including without limitation, failure to take reasonable safety precautions to alert the public of work at the work site, or to restore any public rights-of-way;

(b) Misrepresentation or fraud by registrant in a registration or permit application to the city;

- (c) Failure to properly renew or ineffectiveness of registration;
- (d) Failure to relocate or remove facilities as may be lawfully required by the city;
- (e) Failure to commence work within 180 days of securing permit; or

(f) Abandonment of project or suspension of work for more than 180 days.

(2) After the suspension of a permit pursuant to this section, the Director of Engineering or his designee shall provide written notice of the reason for the suspension to the registrant. (Ord. No. 01-29, § 9, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-8 Appeals.

(1) Final, written decisions of the Director of Engineering, or his designee, suspending or denying a permit, denying an application for a registration or denying an application for renewal of a registration are subject to appeal, as set forth in Chapter 1, Article VII, of the City's Land Development Regulations, as amended.

(2) Nothing in the chapter shall affect the remedies the city has available under applicable law.

(Ord. No. 01-29, § 10, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-9. Conditional Use of Public Rights-of-Way.

(1) In the event registrant desires to use its existing facilities or to construct new facilities for the purpose of providing other utility or non-utility services to existing or potential consumers or resellers, by providing any other services other than the provisions other than the provision of communications service, or for providing any other use to existing or potential consumers, a registrant shall seek such additional and separate authorization from the city for such activities as may be required by applicable law.

(2) To the extent that a registrant leases or otherwise uses the facilities of a person that is duly registered or otherwise authorized to place or maintain facilities in the public rights-of-way of the city, registrant shall make no claim, nor assert any right, which will impede the lawful exercise of the city's rights, including requiring the removal of such facilities from the public rights-of-way of the city, regardless of the effect on registrant's ability to place or maintain its own communications facilities in public rights-of-way of the city. (Ord. No 01-29, § 11, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-10 Involuntary Termination of Registration.

(1) The city may terminate a registration if:

(a) A federal or state authority suspends, denies, or revokes a registrant's certification or license to provide communications services;

(b) The registrant's placement or maintenance of a communications facility in the public rights-of-way presents an extraordinary or unreasonable danger to the general public or other users of the public rights-of-way and the registrant fails to remedy the danger promptly after receipt of written notice; or

(c) The registrant ceases to use all of its communications facilities in public rightsof-way and has not complied with section 25.1-17 of this chapter.

(2)Prior to termination, the registrant shall be notified by the Director of Engineering, or his designee, with a written notice setting forth all matters pertinent to the proposed termination action, including which of subsections (a) through (c) above is applicable as the reason therefore, and describing the proposed action of the city with respect thereto. The registrant shall have thirty (30) days after receipt of such notice within which to address or eliminate the reason or within which to present a plan, satisfactory to the Director of Engineering, or his designee, to accomplish the same. If the plan is rejected, the Director of Engineering or his designee shall provide written notice of such rejection to the registrant and shall make a recommendation to the City Commission regarding a final decision as to termination of registration. A decision by the city to terminate a registration may only be accomplished by an action of the City Commission. A registrant shall be notified by written notice of any decision by the City Commission to terminate its registration. Such written notice shall be sent within seven (7) days after the decision.

In the event of termination, the former registrant shall: (a) notify the city of the (3)assumption or anticipated assumption by another registrant of ownership of the registrant's communications facilities in public rights-of-way; or (b) provide the city with an acceptable plan for disposition of its communications facilities in public rights-of-way. If a registrant fails to comply with this subsection, the city may exercise any remedies or rights it has at law or in equity, including but not limited to taking possession of the facilities, requiring the registrant's bonding company within ninety (90) days of the termination to remove some or all of the facilities from the public rights-of-way and restore the public rights-of-way to its original condition before the removal, or requiring that some or all of the facilities be removed and the public rights-of-way restored to its original condition before the removal at the registrant's expense.

In any event, a terminated registrant shall take such steps as are necessary to (4) render safe every portion of the communications facilities remaining in the public rights-of-way of the city safe.

In the event of termination of a registration, this provision does not permit the city (5) to cause the removal of any communications facilities that are used to provide another service for which the registrant holds a valid certification or license with the governing federal or state agency, where required, and is properly registered with the city for such certificated or licensed service, where required.

(Ord. No. 01-29 § 12, 7-3-01)

Sec.25.1-11. Existing Communications Facilities in Public Rights-of-Way.

A communications services provider with an existing communications facility in the public rightsof-way of the city has sixty (60) days from the effective date of this chapter to comply with the terms of this chapter

The provisions of this Chapter shall be applicable to all Communications Facilities placed in the Public Rights-of-Way on or after the effective date of this Ordinance and shall apply to all existing Communications Facilities placed in the Public Rights-of-Way prior to the effective date of this Ordinance to the full extent permitted by Federal and State law, except that any provision of this Chapter regarding the size, Stealth Design, concealment, or location of Communications Facilities shall not apply to existing Communications Facilities lawfully placed within the Public Rights-of-Way prior to the effective date of this Ordinance, to the extent that such Communications Facilities may be Maintained, repaired, and replaced with a Communications Facility substantially similar in size and for the same purpose.

Sec. 25.1-12. Insurance.

(1) <u>A registrant shall provide, pay for and maintain satisfactory to the city an</u> <u>acceptable policy or policies of liability insurance, including comprehensive general liability</u> <u>insurance, products/completed operations liability, personal injury liability, owners and contractors</u> <u>protective liability, broad form property damage, contractual liability, automobile liability (owned,</u> <u>non-owned and hired automobiles), workers' compensation and employee liability.</u> A registrant shall not commence construction, operation or maintenance of the facility without obtaining all insurance required under this section and approval of such insurance by Risk Management of the city, nor shall a registrant allow any contractor or subcontractor to commence work on its contract or subcontract until all similar such insurance required of the same has been obtained and approved. The required insurance must be obtained and maintained for the entire period the registrant has facilities in the public rights-of-way, and for a period thereafter as specified in the minimum coverages described below. If the registrant, its contractors or subcontractors do not have the required insurance, the city may order such entities to stop operations until the insurance is obtained and approved.

(2) <u>All liability policies shall provide that the city is an additional insured as to the activities under this chapter. The required coverages must be evidenced by properly executed certificates of insurance forms. The certificates must be signed by the authorized representative of the insurance company and shall be filed and maintained with the city annually. Certificates of insurance, reflecting evidence of the required insurance, shall be filed with the Risk Manager Coordinator. For entities that are entering the market, the certificates shall be filed prior to the commencement of construction and once a year thereafter, and as provided below in the event of a lapse in coverage. For entities that have facilities in the public rights-of-way as of the effective date of this chapter, the certificate shall be filed within sixty (60) calendar days of the adoption of this chapter, annually thereafter, and as provided below in the event of a lapse in coverage.</u>

(3) These certificates of insurance shall contain a provision that coverages afforded under these policies will not be canceled until at least forty-five (45) calendar days prior written notice has been given to the city. Policies shall be issued by companies authorized to do business under the laws of the State of Florida. Financial Ratings must be no less than "A-VI" in the latest edition of "Bests Key Rating Guide", published by A.M. Best Guide. <u>The insurance requirements may be satisfied by evidence of self-insurance with sufficient financial strength and reserves or other types of insurance acceptable to the city. A registrant may self-insure. Self-insured status must be confirmed with certification of same by presentation of financial statements which are not more than one (1) year old and signed by the registrant's Chief Financial Officer or designees. Information contained therein is subject to review and approval by city's Risk Management Division.</u>

(4) In the event that the insurance certificate provided indicates that the insurance shall terminate or lapse during the period of this contract, then in that event, the registrant shall furnish, at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to the expiration of the date of such insurance, a renewed certificate of insurance equal and like coverage.

(5) The insurance policy or policies shall contain contractual liability insurance naming the city as an insured, and shall also insure against the types of liabilities covered by the indemnification and hold harmless provisions of Section 25.1-13.

(5)(6) A registrant and its contractors or subcontractors engaged in work on the operator's behalf in, on, under or over public rights-of-way, shall maintain the following minimum insurance:

(a) Comprehensive general liability insurance to cover liability bodily injury and property damage. Exposures to be covered are: premises, operations, products/completed operations, and certain contracts. Coverage must be written on an occurrence basis, with the following limits of liability:

- 1. Bodily injury
 - a. Each occurrence \$1,000,000
 - b. Annual aggregate \$3,000,000
- 2. Property damage
 - a. Each occurrence \$1,000,000
 - b. Annual aggregate \$3,000,000
- 3. Personal injury
 - a. Annual aggregate \$3,000,000

4. Completed operations and products liability shall be maintained for two (2) years after the abandonment of the facility by the registrant (in the case of the registrant) or completion of the work for the registrant (in case of a contractor or subcontractor).

5. Property damage liability insurance shall include coverage for the following hazards: X – explosion, C – collapse, U – underground.

(b) Worker's compensation insurance shall be maintained to comply with statutory limits for all employees, and in case any work is sublet, each registrant shall require the subcontractors similarly to provide workers' compensation insurance for all the latter's employees unless such employees are covered by the protection afforded by each registrant. Each registrant and its contractors and subcontractors shall maintain employers liability insurance. The following limits must be maintained:

- 1. Workers' compensation Statutory
- 2. Employer's liability \$500,000 per occurrence
- (c) Comprehensive auto liability
 - 1. Bodily injury
 - a. Each occurrence \$1,000,000
 - b. Annual aggregate \$3,000,000

- 2. Property damage
 - a. Each occurrence \$1,000,000
 - b. Annual aggregate \$3,000,000

Coverage shall include owned, hired and non-owned vehicles.

(6) Each communication facility operator shall hold the city, its agents, and employees, harmless on account of claims for damage to persons, property or premises arising out of it construction, operation or repair of its communications facility and name the city as an additional insured.

(7) Thirty (30) days advance written notice by registered, certified or regular mail as determined by the city must be given to the city of any cancellation, intent not to renew or reduction in the policy coverages.

(7)(8) This Section shall not be construed to affect in any way the city's rights, privileges and immunities as set forth in Florida Statutes § 768.28. Insurance under this Section shall run continuously with the presence of the registrant's facilities in the public rights-of-way and any termination or lapse of such insurance shall be a violation of this Section and subject to the remedies as set forth herein. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the city may, in its sole discretion, required increased or decreased levels of insurance for any other object placed in the city's public rights-of-way by way of individual license agreements.

Sec. 25.1-13. Indemnification.

(1) A registrant shall, at its sole cost and expense, indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the city, its officials, boards, members, agents, and employees, against any and all claims, suits, causes of action, proceedings, judgments for damages or equitable relief, and costs and expenses incurred by the city arising out of the placement or maintenance of its communications systems or facilities in public rights-of-way, regardless of whether the act or omission complained of is authorized, allowed or prohibited by this chapter, provided, however, that a registrant's obligation hereunder shall not extend to any claims caused by the <u>negligence</u>, gross negligence or wanton or willful acts of the city. This provision includes, but is not limited to, the city's reasonable attorneys' fees <u>and costs</u> incurred in defending against any such claim, suit or proceedings. The city agrees to notify the registrant, in writing, within a reasonable time of the city receiving notice, of any issue it determines may require indemnification. Nothing in this Section shall prohibit the city's reasonable belief there exists or may exist a conflict, potential conflict or appearance of a conflict. Nothing contained in this section shall be construed or interpreted:

(a) As denying to either party any remedy or defense available to such party under the laws of the State of Florida;

(b) As consent by the city to be sued; or

(c) As a waiver of sovereign immunity beyond the waiver provided in Florida Statutes § 768.28, as it may be amended.

(2) The indemnification requirements shall survive and be in effect after the termination, suspension or cancellation of a registration. (Ord. No. 01-29, § 15, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-14. Construction Bond.

(1) Prior to issuing a permit, where the work under the permit will require restoration of public rights of way, the city may require a construction bond to secure the restoration of the public rights-of-way and removal of abandoned equipment or equipment not removed after termination of registration or non-renewal of the annual permit.

(2) In the event a registrant subject to such a construction bond fails to complete the work in a safe, timely and competent manner in accordance with the provisions of the permit, there shall be recoverable, jointly and severally from the principal and surety of the bond, any damages or loss suffered by the city as a result, including the full amount of any compensation, indemnification or cost of removal or abandonment of any property of the registrant, or the cost of completing the work, plus a reasonable allowance for attorney's fees, up to the full amount of the bond.

(3) No less than twelve (12) months after the completion of the construction and satisfaction of all obligations in accordance with the bond, the registrant may request the Director of Engineering to remove the requirement to continue the construction bond. Notwithstanding, the city may require a new bond for any subsequent work performed in the public rights-of-way.

(4) The construction bond shall be issued by a surety having a minimum rating of A-1 in Best's Ley Rating Guide, Property/Casualty Edition; shall be subject to the approval of the City Attorney; and shall provide that:

"For twelve (12) months after issuance of this bond, this bond may not be canceled, or allowed to lapse, until sixty (60) days after receipt by the city, by certified mail, return receipt requested, of a written notice from the issuer of the bond of intent to cancel or not to renew."

(5) The rights reserved by the city with respect to any construction bond established pursuant to this section are in addition to all other rights and remedies the city may have under this Section, or at law or equity whether reserved in this chapter, or authorized by other law, and no action, proceeding or exercise of a right with respect to the construction bond will affect any other right the city may have.

(Ord No 01-29, § 15, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-16. Enforcement Remedies.

(1) A registrant's failure to comply with provisions of this chapter shall constitute a violation of this chapter and shall subject the registrant to the code enforcement provisions and procedures as provided in Florida Statutes Chapter 162, Florida Statutes § 166.0415 and Section 2-72, et. seq. of the City Code of Ordinances, as they may be amended. In addition, violation of this chapter may be punishable by a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) or by imprisonment not to exceed sixty (60) days or by both as provided.

(2) In addition to any other remedies available at law, including but not limited to Florida Statutes § 166.0415, and Florida Statutes Chapter 162, or equity or as provided in this

chapter, the city may apply any one or combination of the following remedies in the event a registrant violates this chapter, or applicable local law or order related to the public rights-of-way:

(a) Failure to comply with the provisions of the chapter or other law applicable to occupants of the public rights-of-way, may result in imposition of penalties to be paid by the registrant to the city in an amount of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) per day or part thereof that the violation continues.

(b) In addition to or instead of any other remedy, the city may seek legal or equitable relief from any court of competent jurisdiction.

(3) Before imposing a fine pursuant to this section, the city <u>manager or the city</u> <u>manager's designee</u> shall give written notice of the violation and its intention to assess such penalties, which notice shall contain a description of the alleged violation. Following receipt of such notice, the registrant shall have 30 days to either: (a) cure the violation to the city's satisfaction and the city shall make good faith reasonable efforts to assist in resolving the violation; or (b) file an appeal with the city to contest the alleged violation. Section 25.1-8 of this chapter shall govern such appeal. If no appeal is filed and if the violation is not cured within the thirty (30) day period, the city may collect all fines owed, beginning with the first day of the violation, through any means allowed by law.

(4) In determining which remedy is appropriate, the city shall take into consideration the nature of the violation, the person or persons bearing the impact of the violation, the nature of the remedy required in order to prevent further violations, and such other matters as the city determines are appropriate to the public interest.

(5) Failure of the city to enforce any requirements of this chapter shall not constitute a waiver of the city's right to enforce that violation or subsequent violations of the same type or to seek appropriate enforcement remedies.

(6) In any proceeding before the city where there exists an issue with respect to a registrant's performance of its obligations pursuant to this chapter, the registrant shall be given the opportunity to provide such information as it may have concerning its compliance with the terms and conditions of this chapter. The city may find a registrant that does not demonstrate compliance with the terms and conditions of this chapter in default and apply any one or combination of the remedies otherwise authorized by this chapter <u>or other applicable laws</u>, <u>ordinances, regulations or city codes</u>.

(7) The city manager or a designee shall be responsible for administration and enforcement of this chapter, and is authorized to give any notice required by law. (Ord. No 01-29, § 18, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-17. Abandonment of a Communication Facility.

(1) Upon abandonment of a communications facility owned by a registrant in public rightsof-way, the registrant shall notify the city within ninety (90) days.

(2) The city may direct the registrant <u>by written notice</u> to remove all or any portion of such abandoned <u>communications</u> facility at the registrant's sole expense if the city determines that the abandoned facility's presence interferes with the public health, safety or welfare, which shall include, but is not be limited to, <u>a determination that such facility</u>: (a) compromises safety at any

time for any public rights-of-way user or during construction or maintenance in public rights-ofway; (b) prevents another person from locating facilities in the area of public rights-of-way where the abandoned facility is located when other alternative locations are not reasonably available; (c) creates a maintenance condition that is disruptive to the public rights-of-way's use; or (d) removal of the communications facility would improve or enhance the city's aesthetics. In the event of (b), the city may require the third person to coordinate with the registrant that owns the existing facility for joint removal and placement, where agreed to by the registrant.

(3) In the event that the city does not direct the removal of the abandoned facility, the registrant, by its notice of abandonment to the city, shall be deemed to consent to the alteration or removal of all or any portion of the facility by the city or another person at such third party's cost.

(4) If the registrant fails to remove all or any portion of an abandoned facility as directed by the city within a reasonable time period as may be required by the city under the circumstances, the city may perform such removal and charge the cost of the removal against the registrant <u>or any successor in interest to the registrant</u>.

(Ord. No 01-29 § 19, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-18. Force Majeure.

(1) In the event a registrant's performance of or compliance with any of the provisions of this chapter is prevented by a cause or event not within the registrant's control, such inability to perform or comply shall be deemed excused and no penalties or sanctions shall be imposed as a result; provided, however, that such registrant uses all practicable means to expeditiously cure or correct any such inability to perform or comply. For purposes of this chapter, causes or events not within a registrant's control shall include, without limitation, acts of God, floods, earthquakes, landslides, hurricanes, fires and other natural disasters, acts of public enemies, riots or civil disturbances, sabotage, strikes and restraints imposed by order of a governmental agency or court.

(2) Causes or events within registrant's control, and thus not falling within this section, shall include, without limitation, registrant's financial inability to perform or comply, economic hardship, and misfeasance, malfeasance or nonfeasance by any of registrant's directors, officers, employees, contractors or agents.

(Ord. No. 01-29, § 20, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25-1-19. Reports and Records.

(1) Each registrant shall, upon thirty (30) calendar days written notice, if reasonably possible, but in no event less than five (5) business days written notice, provide the city access to all books and records related to the construction, maintenance, or repair of the facility to the extent the city review of the books and records is necessary to manage its rights-of-way.

(2) Any and all non-proprietary or non-confidential books and records may be copied by the city. To the maximum extent permitted by Florida Statutes § 202.195, as amended, such books and records shall be kept confidential and exempt from the provisions of Florida Statutes § 119.07(1). A registrant is responsible for obtaining or maintaining the necessary possession or control of all books and records related to the construction, maintenance or repair of the facility, so that it can produce the documents upon request. Books and records must be maintained for

a period of five (5) years, except that any record that is a public record must be maintained for the period required by state law.

(3) For purposes of this section, the terms "books and records" shall be read expansively to include information in whatever format stored. Books and records requested shall be produced to the city at City Hall, except by agreement.

(4) If any books and records are too voluminous, or for security reasons cannot be copied and moved, then a registrant may request that the inspection take place at some other location mutually agreed to by the city and the registrant, provided that the registrant must make necessary arrangements for copying documents selected by the city after its review; and the registrant must pay all travel and additional copying expenses incurred by the city in inspecting those documents or having those documents inspected by its designee.

(5) Without limiting the foregoing, a registrant shall provide the city the following within ten (10) calendar days of their receipt or (in the case of documents created by the registrant or its affiliate) filing:

(a) Notices of deficiency or forfeiture related to the operation of the facility; and

(b) Copies of any request for protection under bankruptcy laws, or any judgment related to a declaration of bankruptcy by the operator or by any partnership or corporation that owns or controls the operator directly or indirectly.

(6) In addition, the city may, at its option, and upon reasonable notice to the registrant, inspect the facilities in the public rights-of-way to ensure the safety of its residents. (Ord No. 01-29, § 21, 7-3-01)

Sec.25.1-20. Reservation of Rights and Remedies.

(1) The city reserves the right to amend this chapter as it shall find necessary in the lawful exercise of its police powers.

(2) This chapter shall be applicable to all communications facilities placed in the public rights-of-way on or after the effective date of this chapter and shall apply to all existing communications facilities in the public rights-of-way prior to the effective date of this chapter, to the full extent permitted by state and federal law.

(3) The adoption of this chapter is not intended to affect any rights or defenses the city may have under any existing franchise, license or other agreements with a communications services provider.

(4) Nothing in this chapter shall affect the remedies the city has available under applicable law.

(5) Any person who uses the communications facilities of a registrant, other than the registrant that owns the facilities, shall not be entitled to any rights to place or maintain such facilities in excess of the rights of the registrant that places or maintains the facilities. (Ord. No. 01-29, § 22, 7-3-01)

Sec. 25.1-21. Pass-through Provider Fees and Charges.

(1) Pass-through providers shall pay to the city on an annual basis an amount equal to \$500.00 per linear mile or portion thereof of communications facilities placed and/or maintained in the city's rights-of-way. For purposes of this section, the city's rights-of-way do not include rights-of-way that extend in or through the city but are state, county or another authority's roads or rights-of-way.

(2) The amounts charged pursuant to this section shall be based on the linear miles of rights-of- way where a wireless communications facility is placed, not based on a summation of the lengths of individual cables, conduits, strands or fibers. Multiple cables, conduits, strands, or fibers located within the same conduit shall be considered one communications facility for purposes of this subsection.

(3) Any annual amount charged shall be reduced for a prorated portion of any 12-month period during which the pass-through provider remits taxes imposed by the city pursuant to F.S. Ch. 202.

(4) Fees for Non-Collocated Communications Facilities.

(a) Fees for non-collocated communications facilities may be charged to any person not a dealer of communications services as defined by Florida Statutes § 202.11.

(b) Annual payments shall be due and payable on April 1 of each year. Failure to timely pay the annual payment shall result in the immediate forfeiture of all rights to locate any wireless equipment in the citv rights-of-way and all wireless equipment shall be removed within thirtv (30) davs at the wireless infrastructure provider's expense. Fees not paid shall bear interest at the rate of one percent per month from the date due until the wireless equipment is removed. The acceptance of any payment required hereunder by the city shall not be construed as an acknowledgement that the amount paid is the correct amount due, nor shall such acceptance of payment be construed as a release of any claim which the city may have for additional sums due and payable. All fee payments shall be subject to audit by the city, and assessment or refund if any payment is found to be in error. If such audit results in an assessment by and an additional payment to the city, such additional payment shall be subject to interest at the rate of one percent per month until the date payment is made.

(5) Collocation Fees.

(a) The wireless infrastructure provider shall remit a \$150.00 collocation fee per wireless facility to the City with the application to pay for the first year's fee for collocating small wireless facilities on a city utility pole.

(b) The wireless infrastructure provider shall remit a \$150.00 collocation fee per wireless facility to the City within thirty (30) days of the anniversary of the approval of the collocation. Failure to timely pay the Collocation Fee shall result in the immediate forfeiture of all rights to collocate on the city utility pole and any wireless equipment collocated on the utility pole shall be removed within thirty (30) days at the wireless provider's expense.

(6) Fees for City Connections. The City reserves the right to assess pole connection fees or other fees for the use of city employees and contractors as well as fees for access to any fiber network the city may construct. (7) Permit Fees. The wireless infrastructure provider shall remit with its application all appropriate fees as provided herein, and as consistent with Section 337.401(7), Fla.Stat., as may be amended from time to time..

(8) If the payments required by this section are not timely made by the due date, the city may withhold the issuance of any permits, including for other wireless facilities, to the registrant until the amount past due is paid in full.

- RE: Approve (CDRV 18-001) Amending the LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, Chapter 3. Zoning, Article V. Supplemental Regulations: Section 12. <u>Satellite Earth Stations and Antennas</u> to insert provisions for HAM radio towers and antennas consist with FCC requirements, and Section 13. <u>Wireless Communications Facilities (WCF)</u> to implement regulations consistent with State legislation known as the Advanced Wireless Infrastructure Deployment Act that regulates WCF within public rights-of-way.

EXPLANATION

The above-referenced code revisions are necessary in order to update the Land Development Regulations to correspond with proposed amendments to Part II of the City Code of Ordinances, Chapter 25.1 "Communications Rights-of-Way" (see accompanying Ordinance). On June 23, 2017 the Florida legislature adopted the Advanced Wireless Infrastructure Deployment Act effective July 1, 2017 that revised regulations regarding communications facilities in the public rights-of-way. The proposed amendments to the Code of Ordinances Part II Chapter 25.1 Communications Facilities in Rights-of-Way implement the new regulations of the Act. Further amendments are necessary to Part III Land Development Regulations so that WCF regulations in the LDR do not conflict with the Part II amendments.

Proposed code revisions to Part II of the City Code of Ordinances establish uniform standards and guidelines for the siting, design, and permitting of communication towers, communication antennas, and wireless communication facilities sited within public rights-of-way. The proposed amendments also establish review procedures to ensure that applications for towers and related equipment are processed consistent with state and federal law. The proposed regulations require that individuals and entities seeking permits to conduct any type of excavation, construction or other activity for communications facilities in public rights-of-way do so in a safe, expeditious, and professional manner to protect the public health, safety, aesthetics, and general welfare in the community. The recommended amendments also seek to minimize visual and other impacts of wireless communication facilities on surrounding areas by establishing standards for location, design, landscape screening, and compatibility.

Current regulations in the LDR allow wireless communications facilities (WCF) to be located in public rights-of-way as "non-concealed attached WCF" which are antennas attached to utility poles and freestanding lights at least 40 to 50 feet in height, subject to agreement with the agency representative with jurisdiction over the right-of-way and/or the utility company. With the ever-increasing public demand for capacity, speed, and reliability, wireless carriers are now reducing the

traffic on each macro-cell tower site by building a number of smaller sites with shorter transmission and receiver distances. These microcell towers are typically one-half the height of a standard cell tower and placed closer together to provide more consistent coverage to areas. There are currently no applications formally submitted to the City for the new technology of microcell towers within rights-of-way, but there is interest and applications are expected in the very near future. These code amendments would provide standards whereby microcell structures can be allowed while preventing negative impacts on the character of residential neighborhoods or property values, or any threat to public safety.

Proposed revisions to Part II Chapter 25.1 include design standards that require communications facilities within rights-of-way to be placed underground or to be designed as concealed (stealth) microcell towers where the antennas and associated equipment are housed within the base of the pole or the pole itself (see attached exhibits for examples) and they do not exceed the height of adjacent utility or light poles in the right-of-way.

The proposed revisions to the LDR would also expand Chapter 12 to amend the regulations on television antennas and amateur ham radio antennas to update terminology, restrict the number allowed, and establish height limits and setbacks while respecting preemption regulations by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). The FCC's "PRB-1" is their declaratory ruling requiring that local zoning **laws** reasonably accommodate amateur antennas and support structures with minimal regulation and without unreasonable restrictions. It further reads that such regulations "...must constitute the minimum practicable regulation to accomplish the state or local authority's legitimate purpose". Due to the vague character of the FCC regulation, some jurisdictions have avoided any specific standards applicable to HAM towers and antennas and merely reference their objective to accommodate such communications systems consistent with the FCC directives. While many other cities and counties have adopted quantifiable standards as well as the provision to consider tower applications that fail to comply with such standards through the reasonable accommodation process. Staff has drafted amendments consistent with this latter format of regulations to provide some limits and structure as well as to ensure ultimate compliance FCC PRB-1.

Additional revisions to the LDR Chapter 13 Wireless Communications Facilities (WCF) refer applicants to Part II Chapter 25.1 for all regulations pertaining to WCF within public rights-of-way. The WCF revisions also clarify that non-concealed attached WCF are now only those located on publicly or privately-owned lots (not in public rights-of-way) and would be limited to poles at least 50 feet in height (such as ballpark lights). In addition, non-concealed WCF would not be allowed in residential zoning districts and would be limited to a height increase of ten (10) percent of the pole height when antennas are attached.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

A summary of the proposed amendments are as follows:

Section 12 - Amateur Radio and Television Antennas

- Update code terminology consistent with the industry;
- Allow Amateur Radio/CB antennas as accessory only in conjunction with a single family use;
- Simplify / clarify height standards for Citizens Band and TV towers by including only one standard for both freestanding and mounted towers, and maintaining maximum height as a factor of roof height (maximum of 15 feet higher than the roof (peak) height up to 40 feet);

- Insert provisions for reasonable accommodation for HAM tower applications that fail to satisfy the development standards, in compliance with FCC requirements;
- Maintaining setbacks for amateur radio/CB antenna support structures consistent with the structure setbacks in the zoning district, and establish a minimum setback from easements of 10 feet; and,
- Exempt TV satellite dishes 40 inches or less in diameter for single-family residential districts.
- Clarify requirements (process, number, location, setbacks, screening, and height) for singlefamily/duplex districts, multi-family residential district, and non-residential and mixed use zoning districts.

Section 13 - Wireless Communications Facilities (WCF)

- Reference WCF in public rights-of-way are subject to regulations of Part II Chapter 25.1;
- Revise non-concealed attached WCF to be on poles a minimum of 50 feet in height located on publicly or privately owned lots (not in rights-of-way);
- Update tables to prohibit non-concealed attached WCF in residential zoning districts; and,
- Update tables to add the recently approved new MU-4 zoning district.

CONCLUSION/RECOMMENDATION

Staff proposes these code amendments to Chapter 3 Article V Sections 12 – 13 of the LDR to implement new state legislation known as the Advanced Wireless Infrastructure Deployment Act and establish review procedures to ensure that applications are acted upon consistent with state and federal law. Proposed amendments to these regulations are to minimize visual and other impacts of wireless communication facilities on surrounding areas by establishing standards for location, design, landscape screening, and compatibility.

REQUESTED ACTION BY COMMISSION: PROPOSED RESOLUTION NO. R18-068 - Authorize Mayor to sign an agreement with Florida Caribbean Architecture of Boynton Beach, FL for Project Management Services for the Town Square Project for a monthly amount of \$15,200.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

The City is undertaking a major redevelopment known as Town Square redevelopment, this project involves the demolishing of existing City buildings, infrastructure, construction of three new City facilities, the renovation of a historic high school, and the construction of a District Energy Plant.

In addition there will be private development occurring on the redevelopment site. City services will move from existing buildings into temporary locations for 24-30 months while demolition and construction occurs.

The amount of oversight required for this type of project far exceeds the time available from current staff.

Florida Caribbean Architecture, Anderson Slocombe is a Boynton Beach Business and has worked with the City in the past on construction projects.

Staff is recommending entering into an agreement with Florida Caribbean Architecture to provide project management services in connection with this project. The agreement will be in effect until all City services are moved back to the newly constructed buildings.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT CITY PROGRAMS OR SERVICES? This agreement will provide dedicated oversight to the many facets of this project, city staff will he heavily involved but still have the normal City business and services to maintain.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The monthly cost of this service is \$15,200, annually \$182,400. Agreement effective May 1, 2018, there are 5 months remaining in FY 17/18. Cost for remainder of FY 17/18 would be \$76,000, would be paid from following accounts; 75% or \$57,000 from account 001-1214-512-31-90 25% or \$19,000 from account 401-2821-536-31-90

ALTERNATIVES: Do not hire a project manager for this project.

STRATEGIC PLAN: Redevelop Downtown

CONSULTANT AGREEMENT FOR PROJECT MANAGEMENT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into between the **City of Boynton Beach**, hereinafter referred to as "the City", and **Florida Caribbean Architecture**, **Inc.**, hereinafter referred to as "the Consultant", in consideration of the mutual benefits, terms, and conditions hereinafter specified.

- 1. PROJECT DESIGNATION. The Consultant is retained by the City to perform **Project Management Services/Owners' Representative** services in connection with the project designated **City of Boynton Beach Town Square development**.
- 2. SCOPE OF SERVICES. Consultant agrees to perform the services, identified on Exhibit "A" attached hereto, including the provision of all labor, materials, equipment and supplies.
- 3. TIME FOR PERFORMANCE. Work under this contract shall commence upon the giving of written notice by the City to the Consultant to proceed. Consultant shall perform all services and provide all work product required pursuant to this agreement during the Town Square Project as determined by the City.
- 4. PAYMENT. The Consultant shall be paid by the City for completed work and for services rendered under this agreement as follows:
 - a. Payment for the work provided by Consultant shall be made in a lump sum payment of \$15,200/Monthly unless express written modification of the agreement signed by the City.
 - b. The Consultant may submit vouchers to the City once per month during the progress of the work for partial payment for project completed to date. Such vouchers will be checked by the City, and upon approval thereof, payment will be made to the Consultant in the amount approved.
 - c. Final payment of any balance due the Consultant of the total contract price earned will be made promptly upon its ascertainment and verification by the City after the completion of the work under this agreement and its acceptance by the City.
 - d. Payment as provided in this section shall be full compensation for work performed, services rendered and for all materials, supplies, equipment and incidentals necessary to complete the work.
 - e. The Consultant's records and accounts pertaining to this agreement are to be kept available for inspection by representatives of the City and State for a period of three (3) years after final payments. Copies shall be made available upon request.

- 5. OWNERSHIP AND USE OF DOCUMENTS. All documents, drawings, specifications and other materials produced by the Consultant in connection with the services rendered under this agreement shall be the property of the City whether the project for which they are made is executed or not. The Consultant shall be permitted to retain copies, including reproducible copies, of drawings and specifications for information, reference and use in connection with Consultant's endeavors.
- 6. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS. Consultant shall, in performing the services contemplated by this service agreement, faithfully observe and comply with all federal, state and local laws, ordinances and regulations that are applicable to the services to be rendered under this agreement.
- 7. INDEMNIFICATION. Consultant shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its offices, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, losses or liability, or any portion thereof, including attorneys fees and costs, arising from injury or death to persons, including injuries, sickness, disease or death to Consultant's own employees, or damage to property occasioned by a negligent act, omission or failure of the Consultant.
- 8. INSURANCE. The Consultant shall secure and maintain in force throughout the duration of this contract comprehensive general liability insurance with a minimum coverage of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 aggregate for personal injury; and \$1,000,000 per occurrence/aggregate for property damage, and professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.

Said general liability policy shall name the City of Boynton Beach as an additional named insured and shall include a provision prohibiting cancellation of said policy except upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the City. Certificates of coverage as required by this section shall be delivered to the City within fifteen (15) days of execution of this agreement.

- 9. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. The Consultant and the City agree that the Consultant is an independent contractor with respect to the services provided pursuant to this agreement. Nothing in this agreement shall be considered to create the relationship of employer and employee between the parties hereto. Neither Consultant nor any employee of Consultant shall be entitled to any benefits accorded City employees by virtue of the services provided under this agreement. The City shall not be responsible for withholding or otherwise deducting federal income tax or social security or for contributing to the state industrial insurance program, otherwise assuming the duties of an employer with respect to Consultant, or any employee of Consultant.
- 10. COVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES. The Consultant warrants that he has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bonafide employee working solely for the Consultant, to solicit or secure this contract, and that he has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bonafide employee working solely for the Consultant, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this contract. For breach or violation of this warranty, the City shall have the right to annul this contract without liability or, in its discretion to deduct from the contract price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or contingent fee.

- 11. DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED. The Consultant, with regard to the work performed by it under this agreement, will not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, creed, age, sex or the presence of any physical or sensory handicap in the selection and retention of employees or procurement of materials or supplies.
- 12. ASSIGNMENT. The Consultant shall not sublet or assign any of the services covered by this agreement without the express written consent of the City.
- 13. NON-WAIVER. Waiver by the City of any provision of this agreement or any time limitation provided for in this agreement shall not constitute a waiver of any other provision.

14. TERMINATION.

- a. The City reserves the right to terminate this agreement at any time by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the Consultant.
- b. In the event of the death of a member, partner or officer of the Consultant, or any of its supervisory personnel assigned to the project, the surviving members of the Consultant hereby agree to complete the work under the terms of this agreement, if requested to do so by the City. This section shall not be a bar to renegotiations of this agreement between surviving members of the Consultant and the City, if the City so chooses.
- 15. DISPUTES. Any dispute arising out of the terms or conditions of this agreement shall be adjudicated within the courts of Florida. Further, this agreement shall be construed under Florida Law.
- 16. NOTICES. Notices to the City of Boynton Beach shall be sent to the following address:

EXHIBIT "A"

Scope of Services:

It is Florida Caribbean Architecture, Inc. (FCA) understanding that the scope of work is based on the development of the Town Square project.

Town Square project consists of the public improvements components described as:

- (a) a new City Hall,
- (b) a new Police Station,
- (c) a new Fire Station,

(d) a new District Energy Plant,

- (e) renovation and improvements to historic High School Building,
- (f) public park and open space improvements, and
- (g) infrastructure improvements throughout the Project

The Owner maintains ALL decision making authority and all contractual relationships flow back to the Owner. COMMISSION MEETING DATE: 5/1/2018

REQUESTED ACTION BY COMMISSION: Approve proposed settlement and authorize payment of \$50,000 to settle the case of Barry Goldman v. City of Boynton Beach.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

Plaintiff filed a summons and complaint alleging negligence on behalf of the City from an incident occurring on March 14, 2015, which Plaintiff further alleged resulted in bodily injuries. Plaintiff's original demand was \$200,000, which the City rejected.

The parties attended Court-ordered mediation but were unable to reach an agreement. Following mediation, the City continued to litigate the case and prepare for trial in addition to continuing to attempt settlement.

The City and the Plaintiff have reached a tentative agreement to settle this case for \$50,000 and seek the approval of the Commission.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT CITY PROGRAMS OR SERVICES? The City does not admit liability by agreeing to any settlement.

FISCAL IMPACT: Budgeted

If the Commission rejects the Plaintiff's settlement offer of \$50,000, additional defense and trial costs are estimated to be \$30,000. The time and indirect costs (such as lost productivity) for City staff who are required to attend trial (estimated 4-5 days) is an additional factor for consideration.

ALTERNATIVES: Reject Plaintiff's settlement offer, return this matter to the Court to reset a trial date, and incur additional defense expenses of approximately \$30,000. This alternative also presents the usual risks associated with allowing a jury to control the outcome of a case, which could result in additional costs to the City (judgment or appeal) should the jury rule in favor of the Plaintiff.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

PROCHAMPS, a Community Champions Company has administered our City's defaulted property registration program since its inception in 2010. This program was initiated pursuant to City Ordinance 09-040 for the purpose of requiring mortgagees to register and maintain properties in default to include providing key contact information and paying an annual fee for each property registered. The intent of the Ordinance was to identify all property in default as a means of maintaining properties at risk of becoming vacant and a blighting influence in the community.

The proposed amendments are the result of routine Ordinance audits by PROCHAMPS and discussion and collaboration with City staff.

Abandoned personal property: Property that has been left abandoned and unprotected 1 from the elements and shall include, but not be limited to, wrecked, inoperative or partially 2 dismantled trailers, boats, machinery, refrigerators, washing machines, plumbing fixtures, 3 furniture and any other similar article that has been left abandoned and unprotected from the 4 elements. 5 Abandoned real property: Any Real Property that is encumbered by a mortgage in 6 Default, is subject to an ongoing foreclosure action, has been the subject of a foreclosure 7 action and a judgement has been entered, or has been the subject of a foreclosure sale where 8 the title was transferred to the beneficiary of a mortgage involved in the Foreclosure and any 9 properties transferred under a deed in lieu of foreclosure/sale. 10 11 Accessible property: A property that is accessible through a compromised/breached gate, fence, wall, and the like. 12 Accessible structure: A structure/building that is unsecured and/or breached in such a way 13 as to allow access to the interior space by unauthorized persons. 14 Default: The mortgagor has not complied with the terms of the mortgage on the property, 15 or the promissory note, or other evidence of the debt, referred to in the mortgage. 16 Enforcement officer: Any full-time law enforcement officer, building official, code 17 enforcement officer, fire inspector or building inspector employed within the City. 18 Evidence of vacancy: Any condition that, on its own or combined with other conditions 19 20 present, would lead a reasonable person to believe that the property is Vacant. Such conditions may include, but are not limited to, overgrown and/or dead vegetation; past due 21 utility notices and/or disconnected utilities; accumulation of abandoned personal property, as 22 defined herein; the absence of furnishings and/or personal items consistent with habitation or 23 occupancy; the presence of an unsanitary, stagnant swimming pool; accumulation of 24 newspapers, circulars, flyers and/or mail; statements by neighbors, passers-by, delivery agents 25 or government agents; and/or the presence of boards over doors, windows, or other openings 26 in violation of applicable code, or any other evidence that the property is vacant. 27 Foreclosure: A process, proceeding, or action to enforce a mortgage by terminating a 28 property owner's interest in mortgaged property or by obtaining possession of mortgaged 29 property.. 30 31 *Mortgagee*: The creditor, including but not limited to, trustees; mortgage servicing companies; lenders in a mortgage agreement; any agent, servant, or employee of the creditor; 32 any successor in interest; or any assignee of the creditor's rights, interests or obligations under 33 the mortgage agreement; or any other person or entity with the legal right to foreclose on the 34 Real Property. 35 36 *Nominal salvage value:* The value of an article of abandoned or derelict property that a reasonably prudent person would believe is the fair market value of the property, taking into 37 consideration its useful life, earning capacity or replacement cost, less depreciation. Items of 38 39 general or special depreciation would be nominally greater than the costs of salvage, including the removal, transportation, storage and sale of same. 40 Property management company: A local property manager, property maintenance 41 42 company or similar entity responsible for inspecting, maintaining, and securing the abandoned Real Property. 43 Public property: Canals, all waterways, lands and improvements owned by a 44 governmental body or any governmental agency, including but not limited to, easements and 45 rights-of-way, but excluding the campus of any institution of the state university system. 46

Real Property: Any residential or commercial land and/or buildings, leasehold 1 improvements and anything affixed to the land, or portion thereof identified by a property 2 parcel identification number, located in the limits of the City of Boynton Beach. 3 Semi-Annual Registration: Six (6) months from the date of the first action that requires 4 registration, as determined by the City of Boynton Beach, or its designee, and every 5 subsequent six (6) months. The date of the initial registration may be different than the date of 6 the first action that required registration. 7 Vacant: Any parcel of land, building, or structure that is not legally occupied. 8 (c) Applicability. This section shall be considered cumulative and not superseding or 9 subject to any other law or provision for same, but shall rather be an additional remedy 10 available to the City above and beyond any other state, county and/or local provisions for 11 12 same. (d) *Penalties.* Any person who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon 13 conviction, be punished as provided in Section 1-6 of the City's Code of Ordinances Code as 14 applicable. In addition, any violation of this section may be enforced through the City's Code 15 Compliance Board, as provided in Chapter 2, Article V, of the City's Code of Ordinances. 16 (e) Placement of abandoned personal property on private property prohibited. 17 (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to abandon personal property upon private 18 19 property: 20 a. Without such receiving the property owner's consent; or b. In violation of this or any other applicable law, ordinance or regulation. 21 (2) Nothing in this section shall be deemed to apply to abandoned personal property 22 authorized to be left on private business property properly operated, licensed and zoned in the 23 City for the purpose of accepting abandoned property. 24 (f) Public nuisance. All abandoned personal property and Abandoned Real Property is 25 hereby declared to be a public nuisance, the abatement of which, pursuant to the police power, 26 is hereby declared to be necessary for the health, welfare and safety of the residents of the 27 City. 28 (g) Notification procedure. When an enforcement officer ascertains that an article of 29 personal property having nominal salvage value lies abandoned or derelict upon private 30 property, that officer shall: 31 (1) Cause a notice to be placed upon such abandoned property in the substantially 32 33 following form: NOTICE TO THE OWNER AND ALL PERSONS INTERESTED IN THE FOLLOWING 34 **DESCRIBED PROPERTY:** 35 36 (setting forth brief description) 37 LOCATED AT: (setting forth brief description of location) 38 39 is. IMPROPERLY STORED AND IS IN VIOLATION OF 40 41 (setting forth ordinance or resolution violated) AND MUST BE REMOVED WITHIN FIVE (5) DAYS FROM THE DATE OF THIS 42 NOTICE; OTHERWISE IT SHALL BE PRESUMED TO BE ABANDONED PROPERTY, 43 AND MAY BE REMOVED AND SOLD OR DESTROYED BY ORDER OF THE CITY OF 44 45 BOYNTON BEACH, FLORIDA, DATED THIS: (setting forth the date of posting of notice) 46

9 (4) The enforcement officer shall mail, by certified mail, a copy of the above-described 10 notice to the owner of the Real Property upon which the abandoned personal property is 11 located, as shown by the real estate tax records as provided by the Palm Beach County 12 Property Appraiser's Office, or any other address provided to the local government by such 13 owner, on or before the date of posting such notice.

REQUESTED ACTION BY COMMISSION:

PROPOSED ORDINANCE NO. R18-008 - FIRST READING - Approve the revised and updated City ordinances to regulate the Fire Department. This is a revision of the local fire prevention ordinances as is required by Florida State Statute when a new edition of the Florida Fire Prevention Code has been adopted. Approval of this revision by the Board will allow our fire prevention ordinances to be consistent with the latest version of the Fire Prevention Code and comply with State Statutes.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

Section 9 of the City Ordinances pertaining to fire prevention and control must remain consistent with the latest edition of the Florida Fire Prevention Code which is revised every three (3) years. The statute also requires local government to review local ordinances to ensure that they are consistent with the latest edition of the code. This revision of Section 9 of the City Ordinances complies with this statutory requirement.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT CITY PROGRAMS OR SERVICES?

The adoption of this revision will allow the Fire Department and the City of Boynton Beach to comply with State Statutes. It will update our local ordinances to become consistent with the Florida Fire Prevention Code. Ambiguous and outdated language has been revised to increase clarity and to improve our ability to deliver the best service to our community.

MUTUAL CONSENT AGREEMENT

(Use of Insurance Premium Tax Revenue)

This Mutual Consent Agreement is entered into between the CITY OF BOYNTON BEACH, a Florida municipal corporation, whose address is 100 E. Boynton Beach Boulevard, Boynton Beach, FL 33435 (the "CITY") and the PALM BEACH COUNTY POLICE BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION ("PBA") POLICE OFFICERS AND DETECTIVES, POLICE SERGEANTS, AND POLICE LIEUTENANTS.

WHEREAS, the 2015 Florida Legislature enacted legislation (Chapter No. 2015-39, Laws of Florida), hereinafter "Legislation" regarding the use of insurance premium tax revenue ("IPTR"); and

WHEREAS, the City has a retirement pension plan and fund for police officers known as the Boynton Beach Police Officers' Pension Fund ("Fund") that exceeds the minimum benefits and minimum standards established by the State of Florida for public employee firefighter pension plans as set forth in chapter 185, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the Legislation provides that use of IPTR, including any accumulations of additional premium tax revenues which have not been allocated to fund benefits in excess of the minimum benefits, may deviate from the provisions of the Legislation by mutual consent of the members' collective bargaining representative (PBA).

NOW THEREFORE, the City and Unions agree as follows:

- 1. The foregoing Whereas clauses are true and correct.
- 2. The total of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) of IPTR whether base premium tax revenue or additional premium tax revenue, received by the City will be used to reduce the City's unfunded liability to the Boynton Beach Police Officers' Pension Fund. These funds will be provided to the City in \$30,000 increments by November 2017 and November 2018.
- 3. This Consent Agreement takes effect when signed by PBA and City.

EXPLANATION OF REQUEST:

Mr. Dale Lyon with Olen Development is proposing a major site plan modification for 104 multi-family units (rental apartments) in 4, two-story buildings, and associated recreational amenities and site improvements on a total of 4.41 acres. Olen Development received major site plan modification approval in 2012 (application 12-003) for essentially the same project, however the 18 month approval period expired before the building permit could be issued. The project was resubmitted in 2017 and reviewed by staff when it was discovered that a note on the corresponding Quantum Park Plat requires buildings to be setback a minimum of 15 feet from any easement. As the plans were designed to place the buildings at or near the easements on the north and west sides, the review process was halted. The applicant subsequently filed an amendment to the plat (replat of Lot #52) to remove the note . The City Commission reviewed and approved the replatting request at their March 20, 2018 meeting. As such, the site plan was removed from hold, and scheduled for the appropriate hearings.

The minimum required perimeter building setbacks in the PID zoning district are 30' for the front, rear and side corner yards and 20' for the side interior yard. The PID regulations allows for waivers to be requested of various development requirements including setbacks, based upon the submittal of justifications by the developer. The previous site plan approval (MSPM 12-003) granted setback waivers as follows: front (north) -15', rear (south) -2', side corner (west) -15', and side interior (east) - 3'. After the project approval expired and a pre-application meeting was held with the applicant in preparation of resubmittal of project plans, staff requested the buildings be setback farther from the drainage lakes, in an effort to create a minimal rear yard for the units and to provide greater area for lake maintenance needs. The applicant revised the plans to increase these to a seven (7) foot rear and interior side setback, while maintaining the previously approved 15 foot setback against the road rights-of-way on the north and west sides, and submitted updated waiver requests to all required yard setbacks and justifications for the deviations. The justifications include the fact that the reduced setbacks do not abut any private properties, with the front (north) and corner side (west) property lines adjacent to street right-of-ways and the rear (south) and interior side (east) property lines abutting a Quantum Park drainage lake. Staff believes the impacts to be minimal and would not affect any private properties and based upon the applicant's justification, other similarly approved projects and City Commission approval of the Replat of Lot 52, and recommends approval of the Major Site Plan Modification and waiver requests.

This application was filed with the companion application to amend the Master Plan (MPMD 18-002) changing the development designated for SMU Parcel 1 from 115 single-family homes to 378 apartments and 55 townhomes, while reducing the total number of the approved residential unit allotment within the entire master plan from 1,120 to 1,115. The applicant submitted an updated traffic equivalency statement to Palm Beach County Traffic Engineering for the master plan amendment and proposed site plan. The County has determined the amendment does not have a significant peak hour traffic impact on the roadway network and therefore meets the Traffic Performance Standards of Palm Beach County. Based upon the overall development depicted within the new master plan, the new daily trips are proposed to be reduced by 1,901 from the development approved in 2014 (674 apartments, 319 condominiums, 115 single family dwelling units 399,000 square feet of commercial, 12,000 square feet of medical office and 10,000 square feet of general office). The AM Peak hour trips are proposed to be reduced by 36 and the PM Peak hour trips reduced by 152.

The 378 apartments are proposed within nine (9) 4-story buildings. The 55 townhomes are designed into eleven (11) 2-story buildings. These 2-story townhome buildings are proposed along the east side of the parcel to provide a transition between the proposed apartment buildings and the single-family residential development (Sky Lake) to the east.
